DOSSIER NOTES

In preparing this background report, we undertook an examination of all readily available and relevant electronic and online records, several hundred Nexis and news articles, dozens of active and archived web pages, and several dozen public records from Nexis and the resources of various federal, state, and municipal government offices. The results of our analysis are contained below.

MAIN NARRATIVES

Political Leanings

Of the nearly \$200 Williams has contributed at the federal level, approximately 40% has gone towards liberal candidates and organizations. Williams contributed to the 2016 presidential campaign of Democratic-Socialist Bernie Sanders and the 2018 senatorial campaign John Fetterman. Likewise, Williams has contributed to the pro-abortion group, Emily's List.

Williams has received nearly \$75,000 from teacher union groups, such as the Pennsylvania State Education Association, the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers (her former employer), the Pennsylvania Federation of Teachers, and the American Federation of Teachers. Further, Williams has received more than \$360,000 from labor and public sector unions, including the Pennsylvania SEIU, the Operating Engineers Local 66, the Keystone + Mountain + Lakes Regional Council of Carpenters, and SEIU Healthcare Pennsylvania. Williams has received tens of thousands of dollars from pro-abortion groups such as Emily's List and Planned Parenthood of Pennsylvania. Williams has additionally received nearly \$126,000 from lawyers and lobbying organizations, including the Philadelphia Trial Lawyers Association and the Pennsylvania Association For Justice; as well as K&L Gates and Cohen & Grigsby. Williams has also received more than \$500,000 from Pennsylvania Democratic campaign committees.

Williams is a member of the Democratic Socialists of America (DSA) and is known to have unsuccessfully sought the local chapter's endorsement during the 2018 primary. Williams was recorded on video speaking at a 2017 DSA endorsement meeting. Upon winning election to the state Senate, Williams called on outside progressive groups to exert pressure on legislators.

As a candidate for state Senate, Williams expressed support for a series of controversial election reforms. However, in 2020, Williams voted against legislation that was "designed to ensure that all Pennsylvanians have a voice in selecting judges for the Commonwealth." Specifically, the legislation proposed to amend the Pennsylvania Constitution to allow voters to elect appellate judges by districts rather than statewide elections.

Williams has been associated with prominent Democrats, including Jill Biden, Barack Obama, and Hillary Clinton.

During her 2018 election, and for a period after, Williams' residency was scrutinized and subject to investigation amid questions over whether she abided by the state residency requirement.

Finally, Williams was fired from her job in 2012 after she attempted to unionize the staff at a non-profit.

Liberal Fiscal Agenda

Williams participated in efforts promoting Gov. Tom Wolf's proposed \$4.5 billion oil and gas severance tax. Williams has joined a slim minority in opposing multiple bipartisan state budgets that increased education funding in a fiscally responsible way. Williams appears to have joined a bipartisan effort to raise fees on fishing and boating activities. Additionally, Williams has proposed a \$1 billion student debt relief program and has personally championed an effort to continue the state's socialization of the debt of medical students.

Throughout her career, Williams has branded herself as a union leader and has promoted a prolabor agenda. During her 2018 campaign, Williams is reported to have said she has "union in [her] blood". In 2018, Williams was the spokeswoman for the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers while it contemplated striking amid labor negotiations with Pittsburgh Public Schools. Beyond support for increasing wage mandates (minimum wage), Williams also appears to support changing Pennsylvania's overtime mandates. Additionally, Williams supported legislation that "authorizes unionization of waterways conservation officers, thus driving up taxpayer costs and making it harder for the state to dismiss poorly performing employees."

Williams has opposed efforts to reduce the regulatory burden on the energy sector. Williams took part in hearings on efforts to address climate change and hearings that were critical of the Trump Administration's decision to withdraw from the Paris Climate Accord. In 2019, Williams was among the Allegheny County politicians to call for a crackdown on industrial air polluters in the county. Williams has previously earned the endorsement of environmentalists.

Williams has supported the growth of Pennsylvania's burdensome regulatory regime. In 2020, Williams was the primary sponsor of legislation to create a state-based version of the False Claims Act – a measure strongly opposed by business interests. In 2019, Williams voted against a bill "designed to improve oversight of the regulatory process and strengthen a crucial check on executive branch power".

Williams was opposed to the ratification of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement. Williams also has expressed support for the Biden Administration's infrastructure bill.

Support Of The Left's Covid Reaction And Government-Funded Healthcare

Williams appears to be a supporter of 'Medicare for All.' Specifically, in 2018, Williams was reported by *Pittsburgh City Paper* to be among the candidates to support a single-payer, Medicare for all- style system.

During the Covid-19 pandemic, Williams supported onerous Covid restrictions, including school mask mandates, and was critical of measures to ensure accountability. In September 2021, Williams was critical of legislation allowing parents to let their children opt out of school mask mandates and noted her support for universal school mask mandates. In April 2021, Williams was critical of suggestions calling for state Senators to return to in-person proceedings citing the lack of universal vaccine access and the tendency of some legislators to forgo masks. Williams indicated support for big government rule by opposing efforts to provide a check on the executive branch during the pandemic. Additionally, Williams voted against efforts to reopen Pennsylvania's economy. Williams voted against commonsense measures to protect nursing homes during the pandemic. In September 2020, Williams voted against a "commonsense bill ensures that high-risk individuals are less likely to be exposed to … covid-19 by prohibiting patients with covid-19 from being transferred from other facilities into nursing homes unless the nursing home has a separate dedicated isolation space …"

Other Left-Wing Views

Williams is associated with the pro-abortion advocacy group known as Emily's List. In 2019, Williams opposed legislation seeking to prohibit abortion if it is being sought because the unborn child receives a prenatal diagnosis of down syndrome.

In 2022, Williams was critical of measures intended to ban transgender athletes from competing in women's sports.

Williams has opposed efforts to expand gun rights and voted against the expansion of adding days eligible for hunting.

Williams is a consistent opponent of charter schools and school choice, seeking to impose additional regulations on the entities while cutting funding. Williams has opposed legislative efforts to expand school choice. Williams spearheaded an unsuccessful effort to deny legitimacy to a Pittsburgh-based charter school. Additionally, Williams has opposed legislative efforts to improve safety in schools and opposed measures to ensure curriculum transparency in schools.

CAMPAIGN FINANCE

Thus far, Lindsey Williams has received an aggregate of \$316,354.99 in total contributions for her re-election campaign to the Pennsylvania State Senate for District 38. Williams has received tens of thousands of dollars from labor unions such as the Operating Engineers Local 66, the Electrical Workers Local 5, and AFSCME Council 13. Williams has additionally been showered in contributions from liberal education groups, such as the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers and the Association of Pennsylvania State College and University Faculties. Williams has also received thousands of dollars from lobbying firms, including K&L Gates and Cohen & Grigsby.

In 2018, Williams received an aggregate of \$1,298,345 for her initial campaign for the Pennsylvania State Senate. Williams received more than \$500,000 between the Democratic State Senate Campaign Committee of Pennsylvania and Pennsylvania Democratic Party. Much like her current campaign, Williams has received hundreds of thