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EXECUTIVE SYNOPSIS

DOSSIER NOTES

In preparing this background report, we undertook an examination of all readily available and relevant electronic and online records, several hundred Nexis and news articles, dozens of active and archived web pages, and several dozen public records from Nexis and the resources of various federal, state, and municipal government offices. The results of our analysis are contained below.

Typographical Note: There are a number of articles quoted in this report that contain typographical errors. These are from the original text of the article and have not been corrected when being quoted directly.

MAIN VULNERABILITIES

Liberal Political Leanings

Muth founded and chaired a local chapter of the left-leaning organization, Indivisible. In her personal biography, Muth stated she formed and chaired an Indivisible chapter in Montgomery County. In response to Trump's 2016 victory, Indivisible created a guide to "resist the Trump [and GOP] agenda]" and help elect candidates who "fight for progressive values." To that effect, Muth has supported far-left candidates and causes. Muth contributed towards Elizabeth Warren's presidential campaign. Muth also endorsed Warren's campaign. Further, Muth contributed to farleft candidates Ro Khanna and Paula Jean Swearingin, as well as liberal and progressive groups including the Working Families Party and the Progressive Change Campaign Committee.

Similarly, Muth has received funding from liberal and progressive candidates and organizations. Muth has notably received thousands of dollars from pro-abortion groups such as Emily's List and Planned Parenthood. Further, Muth has received \$1,000 the Pennsylvania Federation of Teachers. Likewise, Muth received tens of thousands of dollars from liberal policy organizations such as Flippable and RepresentUs; as well as thousands of dollars from public and labor unions, including Pennsylvania SEIU, Bricklayers and Allied Crafter Workers Local 1, and 32BJ SEIU. In 2018 alone, Muth received more than \$200,000 from Pennsylvania Democratic Campaign Committees.

Muth is a staunch progressive, who while candidate for state senate in 2018, offered her full support for the 'We The People' agenda (which supports a wish-list of leftist policies). Among dozens of measures, the 'We The People' agenda supports increasing taxes by billions of dollars, encouraging allegations of systemic and structural racism, and supports questionable criminal justice reform measures such as the elimination of cash bail.

Muth has several ties to prominent progressive politicians, including Barack Obama, Elizabeth Warren, and Kamala Harris.

Liberal Fiscal Agenda

Muth has suggested raising corporate and income taxes and imposing a severance tax as a means to achieve property tax relief. Muth has joined a slim minority in opposing multiple bipartisan state budgets that increase education funding in a fiscally responsible way. Muth has supported the protection and expansion of welfare programs and has proposed a \$1 billion student debt relief program.

Muth has called for an increase to the minimum wage and has labeled businesses that could not afford to do so as immoral. Muth has also indicated she supports increasing overtime mandates. In 2020, Muth supported legislation that "authorizes unionization of waterways conservation officers, thus driving up taxpayer costs and making it harder for the state to dismiss poorly performing employees."

On energy matters, Muth has been a strong advocate for alternative energy and calling for 100% of Pennsylvania energy to come from renewable sources by 2050. Muth has been an opponent of oil and gas development, particularly fracking. Muth has been steadfast in her support for imposing additional regulations on the oil and industry and has earned praise from environmentalists for her anti-growth agenda.

In 2019, Muth's voted against legislation that "streamlines government by abolishing eight outdated boards, commissions and committees..." Muth also voted against a bill to "reduce excessive regulations that have prevented individuals from utilizing agricultural buildings" and against a bill "that "expands consumer access to broadband and other telecommunication services by repealing costly regulations..."

Muth was opposed to the ratification of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement.

Embrace Of The Left's Covid Reaction And Government-Funded Healthcare

Muth is on record as a supporter of Medicare for All.

During the covid-19 pandemic, Muth appears to have been a loyal partisan as she supported onerous covid restrictions. Even through September 2021, Muth was a defender of the imposition of school mask mandates. Muth indicated support for big government rule by opposing efforts to provide a check on the executive branch during the covid-19 pandemic. Muth voted against efforts to reopen Pennsylvania's economy and opposed efforts to fairly reopen Pennsylvania bars and restaurants.

Social Agenda And Other Far-Left Views

Muth is known to have opposed legislation that sought to prohibit abortion of a fetus on the grounds of a genetic abnormality – a bid intended to protect persons born with down syndrome. In 2021, Muth participated in a rally in support of abortion rights and was among the speakers to criticize the Texas heartbeat abortion law. Just recently, Muth held a pro-abortion rally to express her opposition to overturning Roe V. Wade.

Muth is opposed to efforts to ban transgender persons from participating in women's sports. Additionally, Muth was among the state Senators to back a proposed reform to remove sex from birth certificates in order to better accommodate transgender individuals.

Muth has expressed support for additional gun control measures and more intensive licensing and oversight.

Muth introduced legislation to end the death penalty in Pennsylvania. Muth was among the legislators to call for the release of medically vulnerable prisoners. Muth has claimed revoking a person's probation due to failure to pay restitution costs amounted to criminalizing poverty. Finally, Muth supports ending no-knock warrants.

On education, Muth has opposed legislative efforts to expand school choice and has opposed legislative efforts to improve safety in schools.

Muth received tens of thousands of dollars from liberal policy organizations such as Flippable and RepresentUs and has additionally received tens of thousands of dollars from unions such as the Pennsylvania SEIU, Bricklayers And Allied Crafter Workers Local 1, and 32BJ SEIU. Further, Muth received \$1,000 from the Pennsylvania Federation of Teachers, as well as \$5,500 from pro-abortion groups, including Emily's List and Planned Parenthood.







- Protect and Expand General Assistance: General Assistance was eliminated in Pennsylvania by legislation in 2012. We should protect the newly re-established General Assistance program and make sure outreach efforts are done effectively so those that need this support can access it. Moving forward, we should consider increasing the benefit from its 1990 grant level.
- Raise the TANF Cash Grants: TANF grants to Pennsylvania families have not increased since 1990. Had grants kept up with inflation, a grant for a family of three would be \$721/month instead of the current \$403/month. The state should increase its grant amounts and factor in a cost-of-living adjustment so that Pennsylvania's poorest families

Repeal Counterproductive Drug Laws

- Drug-induced homicide laws allow charges of murder or manslaughter to be brought against persons involved in the manufacturing, sale, distribution or delivery of a controlled substance resulting in death. Pennsylvania is leading the charge here—the Commonwealth ranked number one in the nation for the number of drug-induced homicide charges brought. For this same crime, people of color on average receive much higher sentences than that of white individuals.⁷ Though these laws are generally brought forward with good intentions, they are harmful, target some of our most vulnerable populations, and should be eliminated.
- Similarly, laws that discourage doctors from providing legitimate pain treatment that sometimes includes the use of opioids often have unintended victims—people who are suffering from severe pain that sometimes cannot be treated in other ways. These laws can drive some pain patients to seek out alternatives, increasing the demand for heroin or unregulated prescription drugs sold on the street. We should be educating doctors and patients about the risks of substance misuse yet trusting them to make the best decisions about their medical needs.⁸

To improve roads and bridges, Pennsylvania should⁶

- establish stable sources of transportation funding at the federal and state levels. On the federal side, Pennsylvania should advocate for more investment in the Highway Trust Fund and an increase in the federal gas tax which hasn't been updated since 1993. As Act 89 plateaus, Pennsylvania must come up with a funding plan internal to PA.
 - The Pennsylvania State Police should not get a disproportionate amount of appropriations from the Motor License Fee, which they currently do.⁷ The 2016 state fiscal code addressed this issue by capping the portion given to State Police, and then decreasing it over a 10-year period.
 - The motor fuels tax and, in the long term, a usage-based revenue system should remain a significant part of state funding for roads and bridges. As the number of electric cars increases, the gas tax will bring in less and less revenue. A usage-based funding system (based on mileage travelled) is undergoing a pilot test in Pennsylvania and other states. Greater reliance on usage fees needs to be coupled with protection for low-income, rural Pennsylvanians who drive long distances to work.

THE SOLUTION

The We The People campaign proposes three solutions to our unfair and inadequate tax system. Taken together, these proposals will raise \$3.2 billion in fiscal year 2018-19 and \$3.6 billion in fiscal year 2021-22 while reducing taxes for close to 60% of Pennsylvanians, for small businesses, and for Pennsylvania based corporations.

 Our Fair Share Tax increases the tax rate on income from wealth (e.g. dividends, capital gains, business profits, estates, royalties, and gambling winnings) from 3.07% to 6.5% while lowering the tax on wages and interest from 3.07% to 2.8%. The Fair Share Tax would raise an addition \$2.32 billion in the next fiscal year (2019-20) while reducing income taxes for 59% of individuals and small business owners in Pennsylvania. By fiscal year 2021-22, the Fair Share Tax would bring in an additional \$2.63 billion.

- A severance or shale tax on natural gas drilling at the same 5% rate imposed by West Virginia would raise \$567 million in the next fiscal year and \$833 million by fiscal year 2021-22.
- Combined reporting should be instituted for the corporate net income tax to close the Delaware Loophole while reducing the corporate tax rate from 9.99% to 9.49% starting in 2020-21. This would bring in an additional \$332 million in revenue in the next fiscal year and \$254 billion in 2021-22.

 - Fifty-nine percent would come from Pennsylvania households in the top 1% of incomes who have an income above \$569,000 and average income of \$1.5 million. Their taxes would increase by an average of \$24,119, only 1.6% of their average income.
 - Another 25% would come from Pennsylvania households with income in the 95th through 99th percentile with incomes between \$242,000 and \$669,000 and an average income of \$351,000. Their taxes would increase by an average of \$2,571 or 0.7% of their average income.
 - Another 12% would come from Pennsylvania households with incomes in the 80th through 94th percentile with incomes in the range of \$109,000 to \$242,000 and an average income of \$152,000. Their taxes would increase by an average of only \$330 or 0.2% of their average income.
 - Overall, 95% of the increased revenue paid under the Fair Share Tax would come from families in the top 20% of all incomes.

Institute automatic voter registration. Automatic voter registration would use information already on file with the state to identify individuals who are eligible to vote and add them to voter rolls or update voter information automatically when they are already registered. Voters who are automatically registered would have the option of removing themselves from the rolls if they choose.

Allow registration of unregistered voters on Election Day. Election Day and "same-day" registration (SDR) allows voters to register on the day of the election. As of early 2018, 16 states and Washington, D.C. had adopted SDR. To avoid manipulation of primary elections, SDR could be limited to unregistered voters with already registered voters being permitted to switch their party registration only until 30 days before a primary election. Research shows that same-day registration increases turnout by 5% to 7%. Over half of Americans support automatic voter registration (54%) and same-day registration (55%).

Pre-register eligible 16- and 17-year-olds and automatically add them to voter rolls when they turn 18. Pre-registering voters before they turn 18 is a good first step towards educating them on their civic responsibilities. Twelve states and Washington, D.C. pre-register 16-year-olds and another four pre-register 17-year-olds.

Encourage voting with no-fault absentee voting and voting by mail. A recent study found that Utah's experimentation with all-mail voting increased turnout by nearly 5%-7%. Earlier research in Washington state found all-mail voting was associated with 2%-4% increases in turnout. Both studies found that the positive effects of all-mail voting were most pronounced among young voters and those who never or rarely voted.

Not only can the state make it easier for people to register to vote, it can encourage people directly and indirectly to vote.

To reduce the amount of time that people spend in prison we should do the following.

- Embrace sentencing reform. The General Assembly should change the criminal code in the state to reduce maximum sentences, especially for drug offenses.
 - Many lower-level offenses should be reclassified from felonies to misdemeanors.
 - The life without parole sentence is overused in Pennsylvania. It leads to many people who have not taken a life or who, after long years in prison, have repented for their crimes, staying in prison when that serves no useful purpose. Use of this sentence should be reformed and opportunities for parole should be made available to selected inmates.
 - Reduce revocations from supervision for minor parole violations. In 2016, 15% of the prison population was in prison because of a parole violation. The likelihood of recidivism is highest in the first year following incarceration, yet many of those leaving prison have long parole terms and probation sentences. Reforms should focus on capping how much jail time one can receive for minor parole offenses and/ or diversionary treatment for those with drug usage or mental health issues.

Efforts should also be made to reduce racial disparities and the criminalization of the poor. Reducing admissions and time served will decrease the overall prison population in Pennsylvania, but it will not solve the problem of racial disparities within the prison system. Addressing this racial disparity will take comprehensive reform at many levels. We can do several things to reform the criminal justice system and address these racial disparities and the criminalization of the poor.

 End cash bail. The current cash bail system in Pennsylvania keeps primarily poor individuals in jail, sometimes for significant periods of time, despite not yet being convicted of a crime. The PA Supreme Court's Rules Committee has the authority to make this change.

- End over-policing in communities of color.
- End sentencing enhancements that are based on location like drug-free school zones.
- Shift funding from law enforcement/corrections to investment in job creation and training, strong public education, mental health and drug treatment, and other social and human services.¹⁴

The use of private prisons has, in some cases, created corrupt relationships between judges and the owners of prisons that led to horrible abuses, especially of juveniles. Prison privatization should be prohibited in this state.

MUTH OPPOSED A RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING THE LIFE OF KOBE BRYANT FOLLOWING HIS UNTIMELY DEATH

Bryant was charged with rape in 2003 and privately settled a lawsuit with his accuser in 2004. The resolution was introduced by Sen. Daylin Leach (D-Montgomery) who has been accused of workplace harassment and sexual assault himself. After Muth lodged her objection, the resolution was sent to the Senate Rules Committee, where it now awaits a vote. Kocher said the Bryant controversy led Republican leaders to declare an end to unanimous consent resolutions in the Senate. MUTH'S LIBERAL FISCAL AGENDA

Muth has suggested raising corporate and income taxes and imposing a severance tax as a means to achieve property tax relief. Muth has joined a slim minority in opposing multiple bipartisan state budgets that increase education funding in a fiscally responsible way. Muth has supported the protection and expansion of welfare programs and has proposed a \$1 billion student debt relief program.

Muth has called for an increase to the minimum wage and has labeled businesses that could not afford to do so as immoral. Muth has also indicated she supports increasing overtime mandates. Muth has sided with organized labor over the interests of taxpayers. In 2020, Muth supported legislation that "authorizes unionization of waterways conservation officers, thus driving up taxpayer costs and making it harder for the state to dismiss poorly performing employees."

On energy matters, Muth has been a strong advocate for alternative energy and calling for 100% of Pennsylvania energy to come from renewable sources by 2050. Muth has been an opponent of oil and gas development, particularly fracking. Muth has been steadfast in her support for imposing additional regulations on the oil and industry and has earned praise from environmentalists for her anti-growth agenda.

In 2019, Muth voted against legislation that "streamlines government by abolishing eight outdated boards, commissions and committees..." Muth also voted against a bill to "reduce excessive regulations that have prevented individuals from utilizing agricultural buildings" and against a bill "that "expands consumer access to broadband and other telecommunication services by repealing costly regulations..."

Muth was opposed to the ratification of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement.

Both candidates expressed support for the levying of a severance tax on natural gas drillers in Pennsylvania. Our tax policies must be fair to everyone. Pennsylvania's tax system is unfair, putting a greater burden on hardworking people and families. Everyone needs to pay their fair share of taxes and our current tax laws have been designed to unfairly benefit the wealthy few and special interests. The richest individuals and largest companies, in Pennsylvania and across the nation, do not pay anywhere near their fair share in taxes. Pennsylvania's tax system is upside down- the bottom and middle-income earners pay far higher rates than those at the top. Not only is this unfair, but this rigged system results in a major barrier to raising revenues that our Commonwealth desperately needs to close the public investment deficit.

The Fair Share Tax Plan would fix PA's rigged tax system by replacing our personal income tax (PIT) with two separate taxes. The first would be a tax on wages and interest set at 2.8%, which is lower than the current PIT rate of 3.07%. The second would be on a tax on income from wealth-dividends, capital gains, business profits, estates, royalties, and gambling winnings- which would be set at 6.5%. Most of the new tax revenues would come from those at the top of the income distribution with nearly 69% of new revenue coming from the top 1% and would reduce taxes for low- and moderate-income earners. The plan would reduce taxes for 60% of Pennsylvanians, including small businesses, and would not raise taxes on seniors whose retirement incomes will continue to be exempt from PIT. The Fair Share Tax Plan would ensure everyone is paying their fair share and allow for greater investment in our Commonwealth.

Tom Wolf's signature, Pennsylvania will have a \$34 billion budget bill. The state Senate approved a budget bill Thursday that provides hundreds of millions more for schools, makes another investment in school security and provides help to the state's sputtering agricultural industry, all without a tax increase. The Senate voted 42-8 to approve the spending bill; the House passed it by a 140-62 vote Tuesday. The spending package does not include an increase in the state's minimum wage, a key goal for Democrats. The budget increases spending by nearly 4%, or just under \$1.3 billion, over the current year's budget of about \$32.7 billion, and by just 1.8% when the governor's overspending is taken into account. Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Pat Browne, R-Lehigh County, urged support for the budget. He called it a relief to consider a state budget that makes increases in important programs and services after a decade of financial turbulence. While Browne warned that the state's fiscal situation remains tenuous, he said this budget "ensures increased confidence to weather the next storm on the horizon." Senate Democratic Appropriations Committee Chairman Vince Hughes, D-Philadelphia, said he could support the budget despite what he considered missed opportunities. He cited the failure to raise the state's \$7.25 hourly minimum wage. He also disliked the General Assembly's passage of a bill to cut off cash assistance to the state's poorest citizens, a debate that touched off a firestorm in the chamber Wednesday. Senate Majority Chairman Jake Corman, R-Centre County, said, "By and large on this particular budget, I think there's a lot to like because I think what we tried to do is fund what works." Sen. Katie Muth, D-Montgomery County, was among the Democratic senators who opposed the budget. She said, "This budget is not peoplecentered. This budget does not help enough people." "As you may be aware, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently opened the public comment period for proposed changes to Section 5(a) of the SNAP program. These provisions allow individuals who are eligible for or receiving benefits from other assistance programs to qualify for SNAP without having to go through a separate financial eligibility review. Pennsylvania is one of a number of states that uses this provision to make it easier for those who are seeking necessary assistance to ensure they are receiving all the benefits they are entitled to. According to the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, approximately 200,000 individuals and 120,000 households in the Commonwealth will lose benefits if the "categorically" eligible rules are changed. Of those 120,000 households, more than 36% are households with children. Feeding America estimates that more than 1.5 million Pennsylvanians are food insecure. Worse, 1 in 6 of Pennsylvania's children struggles with hunger. These numbers are staggering enough without the addition of 200,000 more who could soon be without SNAP. The current rules allow those food insecure individuals who are single parents, disabled veterans, victims of domestic violence and individuals with a disability to receive vital benefits that allow them to put a healthy, fresh meal on their table. More alarming is the effect this rule change could have on free or reduced food programs for K through 12 schools. Across the nation, 29.7 million children receive a free or reduced meal at school. In Pennsylvania more than 167 million free or reduced lunches were provided during the last school year. These meals ensure that a child, who may not get a fresh meal at home, is able to eat at least one - but often two - meals a day. SNAP is an economic support for our already struggling food and supermarket retailers, especially those in brick and mortar locations, whose businesses operate on a very thin margin, and are further challenged by the growing on-line food delivery business. This proposal on SNAP eligibility is heartless, callous, and Pennsylvanians cannot afford it. Pennsylvanians living at or near poverty recently lost the state's General Assistance program; and it has been a decade since Pennsylvania has seen a minimum wage increase. Now, the federal government is threatening to cut food assistance. We cannot continue to eliminate safety nets and the programs that move people toward self sufficiency after they have fallen on difficult times. Societies are judged by how they treat their most vulnerable; if we let this change to SNAP go unchallenged, we will fail that judgement. Our caucus will oppose the rule change in every way that we are able, and we ask that our federal representatives join us. We, and our constituents, thank you for the advocacy you have already undertaken. We look forward to fighting with you, on behalf of those who need it most." The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission estimates additional revenues of \$1.46 million in FY 2021-22, \$2.23 million in FY 2022-23, \$2.98 million in FY 2023-24 and \$3.71 million in FY 2024-25 if all the proposed increases are implemented. The actual revenue impact may vary from estimate since commission revenues have decreased 7.6 percent to 9.6 percent in years when fees are increased.

This would be achieved by slicing more than 2% off the blended federal loan repayment rate of 6.25%. The savings would be more pronounced for students who financed their education through private lenders. These students, who carry an average of \$50,000 in debt and a 10% interest rate (the current average private lending rate), would save more than \$43,000 from refinancing under the bill. There are other features. The plan includes a potential \$500 per year tax credit against personal income tax liability. The program would make up to \$10 million in tax credits available. Employers also have a role to play. To retain valuable, educated staff, employers could make contributions into a 529 account and have these contributions credited toward reducing student debt. The program would also open the possibility for employees to deploy the cash equivalent of unused carryover days to retire student debt. A final feature would boost transparency and open additional tracts of financial data to students to better understand the cost of higher education. The plan would mandate that colleges provide students with an upfront estimated cost of a four-year degree. 

"Finally they claim that somehow they DRBC is usurping their power to legislate in Pennsylvania, taking away the sovereignty of the state. That does not make sense as an argument," said Miano. "All the states, as part of the compact, voted for the fracking ban so we're not quite sure how the DRBC is usurping the power of the states." Five million Pennsylvanians across 17 counties reside in the Basin, which includes Bucks, Delaware, Montgomery, Chester and Philadelphia counties. The Delaware River Basin spans 6,471 square miles in the Commonwealth, across 522 municipalities. Tuesday introduced eight bills designed to increase restrictions on natural gas drilling and hydraulic fracturing in the commonwealth, taking up most of the recommendations of last year's investigating grand jury. The grand jury led to criminal complaints against a handful of natural gas producers, but in bringing the report to light last fall, Attorney General Josh Shapiro highlighted the steps that the Legislature should take to bring Pennsylvania's environmental laws up to the grand jury's recommendations. While the grand jury's report had little impact in the GOP-controlled Legislature, Tuesday's news conference and the bills themselves sought to put limits onto natural gas industry onto the agenda in Harrisburg. The bills would• setbacks from natural gas well sites from 500 feet now to 2,500 feet normally and 5,000 feet from schools, hospitals and reservoirs • encompass all air pollution when determining air quality at a drilling site • give the Office of Attorney General the ability to directly prosecute environmental crimes, something it doesn't have at the moment • more strictly regulate the transportation of hydraulic fracturing waste •prohibit Department of Environmental Protection officials from leaving the DEP and going to the private sector immediately • Studying the health of people who live near natural gas drilling sites • Require the disclosure of chemicals used for drilling and hydraulic fracturing State Sen. Steven J. Santarsiero, D-Bucks, said during a news conference Tuesday that the proposed legislation would work to address the grand jury's issues as well as the fallout from Act 13, a sweeping law for the natural gas industry that was passed in 2012. "Many of us saw that as an overreach on the part of the industry and not something that actually protected the public and protected the environment," Santarsiero said. Shapiro said the legislation would help ensure Pennsylvanians' rights to clean air and water; he said there was a gap between the 50-year-old law and reality when it came to natural gas drilling and hydraulic fracturing. "For far too long, fracking companies and regulators turned a blind eye to the health and safety impact of this industry," Shapiro said. Another co-sponsor, state Sen. Katie Muth, D-Berks, said that more attention and regulations needed to be taken when it came to the transportation of hydraulic fracturing waste, including more labeling. "Currently, you could be driving around the highway and be next to something that is full of radioactive waste and not have a clue," Muth said." (Pittsburgh Business Times, 5/25/21)

Businesses must spend at least \$450 million building a new facility that will create at least 800 jobs to qualify for the 30-year program. The governor said, however, he will veto the plan because he thinks tax breaks should be provided to economic development projects on a case-by-case basis. "We've taken too many hits and if you're going to veto this one, we are going to work like you've never seen us work before to gather up the votes to override that veto," Rep. Gerald Mullery, D-Luzerne, said during a rally for the bill in Harrisburg on Monday. "Because we need those jobs." The House voted 157-35 in favor of the plan on Feb. 4, just hours after the Senate approved the bill 39-11. "Keep this in mind," House Speaker Mike Turzai, R-Allegheny,

said. "These are veto proof numbers." Legislators must whip up two-thirds of each chamber – 136 votes in the House and 34 in the Senate – in order to successfully override the governor's expected veto. For some Democrats, however, the natural gas industry's impact on the environment trumps HB 1100's purported economic benefits. "I'm eager to work on a bill that actually prioritizes the economic sustainability and health and well-being of both the public workers and the environment and House Bill 1100 is not that bill," said Rep. Katie Muth, D-Montgomery, at a competing rally protesting the plan. "We can have jobs we can have economic security without sacrificing our land, our water and our health." Muth Is Known To Be Critical Of The Continued Development Of The Mariner East Pipeline. 'State Sen. Katie Muth, a Democrat who represents parts of Chester and Montgomery counties, said she's "infuriated" by the new permits allowing construction at Marsh Creek. "I think it should be completely stopped until they have actually tested the public and private water supplies all along [the pipeline route]," she said. "No one has done that. This project was flawed from the beginning." Muth said she's already received calls from constituents worried about how the current construction could affect groundwater and drinking water supplies, and whether neighboring backyards will once again be flooded. Residents worry that because Energy Transfer has to renew all its original permits in February, the company will rush this last section. "They are pushing forward really fast," said Christina "PK" DiGiulio, who lives by Marsh Creek and uses drones to document construction. "It's been a reckless process. This is the DEP enabling a criminal entity to push their pipe through without doing proper groundwater impact studies and protecting the health and safety of the people." Muth said that while there are no statutes that prevent companies facing criminal charges from continuing construction, the Department of Environmental Protection can pull permits. "DEP does have the legal authority to revoke or deny any permit for any operator that has a history of repeat violations," said Muth. "So [DEP] doesn't use its authority. ANALYSIS: This legislation proposes three separate amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania as follows:

<u>Article I:</u> This resolution adds a new section that would prohibit denying or abridging equality of rights under the law in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania because of the race or ethnicity of an individual.

<u>Section 9 of Article III:</u> This resolution would add a provision allowing for non-presentment to the governor of a Joint Resolution terminating or extending a declaration of disaster emergency.

Article IV: This resolution adds a new section that would authorize the Governor to issue emergency declarations under circumstances provided for by law for that purpose. The General Assembly could by law grant the Governor certain enumerated powers to address and abate the declared emergency. However, a declaration by the Governor of an emergency could not last longer than 21 days unless extended by a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly approving the continuation of the declaration. Upon the expiration of the Governor's emergency declaration, the Governor could not declare a new state of emergency based upon the same or substantially similar facts and circumstances without the passage of a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly expressly approving the new emergency declaration.

DESCRIPTION

House Bill 2412 amends the Administrative Code to add a new article relating to Emergency COVID-19 provisions regarding issuance of waiver to the Governor's Business Closure Order for legal services, residential and commercial real estate related activities.

The legislation requires the Secretary of Community and Economic Development to immediately issue a waiver to the Governor's Business Closure Order to all providers of legal services, and residential and commercial real estate services, including settlement services.

Until the Governor's March 6, 2020, proclamation of disaster emergency, and any renewal of the state of disaster emergency, is terminated or expires:

- A municipality or municipal authority that requires a use and occupancy certificate, or any other similar certificate or certification as a condition of a property transfer, shall be presumed to have issued a full and unconditional permit without requiring an inspection of the property. If a certificate is presumed to be issued, the municipality or municipal authority shall be enjoined from conducting a property transfer inspection after the proclamation has terminated or expired; and
- Taxing authorities and public utilities shall provide alternative means for residential home buyers or title insurers to ascertain the current status of tax payments or overdue utility obligations.

All businesses issued a waiver must comply with social distancing practices and other mitigation measures defined by the Centers for Disease Control and the order issued by the Secretary of Health directing public health safety measures for businesses permitted to maintain in-person operations.

In 2021, Muth participated in a rally in support of abortion rights and was among the speakers to criticize the Texas heartbeat abortion law. Just recently, Muth held a pro-abortion rally to express her opposition to overturning Roe V. Wade.

Muth is opposed to efforts to ban transgender persons from participating in women's sports. Additionally, Muth was among the state Senators to back a proposed reform to remove sex from birth certificates in order to better accommodate transgender individuals.

Muth has expressed support for additional gun control measures and more intensive licensing and oversight.

Muth introduced legislation to end the death penalty in Pennsylvania. Muth was among the legislators to call for the release of medically vulnerable prisoners. Muth has claimed revoking a person's probation due to failure to pay restitution costs amounted to criminalizing poverty. Finally, Muth supports ending no-knock warrants.

Muth has opposed legislative efforts to expand school choice and has opposed legislative efforts to improve safety in schools.

"Putting them on course for a guaranteed gubernatorial veto, a state Senate committee voted on party lines Monday to advance a pair of bills imposing new restrictions on a person's right to access abortion, including a hotly debated measure banning the procedure based on a prenatal diagnosis of Down syndrome. The 7-4 votes by the Senate Health and Human Services Committee came at the beginning of what is expected to be one of the Republican-controlled chamber's busiest session weeks in recent memory. It also comes just two months before the start of a 2020 campaign season in which Democrats hope to close the GOP's 27-22 margin by using such culture war measures against them in vulnerable districts in the Philadelphia suburbs. The Down syndrome proposal, sponsored by Rep. Kate Klunk, R-York, provoked the most impassioned debate during the hour-long meeting. Klunk's bill, which cleared the House in May, would expand the state's existing Abortion Control Act to add the genetic

"Last month, a federal appeals court in Cincinnati blocked Ohio's version of the bill, with a judge concluding that it was invalid under "Supreme Court precedents because it had the purpose and effect of preventing some women from obtaining pre-viability abortions," Reuters reported. Under Roe v. Wade, a woman can obtain an abortion for any reason until the 24th week of gestation. Doctors violating the Ohio ban could have up to 18 months in jail, Reuters reported. The Senate panel also advanced legislation, sponsored by Rep. Kathy Rapp, R-Warren, one of that chamber's most vocal abortion opponents, that would provide perinatal hospice care to women whose fetuses are diagnosed with a "life-limiting condition." "This bill helps mothers and fathers through a difficult situation," said the Senate committee's chairwoman, Sen. Michele Brooks, R-Mercer. "I see this as step forward in a difficult situation." Sen. Katie Muth, D-Montgomery, a "no" vote on both measures, said she didn't oppose counseling parents on their options. But, she noted, Rapp's bill left abortion off the list of options. "It does not include information on safe and legal abortion," which some women might decide is the right choice for them, Muth said. "This would intrude on the doctor/patient relationship. Subject: Down Syndrome Protection Legislation

We plan to re-introduce legislation amending the Abortion Control Act to prohibit the abortion of any child solely due to a diagnosis of possible Down Syndrome. Last session, this legislation passed the House with a bipartisan vote of 139-56.

Under current law, a woman can obtain an abortion prior to 24 weeks gestational age for any reason if a physician deems it is necessary, except if the woman's sole reason is to select the sex of the child. This bill will expand that exception to prohibit aborting the child solely due to a prenatal diagnosis that the unborn child has Down Syndrome. Nothing in this proposal would interfere with the existing ability of a woman to obtain an abortion in cases of rape, incest or endangerment to the mother, which are contained in different sections of the Abortion Control Act.

It passed through the committee Tuesday morning in a 15-9 vote. The bill was first introduced last April [3] by state Rep. Barbara Gleim, R-Cumberland. Gleim was joined on the bill by Reps. Martina White, R-Philadelphia; Dawn Keefer, R-York; Valerie Gaydos, R-Allegheny and Stephanie Borowicz, R-Clinton. Speaking to the committee, Gleim said the bill to exclude transgender athletes 'preserves fairness for all women.' 'Identities don't play sports, bodies do,' Gleim said, repeatedly misgendering[4] University of Pennsylvania swimmer and Division I national champion[5] Lia Thomas in her testimony. The panel's ranking Democrat, Rep. Mark Longietti, of Mercer County, questioned whether the decision would be better left up to the governing bodies of high school and collegiate sports in the commonwealth - the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA) and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). 'Let's not become the school sports eligibility committee,' Longietti said. Rep. MaryLouise Isaacson, D-Philadelphia, echoed Longietti's comments about the committee's role in the decision: 'There are governing bodies over high school and collegiate sports. We are not one of them,' she said. Rep. Napoleon Nelson, D-Montgomery, said that he was 'dumbfounded' that the committee was considering advancing the bill after a September 2021 hearing suggested that this bill 'is not yet ready.' The General Assembly's LGBTQ+ Equality Caucus called the bill 'dangerous,' in a statement following the vote. 'Once again, the majority party is wasting taxpayer money by bringing up divisive and hateful legislation that pushes a harmful narrative instead of addressing legislation that could help expand educational resources and protections for all students,' state Sen. Katie Muth, D-Berks, co-chair of the LGBTQ+ Caucus said. 'This bill is an ignorant attempt to fix a problem that doesn't exist. If the majority's intent is to give women a level playing field, we should address the inequities in funding, resources, media coverage and pay in women's sports.' Juneteenth commemorates a historic time in black history when emancipation finally reached enslaved people in the deepest parts of the former Confederacy. Often referred to as a holiday to celebrate the end of slavery in the United States, it's important to discuss the history. As the Civil War neared it's end, and over two years after the Emancipation Proclamation executive order, slavery continued on, especially in areas where the Union army did not have a strong presence or in remote areas, in places like in Texas and nearby areas of the southwest. On June 19, 1865, when Union general Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, he issued an order and read a proclamation that all enslaved people in Texas were to be set free. The Juneteenth holiday is meant to commemorate the emancipation of over 4 million slaves, particularly those who were not yet aware that emancipation had actually been declared over two years ago. 155 years have passed since then, and black people in our country are still battling for their freedom. In many ways, Juneteenth is symbolic of delayed freedom, both in 1865, and in 2020, freedom is still

Juneteenth is not a nationally recognized holiday (but absolutely should be). The history of Juneteenth is not taught in most history curriculums, especially in K-12 education, resulting in people not learning about this day until adulthood. This is an example of how our education system has been conditioned to overlook and leave out black history, sending a message of that black history is not valued or important. Our country's history is tied up in and interconnected to slavery. Learning the history is an important step but in order for us, as a nation, to end systemic racism and oppression, we have to understand the legacy of slavery and the trauma caused by slavery, and how this legacy resulted in massive amounts of wealth for white Americans. Narratives used to justify slavery are connected to the harmful narratives still used today to oppress black people. Our nation will never be united unless we acknowledge and learn from the 250+ years of slavery, and all of the harms it caused then and still perpetuates today. This will require white people to try and look at history through the eyes of those that were enslaved and those that are still oppressed today. If we, white people, do this long overdue work, our power and privilege would finally bring about the change needed to ensure that freedom is finally a reality for black Americans. This work starts with not just marching and rallies, it starts with open minds and hearts, and the will to succeed fueled by knowing that there's no other way to make change than through daily action of our own collective power. We must demand massive investments in education, healthcare, affordable housing, paid leave, living wage, meaningful work, criminal justice reform, restructuring of our policing system and ending police brutality, a fair court system, and ending poverty and all forms of inequities.

Katie Muth, a Democrat from the Philadelphia suburbs who was first elected in the "blue wave" of 2018, said she voted against the bill, in part, because she sees it as endorsing the criminalization of poverty. Though SB 913 would prevent someone's probation from being revoked because they can't pay a fine or court costs — probation itself costs a person between \$25 and \$75 a month, depending on the county — it would not do so for restitution. Under the bill, a person who has paid half their debt to a victim or business and otherwise qualifies for early termination would be placed into a new "administrative probation" with reduced reporting requirements. They would be required to continue making payments on a schedule they "can afford to pay," but public defenders have complained that judges rarely examine bank records and other financial obligations before deciding whether a person isn't making good on their restitution due to obstinance or hardship. "I'll be blunt," Muth said in an interview. "I work with people — probably the majority of the people in the Senate — who have never had to live paycheck to paycheck or pay student loan bills." Most also have no idea what it means to be on probation. If they did, Muth argued, the bill might have addressed what she sees as the most glaring flaws in the system: the uncapped length of probation, the indefinite extensions of state supervision, and the "detainers" that allow people in her district to be held for months before they have a hearing on their alleged technical violation. It also does nothing to curtail what constitutes a technical violation, which she sees as setting a trap for those on probation, triggering the cycle of poverty and incarceration. Whether it's 70 days waiting for a hearing or less than a week, any time in jail is enough to lose a job — detention itself is a traumatic experience that, depending on the mood of a probation officer or the policy of their office, can be prompted by the mundane. "It's a whole ordeal, just to live your basic life," she said in an interview. "Like calling 911. What are you supposed to tell them? 'Please take me to a hospital in the county because, like, I'm going to get a technical violation?" In 2018, just under 11% of Pennsylvanians under supervision had their probation revoked, the majority for technical violations. To Muth and other critics of the supervision status quo, that represents thousands of lives disrupted by a system of arbitrary and arbitrarily enforced tripwires, leading to people being removed from their family and friends, at least temporarily, for behavior that isn't criminal. It is, among other things, an inefficient use of limited resources. From the perspective of a fiscal conservative, it makes no sense to monitor and repeatedly incarcerate someone when it would be cheaper and more effective to treat their underlying problems, be they economic, social, or behavioral. In Philadelphia, a 2019 report prepared for the city found it costs more than \$48,000 a year, on average, to house an inmate. "How the fuck do you justify that? Juneteenth commemorates a historic time in black history when emancipation finally reached enslaved people in the deepest parts of the former Confederacy. Often referred to as a holiday to celebrate the end of slavery in the United States, it's important to discuss the history. As the Civil War neared it's end, and over two years after the Emancipation Proclamation executive order, slavery continued on, especially in areas where the Union army did not have a strong presence or in remote areas, in places like in Texas and nearby areas of the southwest. On June 19, 1865, when Union general Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, he issued an order and read a proclamation that all enslaved people in Texas were to be set free. The Juneteenth holiday is meant to commemorate the emancipation of over 4 million slaves, particularly those who were not yet aware that emancipation had actually been declared over two years ago. 155 years have passed since then, and black people in our country are still battling for their freedom. In many ways, Juneteenth is symbolic of delayed freedom, both in 1865, and in 2020, freedom is still delayed.

Juneteenth is not a nationally recognized holiday (but absolutely should be). The history of Juneteenth is not taught in most history curriculums, especially in K-12 education, resulting in people not learning about this day until adulthood. This is an example of how our education system has been conditioned to overlook and leave out black history, sending a message of that black history is not valued or important. Our country's history is tied up in and interconnected to slavery. Learning the history is an important step but in order for us, as a nation, to end systemic racism and oppression, we have to understand the legacy of slavery and the trauma caused by slavery, and how this legacy resulted in massive amounts of wealth for white Americans. Narratives used to justify slavery are connected to the harmful narratives still used today to oppress black people. Our nation will never be united unless we acknowledge and learn from the 250+ years of slavery, and all of the harms it caused then and still perpetuates today. This will require white people to try and look at history through the eyes of those that were enslaved and those that are still oppressed today. If we, white people, do this long overdue work, our power and privilege would finally bring about the change needed to ensure that freedom is finally a reality for black Americans. This work starts with not just marching and rallies, it starts with open minds and hearts, and the will to succeed fueled by knowing that there's no other way to make change than through daily action of our own collective power. We must demand massive investments in education, healthcare, affordable housing, paid leave, living wage, meaningful work, criminal justice reform, restructuring of our policing system and ending police brutality, a fair court system, and ending poverty and all forms of inequities.



"It's a law, essentially, which would prohibit police from using no-knock warrants — which, of course, led to Breonna [Taylor's] death in Kentucky a little over a year ago," Kearney said. Taylor was killed by plainclothes police officers in her Louisville apartment as they were executing a no-knock warrant, a search warrant that allows police to enter spaces without announcing themselves. If passed, Senate Bill 296 would require law enforcement to knock and make themselves known when serving a warrant. In addition, officers would have to wear body cameras and clothing that identifies them as law enforcement. Kearney, a Democrat, introduced the bill last year, but the Republican leadership in the Senate did not give it a vote. "And so, this year, when we reintroduced it, we're making more of an effort to reach out to some of our Republican colleagues to co-sponsor — which, as of yet hasn't happened, but we're still trying," Kearney said. So far, the bill has seven Senate co-sponsors, including Philadelphia-area Democrats Amanda Cappelletti, Maria Collett, Katie Muth, and Vincent Hughes. In 2018, Muth Suggested Raising Corporate And Income Taxes And Imposing A Severance Tax As A Means To Achieve Property Tax Relief. "In response to a question about supporting the abolition of the property tax and how it could be accomplished, Muth suggested two approaches including "taxing wealthy corporations and closing the Delaware loophole, in order to make sure that they pay their fair share," and "to charge a severance tax on the oil and gas industry." Rafferty responded, "By driving dollars from increases in state budget revenue, fair funding formula and monies from having enacted a severance tax." Both candidates expressed support for the levying of a severance tax on natural gas drillers in Pennsylvania. In response to a question about support of the Pennsylvania Fair Funding Formula for Education, Rafferty stated that he supports the formula and that he believes it is being funded adequately. Our tax policies must be fair to everyone. Pennsylvania's tax system is unfair, putting a greater burden on hardworking people and families. Everyone needs to pay their fair share of taxes and our current tax laws have been designed to unfairly benefit the wealthy few and special interests. The richest individuals and largest companies, in Pennsylvania and across the nation, do not pay anywhere near their fair share in taxes. Pennsylvania's tax system is upside down-the bottom and middle-income earners pay far higher rates than those at the top. Not only is this unfair, but this rigged system results in a major barrier to raising revenues that our Commonwealth desperately needs to close the public investment deficit.

The Fair Share Tax Plan would fix PA's rigged tax system by replacing our personal income tax (PIT) with two separate taxes. The first would be a tax on wages and interest set at 2.8%, which is lower than the current PIT rate of 3.07%. The second would be on a tax on income from wealth-dividends, capital gains, business profits, estates, royalties, and gambling winnings- which would be set at 6.5%. Most of the new tax revenues would come from those at the top of the income distribution with nearly 69% of new revenue coming from the top 1% and would reduce taxes for low- and moderate-income earners. The plan would reduce taxes for 60% of Pennsylvanians, including small businesses, and would not raise taxes on seniors whose retirement incomes will continue to be exempt from PIT. The Fair Share Tax Plan would ensure everyone is paying their fair share and allow for greater investment in our Commonwealth.

FISCAL IMPACT:

While enactment of this legislation does not require the commission to increase fees and only gives them the authority to do so, according to the commission, if this legislation is enacted, it will seek fee increases over three years for amounts no higher than what is illustrated in the chart below.

The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission estimates additional revenues of \$1.46 million in FY 2021-22, \$2.23 million in FY 2022-23, \$2.98 million in FY 2023-24 and \$3.71 million in FY 2024-25 if all the proposed increases are implemented. The actual revenue impact may vary from estimate since commission revenues have decreased 7.6 percent to 9.6 percent in years when fees are increased.

2019 State Budget

In June 2019, Muth Opposed Passage Of The 2019 Pennsylvania State Budget Despite Its Increase Of Education Funding. Investment In School Security, And Agricultural Supports. "With Gov. Tom Wolf's signature, Pennsylvania will have a \$34 billion budget bill. The state Senate approved a budget bill Thursday that provides hundreds of millions more for

schools, makes another investment in school security and provides help to the state's sputtering agricultural industry, all without a tax increase. The Senate voted 42-8 to approve the spending bill; the House passed it by a 140-62 vote Tuesday. The spending package does not include an increase in the state's minimum wage, a key goal for Democrats. The budget increases spending by nearly 4%, or just under \$1.3 billion, over the current year's budget of about \$32.7 billion, and by just 1.8% when the governor's overspending is taken into account. Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Pat Browne, R-Lehigh County, urged support for the budget. He called it a relief to consider a state budget that makes increases in important programs and services after a decade of financial turbulence. While Browne warned that the state's fiscal situation remains tenuous, he said this budget "ensures increased confidence to weather the next storm on the horizon." Senate Democratic Appropriations Committee Chairman Vince Hughes, D-Philadelphia, said he could support the budget despite what he considered missed opportunities. He cited the failure to raise the state's \$7.25 hourly minimum wage. He also disliked the General Assembly's passage of a bill to cut off cash assistance to the state's poorest citizens, a debate that touched off a firestorm in the chamber Wednesday. Senate Majority Chairman Jake Corman, R-Centre County, said, "By and large on this particular budget, I think there's a lot to like because I think what we tried to do is fund what works." Sen. Katie Muth, D-Montgomery County, was among the Democratic senators who opposed the budget. She said, "This budget is not peoplecentered. This budget does not help enough people." 2021 State Budget

In June 2021, Muth Was Critical Of The 2021 Bipartisan State Budget, Which Set Aside Billions In Federal COVID Relief Funds Into Savings, Bolstered Spending On Education And Provided Aid To Personal Care Homes. 'The Pennsylvania General Assembly passed a \$40.8 billion state budget Friday that sets aside billions in federal coronavirus relief funds into savings, bolsters spending on education and provides aid to personal care homes. Gov. Tom Wolf's office said he plans to sign it this week. The budget passed the House by a 140-61 vote, and the Senate approved it by a 43-7 vote. The budget calls for no increase in personal or business taxes. Members of the General Assembly who represent Berks County shared their views with the Reading Eagle on the spending plan: Sen. David Argall, a Schuylkill County Republican "The Senate, on a strong bipartisan vote, made it abundantly clear that our focus should be on funding public and private education, broadband and transportation needs — and that's exactly what we did. "We allocated money to provide additional support for schools, nursing homes, roads and bridges. The best part: We did not need to incorporate a massive tax hike as the governor originally suggested. We even have a sizable revenue surplus which we stowed away in our Rainy Day Fund to prevent future tax hikes. "Not everything in this budget was 100% perfect, but I think we can all be proud of this bipartisan budget which will help Pennsylvanians get back on their feet without weighing them down with more taxes." Sen. Bob Mensch, a Montgomery County Republican "It's a very good budget. We've increased education to record highs, we've restored Wolf's cuts to agriculture and health care, we've provided additional funds for infrastructure, we've eliminated the possibility of tax increases. So I'm not sure there is a bad aspect of this budget. "A budget is always about compromise. If I had my way I would have liked to see more done to help spur job creation. We did have some tax ideas for businesses that, unfortunately, did not make it into the plan. But that's a battle for another day.

As for the amount of money we were able to put into the Rainy Day Fund, we have prepared ourselves very well for the continuing economic issues. There's no doubt that once all these federal dollars disappear that we will be left back to our own devices, so having a couple billion dollars set aside to offset that is going to bring a lot of relief for taxpayers." Sen. Katie Muth, a Montgomery County Democrat "While there are some high points and key investments in this year's budget, overall the plan falls far short and fails to invest in our state and the people of the commonwealth. General Assistance

In July 2019, Williams And Muth Were Among The Democratic Legislators To Criticize The Elimination Of The General Assistance Program And To Call For The Creation Of An Emergency Cash Aid Program. "The Pennsylvania Senate Democrats issued the following news release: Following the elimination of General Assistance, several members of the Pennsylvania Senate Democratic Caucus circulated a cosponsorship memo to create an emergency relief program that would serve the population now without cash assistance. Senators Katie Muth, Lindsey Williams, Maria Collett and Pam Iovino circulated the memo with their Senate colleagues late Monday, asking for others to join in sponsoring the legislation. "We have to find a way to provide this relief, we have a duty to protect the most vulnerable citizens of this commonwealth and if we aren't doing that, then we are failing miserably," said Senator Katie Muth. "If we don't get this right, the most vulnerable people of our commonwealth will be left out to dry with no means to the very basic necessities of life, which every human should have access to." "As the wife of a chronic cancer sufferer, I am acutely aware that my family is never more than one emergency away from being unable to pay for the medicine that keeps my husband alive," said Senator Maria Collett. "This program will be a lifeline for people with disabilities, domestic violence survivors and others in crisis." • In June 2019, Muth Was Among The Democratic Senators To Argue Vocally Against Elimination Of The General Assistance Program. "Pennsylvania's \$40 million General Assistance program is small compared to the scale of other parts of the state's safety net for the needy. But its advocates say the \$200 monthly cash stipends for

adults, many of them disabled, helps them pay for transportation and basic living necessities not covered by other social programs. For a few brief moments, Senate President Pro Tempore Joe Scarnati (R., Jefferson) took over the rostrum in the chamber, where Lt. Gov. John Fetterman normally presides. Fetterman, a Democrat, had briefly walked down to the floor, where senators were shouting, in an effort to broker peace; in his absence, Scarnati picked up the gavel and, with a procedural vote, shut down any possibility of altering the bill. "He started throwing a fit and came up to the rostrum," Fetterman said of Scarnati, adding that Republicans "invoked the nuclear option." Democratic senators promptly walked off the floor, and when they returned, Republicans voted in near-lockstep to eliminate the program. That again set off a screaming match, with Democratic Sen. Katie Muth of Montgomery County trying to argue against the bill as multiple Republican senators shouted at Fetterman to stop her." (*Philly.com*, 6/26/19)

TANF

In August 2021, Muth Noted Her Intention To Introduce Legislation Amplifying TANF Benefits. "Advocates also highlighted the racial gaps, noting that more than half of TANF recipients are Black, as compared to 12% of the overall Pennsylvania population. With poverty disproportionately affecting Black and Latino youth, any changes to TANF also have the potential to help these children, argued the report's authors. To change the way the state administers cash assistance requires legislation, something that has not happened in decades. "I think one of the reasons the benefit hasn't changed in 30 years is because the legislature doesn't vote on it every year," said Pulzetti. "I don't think they even see it." That could change in 2021. Democratic State Sen. Katie Muth and Democratic State Rep. Malcom Kenyatta have both released memorandums saying they plan to introduce legislation to update TANF "in order to meet basic and essential needs" of recipients." SNAP

In July 2019, Muth Was Among The Democratic Senators To Express Opposition To The USDA's Reform Of SNAP Eligibility Rules. "As you may be aware, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently opened the public comment period for proposed changes to Section 5(a) of the SNAP program. These provisions allow individuals who are eligible for or receiving benefits from other assistance programs to qualify for SNAP without having to go through a separate financial eligibility review. Pennsylvania is one of a number of states that uses this provision to make it easier for those who are seeking necessary assistance to ensure they are receiving all the benefits they are entitled to. According to the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, approximately 200,000 individuals and 120,000 households in the Commonwealth will lose benefits if the "categorically" eligible rules are changed. Of those 120,000 households, more than 36% are households with children. Feeding America estimates that more than 1.5 million Pennsylvanians are food insecure. Worse, 1 in 6 of Pennsylvania's children struggles with hunger. These numbers are staggering enough without the addition of 200,000 more who could soon be without SNAP. The current rules allow those food insecure individuals who are single parents, disabled veterans, victims of domestic violence and individuals with a disability to receive vital benefits that allow them to put a healthy, fresh meal on their table. More alarming is the effect this rule change could have on free or reduced food

programs for K through 12 schools. Across the nation, 29.7 million children receive a free or reduced meal at school. In Pennsylvania more than 167 million free or reduced lunches were provided during the last school year. These meals ensure that a child, who may not get a fresh meal at home, is able to eat at least one - but often two - meals a day. SNAP is an economic support for our already struggling food and supermarket retailers, especially those in brick and mortar locations, whose businesses operate on a very thin margin, and are further challenged by the growing on-line food delivery business. This proposal on SNAP eligibility is heartless, callous, and Pennsylvanians cannot afford it. Pennsylvanians living at or near poverty recently lost the state's General Assistance program; and it has been a decade since Pennsylvania has seen a minimum wage increase. Now, the federal government is threatening to cut food assistance. We cannot continue to eliminate safety nets and the programs that move people toward self sufficiency after they have fallen on difficult times. Societies are judged by how they treat their most vulnerable; if we let this change to SNAP go unchallenged, we will fail that judgement. Our caucus will oppose the rule change in every way that we are able, and we ask that our federal representatives join us. We, and our constituents, thank you for the advocacy you have already undertaken. We look forward to fighting with you, on behalf of those who need it most." USMCA

In 2019, Williams And Muth Were Among The Democratic Senators To Vote In Committee Against A Resolution Urging Passage Of The USMCA. "The Pennsylvania Senate State Government Committee advanced a resolution by a vote of 7-4 along party lines encouraging Congress to approve the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement. Democrats Anthony Williams, Maria Collett, Katie Muth and Lindsey Williams voted no last week to Senate Resolution 153 sponsored by Sen. Kristin Phillips-Hill, R-York. "Until those changes relative to ensuring labor standards, certain environmental provisions as well as enforcement of the deal itself. ... I will be a 'no' vote," Muth said. Sen. Doug Mastriano, R-Franklin County, countered Muth's statements with support of the bill. "Once it passes, I believe we'll see a boom for our industry and agriculture here across Pennsylvania and then maybe once again Pennsylvania will be open for business." Congress is still ironing out details with the Trump administration on the deal, which would replace the North American Free Trade Act." (*The Daily American*, 11/4/19)

Minimum Wage

In 2019, Speaking In Support Of Increased State Minimum Wage, Muth "Said She Has No Patience For Business Owners Who Claim Raising The Minimum Wage Would Put Them Out Of Business" And Claimed "If Your Business Relies On Paying People Crap Wages

Then Yours Is Not A Moral Business." 

Rafferty: Yes, the state Legislature can help drive job creation through tax incentives for business and economic development for public works projects. For example, I was the prime sponsor of Act 89, which passed in 2013 and has created thousands of public sector jobs since its implementation. Muth: There are a number of things that we can do to spur job growth. I am passionate about clean and renewable energy jobs that pay more on average than the national median. The Pennsylvania Legislature should back policies that grow our clean energy sector, which can help reduce unemployment, lower power plant emissions and improve public health." In May 2019, Muth Co-Sponsored Legislation Requiring Pennsylvania To Obtain 100 Percent Of Its Energy From Renewables By 2050. "A bipartisan group of 88 Republican and Democratic Pennsylvania state legislators yesterday announced the re-introduction of legislation in the General Assembly that would require Pennsylvania to get 100 percent of its energy from renewable sources by 2050. State Rep. Chris Rabb (Philadelphia) introduced the House bill (HB 1425), which was also proposed in last year's session. The Senate version of this legislation (SB630), sponsored by State Sen. Tom Killion (Chester & Delaware County), was first introduced last year by now-retired Republican senator Charles McIlhinney (Bucks County). This effort is the first 100 percent renewable energy legislation in the nation where the lead sponsors have been Republicans. "The vast majority of scientists agree that climate change is real," said Rabb. "And you don't have to be a scientist to notice its effects, which have been caused by human activity. By resorting to 100 percent renewable energy in the commonwealth, we can help to slow this change or face the on-going irreparable damage and its detrimental consequences." Many Chester County legislators are co-sponsors of the legislation, including: Senators Andrew Dinniman (SD 19), Tim Kearney (SD 26), and Katie Muth (SD 44), as well as Representatives Dan Williams (HD 74), Danielle Friel Otten (HD 155), Carolyn Comitta (HD 156), Melissa Shusterman (HD 157), Christina Sappey (HD 158), Stephen Barrar (HD 160), and Kristine Howard (HD 167)." Both senators opposed fracking and favored using less fossil fuel energy, and favored expanded Medicare for all Pennsylvanians, access to better education, and early and other forms of expanded voting." In 2021, Muth Was Among The Democrats To Oppose Republican Efforts To Overturn A Fracking Ban Imposed By The Delaware River Basin Commission. "According to Miano, the Caucus argues in its suit that the Republican Senators do not have standing under the Constitution to bring the claims. "They claim, as individual senators, they have rights to make these claims, but case law and statutes are very clear that they don't have standing to bring the case. The same group tried to intervene in another case about fracking and there the district court ruled that they did not have standing. On appeal, the senators withdrew their case.

"Substantively, we don't believe the Republican Senators or Damascus Township have any claims of taking," added Miano. "The way the law looks at taking is very individualized and has to be facts dependent. What the Republican Senators are asking the courts to do is declare the whole rubric is a taking. In order to win on a takings case you have to show you've been impaired in a very specific way. We don't believe they have any ability to show that. "Finally they claim that somehow they DRBC is usurping their power to legislate in Pennsylvania, taking away the sovereignty of the state. That does not make sense as an argument," said Miano. "All the states, as part of the compact, voted for the fracking ban so we're not quite sure how the DRBC is usurping the power of the states." Five million Pennsylvanians across 17 counties reside in the Basin, which includes Bucks, Delaware, Montgomery, Chester and Philadelphia counties. The Delaware River Basin spans 6,471 square miles in the Commonwealth, across 522 municipalities. In May 2021, Muth Was Among The Democratic Legislators To Support A Series Of Additional Restrictions And Regulations On Fracking. "Pennsylvania Senate Democrats on Tuesday introduced eight bills designed to increase restrictions on natural gas drilling and hydraulic fracturing in the commonwealth, taking up most of the recommendations of last year's investigating grand jury. The grand jury led to criminal complaints against a handful of natural gas producers, but in bringing the report to light last fall, Attorney General Josh Shapiro highlighted the steps that the Legislature should take to bring Pennsylvania's environmental laws up to the grand jury's recommendations. While the grand jury's report had little impact in the GOP-controlled Legislature, Tuesday's news conference and the bills themselves sought to put limits onto natural gas industry onto the agenda in Harrisburg. Steven J. Santarsiero, D-Bucks, said during a news conference Tuesday that the proposed legislation would work to address the grand jury's issues as well as the fallout from Act 13, a sweeping law for the natural gas industry that was passed in 2012. "Many of us saw that as an overreach on the part of the industry and not something that actually protected the public and protected the environment," Santarsiero said. Shapiro said the legislation would help ensure Pennsylvanians' rights to clean air and water; he said there was a gap between the 50-year-old law and reality when it came to natural gas drilling

and hydraulic fracturing. "For far too long, fracking companies and regulators turned a blind eye to the health and safety impact of this industry," Shapiro said. Another co-sponsor, state Sen. Katie Muth, D-Berks, said that more attention and regulations needed to be taken when it came to the transportation of hydraulic fracturing waste, including more labeling. "Currently, you could be driving around the highway and be next to something that is full of radioactive waste and not have a clue," Muth said." (*Pittsburgh Business Times*, 5/25/21)

Tax Credits

In March 2020, Muth Was Opposed To HB 1100, Which Provided Tax Credits To Businesses That Used Natural Gas When Manufacturing Fertilizers. "House Bill 1100 passed both chambers last month and will land on Wolf's desk when lawmakers return to session next week. The proposal gives tax credits to businesses that use natural gas when manufacturing fertilizers. Businesses must spend at least \$450 million building a new facility that will create at least 800 jobs to qualify for the 30-year program. The governor said, however, he will veto the plan because he thinks tax breaks should be provided to economic development projects on a case-by-case basis. "We've taken too many hits and if you're going to veto this one, we are going to work like you've never seen us work before to gather up the votes to override that veto," Rep. Gerald Mullery, D-Luzerne, said during a rally for the bill in Harrisburg on Monday. "Because we need those jobs." The House voted 157-35 in favor of the plan on Feb. 4, just hours after the Senate approved the bill 39-11. "Keep this in mind," House Speaker Mike Turzai, R-Allegheny, said. "These are veto proof numbers." Legislators must whip up two-thirds of each chamber – 136 votes in the House and 34 in the Senate – in order to successfully override the governor's expected veto. For some Democrats, however, the natural gas industry's impact on the environment trumps HB 1100's purported economic benefits. "I'm eager to work on a bill that actually prioritizes the economic sustainability and health and well-being of both the public workers and the environment and House Bill 1100 is not that bill," said Rep. Katie Muth, D-Montgomery, at a competing rally protesting the plan. "We can have jobs we can have economic security without sacrificing our land, our water and our health." Mariner East

Muth Is Known To Be Critical Of The Continued Development Of The Mariner East Pipeline Despite Regulatory And Environmental Concerns. 'State Sen. Katie Muth, a Democrat who represents parts of Chester and Montgomery counties, said she's "infuriated" by the new permits allowing construction at Marsh Creek. "I think it should be completely stopped until they have actually tested the public and private water supplies all along [the pipeline route]," she said. "No one has done that. This project was flawed from the beginning." Muth said she's already received calls from constituents worried about how the current construction could affect groundwater and drinking water supplies, and whether neighboring backyards will once again be flooded. Residents worry that because Energy Transfer has to renew all its original permits in February, the company will rush this last section. "They are pushing forward really fast," said Christina "PK" DiGiulio, who lives by Marsh Creek and uses drones to document construction. "It's been a reckless process. This is the DEP enabling a criminal entity to push their pipe through without doing proper groundwater impact studies and protecting the

health and safety of the people." Muth said that while there are no statutes that prevent companies facing criminal charges from continuing construction, the Department of Environmental Protection can pull permits. "DEP does have the legal authority to revoke or deny any permit for any operator that has a history of repeat violations," said Muth. "So [DEP] doesn't use its authority. You can't say they're underfunded forever, and that the laws aren't strong enough, when they hold the authority to revoke or deny, and they've never done it." (*The Philadelphia Tribune*, 12/27/21)

Katie Muth, D-Berks/Chester/Montgomery, who announced that she will be introducing two pieces of legislation that would mandate specific safety and public awareness standards for pipeline construction and operation: "While pipelines may be considered the safest way to transport volatile liquids and natural gases, Pennsylvania has garnered a lengthy history of gas-related accidents, leaks, and disasters," Muth said. "My legislation ensures that residents are adequately informed of, and involved in, safety procedures that are necessary to make sure their communities are not being harmed or damaged by pipeline activity." The first bill would require early collaborative creation and approval of comprehensive risk assessments for each individual pipeline proposal. The assessments would be used to create an Integrity Management Program (IMP) and Emergency Response Plan (ERP). The second bill seeks to create an exception to Act 156 of 2006 that would allow agencies and a qualified Independent Third Party (ITP) to conduct the evaluations required by the first bill." In 2019, Muth Noted She Supported Medicare For All. She said she has no patience for business owners who claim raising the minimum wage would put them out of business. Mask Mandates

In September 2021, Muth Defended The Imposition Of School Mask Mandates. 'State Sen. Katie Muth, D-44th, said Gov. Tom Wolf's order was needed. "Wearing masks, protecting ourselves and protecting our communities should have never been politicized or vilified — we are still fighting a deadly pandemic and need to take every precaution to stop the spread of

COVID-19 and the Delta variant," she said. This commonsense order takes necessary steps to keep our communities safe and keep our schools open for in-person learning." Social Distancing

In December 2020, Citing The Presence Of Her Desk Next To Republicans Who Did Not Wear Masks, Muth Relocated Herself To A Corner Of The Chamber In A Bid To Socially Distance Herself. "Katie Muth's assigned seat in the Pennsylvania Senate is near several Republicans who don't wear face masks on the chamber floor. "I call it COVID alley," said Muth, a Montgomery County Democrat. So in October, she brought a new desk into the chamber and set it up in the corner instead. She felt safer. Muth's forced social distancing was emblematic of a vitriolic year in Harrisburg - an environment unlikely to mellow in 2021. While most Pennsylvanians can shelter in their political bubbles while they disagree about the severity of the pandemic and the reality of Joe Biden's election win, in Harrisburg, elected officials have clashed over those same things while sitting right next to one another or on tense Zoom calls." Emergency Declaration

In June 2021, Muth Criticized Republicans For Moving To Terminate The Pandemic Emergency Declarations. "Before Thursday' night's vote by the Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee on the scaled-back resolution, Sen. Katie Muth, a Democrat from Bucks County, castigated her Republican colleagues for spending a day on what she called the optics of taking credit for declaring the pandemic over, when, she argued, many related issues are far from resolved. "I'm baffled that there's been so much time spent on ending this and sticking it to the governor... and yet we have no plan to say: 'This is how we're going to prevent this from happening again,' number one; or if another emergency occurs how do we improve our response?" Muth said. "Where's that plan? Where's that rushed-through at nine-forty p.m.?" To illustrate, Muth cited questions about whether the state would extra federal funding for summer lunch programs at schools, or to pay for COVID-related deployments of the Pennsylvania National Guard. Legislative Oversight Of Emergency Declarations

ANALYSIS: This legislation proposes three separate amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania as follows:

<u>Article I:</u> This resolution adds a new section that would prohibit denying or abridging equality of rights under the law in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania because of the race or ethnicity of an individual.

<u>Section 9 of Article III:</u> This resolution would add a provision allowing for non-presentment to the governor of a Joint Resolution terminating or extending a declaration of disaster emergency.

Article IV: This resolution adds a new section that would authorize the Governor to issue emergency declarations under circumstances provided for by law for that purpose. The General Assembly could by law grant the Governor certain enumerated powers to address and abate the declared emergency. However, a declaration by the Governor of an emergency could not last longer than 21 days unless extended by a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly approving the continuation of the declaration. Upon the expiration of the Governor's emergency declaration, the Governor could not declare a new state of emergency based upon the same or substantially similar facts and circumstances without the passage of a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly expressly approving the new emergency declaration.

DESCRIPTION

House Bill 2412 amends the Administrative Code to add a new article relating to Emergency COVID-19 provisions regarding issuance of waiver to the Governor's Business Closure Order for legal services, residential and commercial real estate related activities.

The legislation requires the Secretary of Community and Economic Development to immediately issue a waiver to the Governor's Business Closure Order to all providers of legal services, and residential and commercial real estate services, including settlement services.

Until the Governor's March 6, 2020, proclamation of disaster emergency, and any renewal of the state of disaster emergency, is terminated or expires:

- A municipality or municipal authority that requires a use and occupancy certificate, or any other similar certificate or certification as a condition of a property transfer, shall be presumed to have issued a full and unconditional permit without requiring an inspection of the property. If a certificate is presumed to be issued, the municipality or municipal authority shall be enjoined from conducting a property transfer inspection after the proclamation has terminated or expired; and
- Taxing authorities and public utilities shall provide alternative means for residential home buyers or title insurers to ascertain the current status of tax payments or overdue utility obligations.

All businesses issued a waiver must comply with social distancing practices and other mitigation measures defined by the Centers for Disease Control and the order issued by the Secretary of Health directing public health safety measures for businesses permitted to maintain in-person operations.

The average college student in Pennsylvania carries \$36,000 in debt. Under PA Student HELP, a student could refinance his or her debt and save \$10,000 over a 20-year loan repayment. This would be achieved by slicing more than 2% off the blended federal loan repayment rate of 6.25%. The savings would be more pronounced for students who financed their education through private lenders. These students, who carry an average of \$50,000 in debt and a 10% interest rate (the current average private lending rate), would save more than \$43,000 from refinancing under the bill. There are other features. The plan includes a potential \$500 per year tax credit against personal income tax liability. The program would make up to \$10 million in tax credits available. Employers also have a role to play. To retain valuable, educated staff, employers could make contributions into a 529 account and have these contributions credited toward reducing student debt. The program

would also open the possibility for employees to deploy the cash equivalent of unused carryover days to retire student debt. A final feature would boost transparency and open additional tracts of financial data to students to better understand the cost of higher education. The plan would mandate that colleges provide students with an upfront estimated cost of a four-year degree. 

Probation (Restitution Costs)

In February 2022, Muth Noted That She Voted Against SB 913, Claiming Revoking A Person's Probation Due To Failure To Pay Restitution Costs Amounted To Criminalizing Poverty. "State Sen. Katie Muth, a Democrat from the Philadelphia suburbs who was first elected in the "blue wave" of 2018, said she voted against the bill, in part, because she sees it as

endorsing the criminalization of poverty. Though SB 913 would prevent someone's probation from being revoked because they can't pay a fine or court costs — probation itself costs a person between \$25 and \$75 a month, depending on the county — it would not do so for restitution. Under the bill, a person who has paid half their debt to a victim or business and otherwise qualifies for early termination would be placed into a new "administrative probation" with reduced reporting requirements. They would be required to continue making payments on a schedule they "can afford to pay," but public defenders have complained that judges rarely examine bank records and other financial obligations before deciding whether a person isn't making good on their restitution due to obstinance or hardship. "I'll be blunt," Muth said in an interview. "I work with people — probably the majority of the people in the Senate — who have never had to live paycheck to paycheck or pay student loan bills." Most also have no idea what it means to be on probation. If they did, Muth argued, the bill might have addressed what she sees as the most glaring flaws in the system: the uncapped length of probation, the indefinite extensions of state supervision, and the "detainers" that allow people in her district to be held for months before they have a hearing on their alleged technical violation. It also does nothing to curtail what constitutes a technical violation, which she sees as setting a trap for those on probation, triggering the cycle of poverty and incarceration. Whether it's 70 days waiting for a hearing or less than a week, any time in jail is enough to lose a job — detention itself is a traumatic experience that, depending on the mood of a probation officer or the policy of their office, can be prompted by the mundane. "It's a whole ordeal, just to live your basic life," she said in an interview. "Like calling 911. What are you supposed to tell them? 'Please take me to a hospital in the county because, like, I'm going to get a technical violation?" In 2018, just under 11% of Pennsylvanians under supervision had their probation revoked, the majority for technical violations. To Muth and other critics of the supervision status quo, that represents thousands of lives disrupted by a system of arbitrary and arbitrarily enforced tripwires, leading to people being removed from their family and friends, at least temporarily, for behavior that isn't criminal. It is, among other things, an inefficient use of limited resources. From the perspective of a fiscal conservative, it makes no sense to monitor and repeatedly incarcerate someone when it would be cheaper and more effective to treat their underlying problems, be they economic, social, or behavioral. In Philadelphia, a 2019 report prepared for the city found it costs more than \$48,000 a year, on average, to house an inmate. "How the fuck do you justify that? That's not a system that's making people safer. That's locking people into poverty and being in prison," Muth said." (Business Insider, 2/4/22)

Juneteenth commemorates a historic time in black history when emancipation finally reached enslaved people in the deepest parts of the former Confederacy. Often referred to as a holiday to celebrate the end of slavery in the United States, it's important to discuss the history. As the Civil War neared it's end, and over two years after the Emancipation Proclamation executive order, slavery continued on, especially in areas where the Union army did not have a strong presence or in remote areas, in places like in Texas and nearby areas of the southwest. On June 19, 1865, when Union general Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, he issued an order and read a proclamation that all enslaved people in Texas were to be set free. The Juneteenth holiday is meant to commemorate the emancipation of over 4 million slaves, particularly those who were not yet aware that emancipation had actually been declared over two years ago. 155 years have passed since then, and black people in our country are still battling for their freedom. In many ways, Juneteenth is symbolic of delayed freedom, both in 1865, and in 2020, freedom is still delayed.

Juneteenth is not a nationally recognized holiday (but absolutely should be). The history of Juneteenth is not taught in most history curriculums, especially in K-12 education, resulting in people not learning about this day until adulthood. This is an example of how our education system has been conditioned to overlook and leave out black history, sending a message of that black history is not valued or important. Our country's history is tied up in and interconnected to slavery. Learning the history is an important step but in order for us, as a nation, to end systemic racism and oppression, we have to understand the legacy of slavery and the trauma caused by slavery, and how this legacy resulted in massive amounts of wealth for white Americans. Narratives used to justify slavery are connected to the harmful narratives still used today to oppress black people. Our nation will never be united unless we acknowledge and learn from the 250+ years of slavery, and all of the harms it caused then and still perpetuates today. This will require white people to try and look at history through the eyes of those that were enslaved and those that are still oppressed today. If we, white people, do this long overdue work, our power and privilege would finally bring about the change needed to ensure that freedom is finally a reality for black Americans. This work starts with not just marching and rallies, it starts with open minds and hearts, and the will to succeed fueled by knowing that there's no other way to make change than through daily action of our own collective power. We must demand massive investments in education, healthcare, affordable housing, paid leave, living wage, meaningful work, criminal justice reform, restructuring of our policing system and ending police brutality, a fair court system, and ending poverty and all forms of inequities.



No Knock Warrants

In 2021, Muth Introduced Legislation To Ban No Knock Warrants. "State Sen. Tim Kearney, who represents parts of Delaware and Chester counties, has reintroduced Breonna's Law in the Pennsylvania legislature. "It's a law, essentially, which would prohibit police from using no-knock warrants — which, of course, led to Breonna [Taylor's] death in Kentucky a little over a year ago," Kearney said. Taylor was killed by plainclothes police officers in her Louisville apartment as they were executing a no-knock warrant, a search warrant that allows police to enter spaces without announcing themselves. If passed, Senate Bill 296 would require law enforcement to knock and make themselves known when serving a warrant. In addition, officers would have to wear body cameras and clothing that identifies them as law enforcement. Kearney, a Democrat, introduced the bill last year, but the Republican leadership in the Senate did not give it a vote. "And so, this year, when we reintroduced it, we're making more of an effort to reach out to some of our Republican colleagues to co-sponsor — which, as of yet hasn't happened, but we're still trying," Kearney said. So far, the bill has seven Senate co-sponsors, including Philadelphia-area Democrats Amanda Cappelletti, Maria Collett, Katie Muth, and Vincent Hughes. Kearney has also deployed a citizen co-sponsorship campaign that allows for Pennsylvanians to express their support for the bill." (*The Philadelphia Tribune*, 3/28/21)

In November 2019, A Senate Committee Advanced Legislation Prohibiting Abortion Of A Fetus On The Grounds Of A Genetic Abnormality – A Bid Intended To Protect Persons Born With Down Syndrome. "Putting them on course for a guaranteed gubernatorial veto, a state Senate committee voted on party lines Monday to advance a pair of bills imposing new restrictions on a person's right to access abortion, including a hotly debated measure banning the procedure based on a prenatal diagnosis of Down syndrome. The 7-4 votes by the Senate Health and Human Services Committee came at the beginning of what is expected to be one of the Republican-controlled chamber's busiest session weeks in recent memory. It also comes just two months before the start of a 2020 campaign season in which Democrats hope to close the GOP's 27-22 margin by using such culture war measures against them in vulnerable districts in the Philadelphia suburbs. The Down syndrome proposal, sponsored by Rep. Kate Klunk, R-York, provoked the most impassioned debate during the hour-long meeting. Klunk's bill, which cleared the House in May, would expand the state's existing Abortion Control Act to add the genetic abnormality to gender on the list of reasons a person would be barred from accessing an abortion. Muth Voted Against Advancing The Legislation As Well As Another Measure To "Provide Perinatal Hospice Care To Women Whose Fetuses Are Diagnosed With A "Life-Limiting Condition." "Last month, a federal appeals court in Cincinnati blocked Ohio's version of the bill, with a judge concluding that it was invalid under "Supreme Court precedents because it had the purpose and effect of preventing some women from obtaining pre-viability abortions," Reuters reported. Under Roe v. Wade, a woman can obtain an abortion for any reason until the 24th week of gestation. Doctors violating the Ohio ban could have up to 18 months in jail, Reuters reported. The Senate panel also advanced legislation, sponsored by Rep. Kathy Rapp, R-Warren, one of that chamber's most vocal abortion opponents, that would provide perinatal hospice care to women whose fetuses are diagnosed with a "life-limiting condition." "This bill helps mothers and fathers through a difficult situation," said the Senate committee's chairwoman, Sen. Michele Brooks, R-Mercer. "I see this as step forward in a difficult situation." Sen. Katie Muth, D-Montgomery, a "no" vote on both measures, said she didn't oppose counseling parents on their options. But, she noted, Rapp's bill left abortion off the list of options. "It does not include information on safe and legal abortion," which some women might decide is the right choice for them, Muth said. "This would intrude on the doctor/patient relationship. Subject: Down Syndrome Protection Legislation

We plan to re-introduce legislation amending the Abortion Control Act to prohibit the abortion of any child solely due to a diagnosis of possible Down Syndrome. Last session, this legislation passed the House with a bipartisan vote of 139-56.

Under current law, a woman can obtain an abortion prior to 24 weeks gestational age for any reason if a physician deems it is necessary, except if the woman's sole reason is to select the sex of the child. This bill will expand that exception to prohibit aborting the child solely due to a prenatal diagnosis that the unborn child has Down Syndrome. Nothing in this proposal would interfere with the existing ability of a woman to obtain an abortion in cases of rape, incest or endangerment to the mother, which are contained in different sections of the Abortion Control Act.

In March 2022, Muth Criticized Legislation To Exclude Transgender Athlete From Competing On Women's Sports Teams, Noting "'This Bill Is An Ignorant Attempt To Fix A Problem That Doesn't Exist. If The Majority's Intent Is To Give Women A Level Playing Field, We Should Address The Inequities In Funding, Resources, Media Coverage And Pay In Women's Sports." "The Pennsylvania House Education Committee voted Tuesday to move a bill that would exclude transgender athletes from competing on women's sports team in the commonwealth. HB 972, [1] also known as the 'Protect Women's Sports Act[2],' would bar transgender athletes from participating in sports consistent with their gender identities. It passed through the committee Tuesday morning in a 15-9 vote. The bill was first introduced last April [3] by state Rep. Barbara Gleim, R-Cumberland. Gleim was joined on the bill by Reps. Martina White, R-Philadelphia; Dawn Keefer, R-York; Valerie Gaydos, R-Allegheny and Stephanie Borowicz, R-Clinton. Speaking to the committee, Gleim said the bill to exclude transgender athletes 'preserves fairness for all women.' 'Identities don't play sports, bodies do,' Gleim said, repeatedly misgendering[4] University of Pennsylvania swimmer and Division I national champion[5] Lia Thomas in her testimony. The panel's ranking Democrat, Rep. Mark Longietti, of Mercer County, questioned whether the decision would be better left up to the governing bodies of high school and collegiate sports in the commonwealth - the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA) and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). 'Let's not become the school sports eligibility committee,' Longietti said. Rep. MaryLouise Isaacson, D-Philadelphia, echoed Longietti's comments about the committee's role in the decision: 'There are governing bodies over high school and collegiate sports. We are not one of them,' she said. Rep. Napoleon Nelson, D-Montgomery, said that he was 'dumbfounded' that the committee was considering advancing the bill after a September 2021 hearing suggested that this bill 'is not yet ready.' The General Assembly's LGBTQ+ Equality Caucus called the bill 'dangerous,' in a statement following the vote. 'Once again, the majority party is wasting taxpayer money by bringing up divisive and hateful legislation that pushes a harmful narrative instead of addressing legislation that could help expand educational resources and protections for all students,' state Sen. Katie Muth, D-Berks, co-chair of the LGBTQ+ Caucus said. 'This bill is an ignorant attempt to fix a problem that doesn't exist. If the majority's intent is to give women a level playing field, we should address the inequities in funding, resources, media coverage and pay in women's sports.' Are GOP lawmakers pushing ban on transgender athletes ignoring gender inequities at home districts?[6] Naiymah Sanchez, trans rights organizer at the American Civil Liberties Union of Pennsylvania, said she is concerned about the harmful effects exclusion from school sports would have on transgender youth. 'School activities like sports give trans kids a feeling of belonging and inclusion,' Sanchez said. 'Like cisgender students, trans students benefit academically and emotionally from participation in sports. Juneteenth commemorates a historic time in black history when emancipation finally reached enslaved people in the deepest parts of the former Confederacy. Often referred to as a holiday to celebrate the end of slavery in the United States, it's important to discuss the history. As the Civil War neared it's end, and over two years after the Emancipation Proclamation executive order, slavery continued on, especially in areas where the Union army did not have a strong presence or in remote areas, in places like in Texas and nearby areas of the southwest. On June 19, 1865, when Union general Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, he issued an order and read a proclamation that all enslaved people in Texas were to be set free. The Juneteenth holiday is meant to commemorate the emancipation of over 4 million slaves, particularly those who were not yet aware that emancipation had actually been declared over two years ago. 155 years have passed since then, and black people in our country are still battling for their freedom. In many

ways, Juneteenth is symbolic of delayed freedom, both in 1865, and in 2020, freedom is still

Juneteenth is not a nationally recognized holiday (but absolutely should be). The history of Juneteenth is not taught in most history curriculums, especially in K-12 education, resulting in people not learning about this day until adulthood. This is an example of how our education system has been conditioned to overlook and leave out black history, sending a message of that black history is not valued or important. Our country's history is tied up in and interconnected to slavery. Learning the history is an important step but in order for us, as a nation, to end systemic racism and oppression, we have to understand the legacy of slavery and the trauma caused by slavery, and how this legacy resulted in massive amounts of wealth for white Americans. Narratives used to justify slavery are connected to the harmful narratives still used today to oppress black people. Our nation will never be united unless we acknowledge and learn from the 250+ years of slavery, and all of the harms it caused then and still perpetuates today. This will require white people to try and look at history through the eyes of those that were enslaved and those that are still oppressed today. If we, white people, do this long overdue work, our power and privilege would finally bring about the change needed to ensure that freedom is finally a reality for black Americans. This work starts with not just marching and rallies, it starts with open minds and hearts, and the will to succeed fueled by knowing that there's no other way to make change than through daily action of our own collective power. We must demand massive investments in education, healthcare, affordable housing, paid leave, living wage, meaningful work, criminal justice reform, restructuring of our policing system and ending police brutality, a fair court system, and ending poverty and all forms of inequities.

HB 1747 amends the Crimes Code by removing the current prohibition of carrying a firearm in public during an emergency proclamation from the State or a municipal government.

In addition, HB 1747 further amends the Health and Safety Code by removing the gubernatorial authority to limit the sale, dispensing or transportation of firearms during a disaster emergency declaration.

- End hunger in Pennsylvania by protecting and expanding SNAP in Pennsylvania, passing the Pennsylvania Fresh Financing Initiative to reduce the number of food deserts in the state and expanding the number of children benefiting from free and reduced lunch, breakfast, and summer meals
- Expand child care programs in Pennsylvania by increasing funds for child care services to ensure all low-income families with eligible children can get access to subsidized child care; increase reimbursement rates for child care providers so they can pay their workers a living wage and meet required safety guidelines.
- Protect and expand cash assistance programs by restoring the state's General Assistance program and improving TANF so it better serves lowincome Pennsylvanians.
- Substantially increase the availability of affordable and safe housing in Pennsylvania by passing a state low-income housing tax credit; increase

- We The People's Calls For SNAP Protection And Expansion Includes Expanding Program Eligibility To 200 Percent Of The Federal Poverty Level. (We The People, Posted January 2019)
 - Protect and expand SNAP benefits. In the face of mounting attacks on SNAP on both the federal and state level, the General Assembly must protect access to this important program, rejecting all efforts to impose work requirements that will kick people off the program because of administrative red tape and burdensome reporting requirements. The General Assembly should also take steps to increase SNAP participation from 90% to 98% by strengthening outreach for the program.⁵
 - The Department of Human Services should increase the SNAP income threshold to 200% of the federal poverty line. By using the categorical eligibility rules for SNAP, states can choose to increase the gross income threshold. Nationally, it is set at 130% of the federal poverty line. Pennsylvania has increased eligibility to 200% of the federal poverty line for seniors and people with disabilities but only increased it to 160% for everyone else. Pennsylvania can, and should, go further and increase it to 200% for all families/individuals so that more people in need can get access to SNAP benefits.

Pennsylvania should protect the General Assistance program which was reinstated in 2018 and improve the TANF program so that it better serves low-income Pennsylvanians. Cash benefits should be increased, and the earned income disregard should be increased, as well, to further strengthen the program. The following proposals will attain these goals.

- Protect and Expand General Assistance: General Assistance was eliminated in Pennsylvania by legislation in 2012. Due to a positive ruling by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, the program has been restored. But as in 2012, it is vulnerable to attack by the General Assembly. We should protect the newly re-established General Assistance program and make sure outreach efforts are done effectively so those that need this support can access it. Moving forward, we should consider increasing the benefit from its 1990 grant level.
- Raise the TANF Cash Grants: TANF grants to Pennsylvania families have not increased since 1990. Had grants kept up with inflation, a grant for a family of three would be \$721/month instead of the current \$403/month. The state should increase its grant amounts and factor in a cost-of-living adjustment so that Pennsylvania's poorest families

Repeal Counterproductive Drug Laws

- Drug-induced homicide laws allow charges of murder or manslaughter to be brought against persons involved in the manufacturing, sale, distribution or delivery of a controlled substance resulting in death. Pennsylvania is leading the charge here—the Commonwealth ranked number one in the nation for the number of drug-induced homicide charges brought. For this same crime, people of color on average receive much higher sentences than that of white individuals.⁷ Though these laws are generally brought forward with good intentions, they are harmful, target some of our most vulnerable populations, and should be eliminated.
- Similarly, laws that discourage doctors from providing legitimate pain treatment that sometimes includes the use of opioids often have unintended victims—people who are suffering from severe pain that sometimes cannot be treated in other ways. These laws can drive some pain patients to seek out alternatives, increasing the demand for heroin or unregulated prescription drugs sold on the street. We should be educating doctors and patients about the risks of substance misuse yet trusting them to make the best decisions about their medical needs.⁸
- In order to set up syringe exchange programs and harm reduction centers, Pennsylvania needs to pass HB196 or a similar law that legalizes syringes and enables advocates and public health departments to set up syringe exchange services. Syringe service

Oil and gas companies continue to try to access our most pristine and protected land, including our state parks, state forests and other public lands, for natural gas extraction. The General Assembly should oppose any legislation to open these areas for drilling.
- Extend gas facility to structure/building set-back distances. Set-back distances should be increased to: 0.6 mile (3281 feet) from smaller shale gas facilities; 1 ¼ miles from gas processing plants or compressor complexes; and 1 ¼ miles for schools/ daycares, hospitals, nursing homes, and other high-occupancy buildings.⁶
- Pass a severance tax. Pennsylvania is the only natural gas-rich state without a severance tax, which means that oil and gas drillers located here are pillaging our natural resources without paying their fair share to the state. THE SOLUTION

Pennsylvania's clean energy policies are weak compared to surrounding states. Pennsylvania must strengthen its energy policies² by doing the following things:

- Raise our Alternative Energy Portfolio Standards (AEPS): These standards are low compared to surrounding states. Pennsylvania should commit to generating 15% of its electricity with solar energy by 2025.³
- New regulations to limit methane pollution: The
 Department of Environmental Protection should
 develop new regulations to limit methane pollution
 and air admissions from existing sources of oil and
 gas wells, pipelines, and other infrastructure.

To improve roads and bridges, Pennsylvania should⁶

- establish stable sources of transportation funding at the federal and state levels. On the federal side, Pennsylvania should advocate for more investment in the Highway Trust Fund and an increase in the federal gas tax which hasn't been updated since 1993. As Act 89 plateaus, Pennsylvania must come up with a funding plan internal to PA.
 - The Pennsylvania State Police should not get a disproportionate amount of appropriations from the Motor License Fee, which they currently do.⁷ The 2016 state fiscal code addressed this issue by capping the portion given to State Police, and then decreasing it over a 10-year period.
 - The motor fuels tax and, in the long term, a usage-based revenue system should remain a significant part of state funding for roads and bridges. As the number of electric cars increases, the gas tax will bring in less and less revenue. A usage-based funding system (based on mileage travelled) is undergoing a pilot test in Pennsylvania and other states. Greater reliance on usage fees needs to be coupled with protection for low-income, rural Pennsylvanians who drive long distances to work.⁵

Corporate taxes (e.g., closing corporate tax loopholes) and individual taxes that fall more heavily on upper-income taxpayers—such as the PBPC "fair share tax" described elsewhere and some carbon taxes—should also be explored as a source for road and bridge repair as well as mass transit funding, in part, because corporations and the affluent benefit disproportionately from the wealth and income generated by robust investment in infrastructure.

THE SOLUTION

The We The People campaign proposes three solutions to our unfair and inadequate tax system. Taken together, these proposals will raise \$3.2 billion in fiscal year 2018-19 and \$3.6 billion in fiscal year 2021-22 while reducing taxes for close to 60% of Pennsylvanians, for small businesses, and for Pennsylvania based corporations.

 Our Fair Share Tax increases the tax rate on income from wealth (e.g. dividends, capital gains, business profits, estates, royalties, and gambling winnings) from 3.07% to 6.5% while lowering the tax on wages and interest from 3.07% to 2.8%. The Fair Share Tax would raise an addition \$2.32 billion in the next fiscal year (2019-20) while reducing income taxes for 59% of individuals and small business owners in Pennsylvania. By fiscal year 2021-22, the Fair Share Tax would bring in an additional \$2.63 billion.

- A severance or shale tax on natural gas drilling at the same 5% rate imposed by West Virginia would raise \$567 million in the next fiscal year and \$833 million by fiscal year 2021-22.
- Combined reporting should be instituted for the corporate net income tax to close the Delaware Loophole while reducing the corporate tax rate from 9.99% to 9.49% starting in 2020-21. This would bring in an additional \$332 million in revenue in the next fiscal year and \$254 billion in 2021-22.

- The Fair Share Tax would raise \$2.22 billion in new revenue in the 2019-20 fiscal year and \$2.63 billion in 2021-22.
- Most of the new tax revenues would come from those at or close to the top of the income distribution with nearly 60% of the new revenue coming from the top 1%.
 - Fifty-nine percent would come from Pennsylvania households in the top 1% of incomes who have an income above \$569,000 and average income of \$1.5 million. Their taxes would increase by an average of \$24,119, only 1.6% of their average income.
 - Another 25% would come from Pennsylvania households with income in the 95th through 99th percentile with incomes between \$242,000 and \$669,000 and an average income of \$351,000. Their taxes would increase by an average of \$2,571 or 0.7% of their average income.
 - Another 12% would come from Pennsylvania households with incomes in the 80th through 94th percentile with incomes in the range of \$109,000 to \$242,000 and an average income of \$152,000. Their taxes would increase by an average of only \$330 or 0.2% of their average income.
 - Overall, 95% of the increased revenue paid under the Fair Share Tax would come from families in the top 20% of all incomes.

THE SOLUTION

Pennsylvanians need to fight for and win a more responsive democracy. Nothing is more important. To do this, we need to

- · make it easier, not harder, for people to vote;
- enact comprehensive campaign finance reform legislation to reduce the influence of money on electoral outcomes;
- end the gerrymandering of state and congressional legislative districts;
- eliminate barriers to participation in political and economic life based on race, gender, and/or sexual orientation;
- end the over incarceration of Pennsylvanians, which wastes money and lives;
- protect immigrants and welcome them into our communities; and
- ensure that our state and local police forces are well-equipped to protect Pennsylvanians and hold accountable the few who abuse their power.

 We The People's Proposed Electoral Reforms Include Same-Day Voter Registration, Pre-Registering Of 17-Year-Olds, Expanded Mail Voting, And Automatic Voter Registration. (We The People, Posted January 2019)

Institute automatic voter registration. Automatic voter registration would use information already on file with the state to identify individuals who are eligible to vote and add them to voter rolls or update voter information automatically when they are already registered. Voters who are automatically registered would have the option of removing themselves from the rolls if they choose.

Allow registration of unregistered voters on Election Day. Election Day and "same-day" registration (SDR) allows voters to register on the day of the election. As of early 2018, 16 states and Washington, D.C. had adopted SDR. To avoid manipulation of primary elections, SDR could be limited to unregistered voters with already registered voters being permitted to switch their party registration only until 30 days before a primary election. Research shows that same-day registration increases turnout by 5% to 7%. Over half of Americans support automatic voter registration (54%) and same-day registration (55%).

Pre-register eligible 16- and 17-year-olds and automatically add them to voter rolls when they turn 18. Pre-registering voters before they turn 18 is a good first step towards educating them on their civic responsibilities. Twelve states and Washington, D.C. pre-register 16-year-olds and another four pre-register 17-year-olds.

Encourage voting with no-fault absentee voting and voting by mail. A recent study found that Utah's experimentation with all-mail voting increased turnout by nearly 5%-7%. Earlier research in Washington state found all-mail voting was associated with 2%-4% increases in turnout. Both studies found that the positive effects of all-mail voting were most pronounced among young voters and those who never or rarely voted.

Not only can the state make it easier for people to register to vote, it can encourage people directly and indirectly to vote.

Eighth, until the federal government ensures that basic data about police shootings and other forms of violence are collected from all police forces and also by means of population surveys, the state should take on this task. We will not be able to fully address the structural and systemic racism of the criminal justice system in America if we do not know its extent.

Ninth, state legislative committees should begin an investigation of the distribution of police resources not only by local community but by neighborhoods in our medium and large cities. The state should develop and enforce guidelines to ensure that police services are equally distributed in all neighborhoods.

• We The People Calls For Criminal Justice Reform Measures, Such As The Reclassification Of Several So-Called Low Level Felonies To Misdemeanors And Reducing The Utilization Of The Life Without Parole Sentence. (We The People, Posted January 2019)

To reduce the amount of time that people spend in prison we should do the following.

- Embrace sentencing reform. The General Assembly should change the criminal code in the state to reduce maximum sentences, especially for drug offenses.
 - Many lower-level offenses should be reclassified from felonies to misdemeanors.
 - The life without parole sentence is overused in Pennsylvania. It leads to many people who have not taken a life or who, after long years in prison, have repented for their crimes, staying in prison when that serves no useful purpose. Use of this sentence should be reformed and opportunities for parole should be made available to selected inmates.
 - Reduce revocations from supervision for minor parole violations. In 2016, 15% of the prison population was in prison because of a parole violation. The likelihood of recidivism is highest in the first year following incarceration, yet many of those leaving prison have long parole terms and probation sentences. Reforms should focus on capping how much jail time one can receive for minor parole offenses and/ or diversionary treatment for those with drug usage or mental health issues.

Efforts should also be made to reduce racial disparities and the criminalization of the poor. Reducing admissions and time served will decrease the overall prison population in Pennsylvania, but it will not solve the problem of racial disparities within the prison system. Addressing this racial disparity will take comprehensive reform at many levels. We can do several things to reform the criminal justice system and address these racial disparities and the criminalization of the poor.

 End cash bail. The current cash bail system in Pennsylvania keeps primarily poor individuals in jail, sometimes for significant periods of time, despite not yet being convicted of a crime. The PA Supreme Court's Rules Committee has the authority to make this change.

- · End over-policing in communities of color.
- End sentencing enhancements that are based on location like drug-free school zones.
- Shift funding from law enforcement/corrections to investment in job creation and training, strong public education, mental health and drug treatment, and other social and human services.¹⁴

The use of private prisons has, in some cases, created corrupt relationships between judges and the owners of prisons that led to horrible abuses, especially of juveniles. Prison privatization should be prohibited in this state.

"I think that at this point anything that the majority party is doing is all being done to try to undermine our democracy and the whole process of our elections, just to prepare for 2022," Muth said in an interview.
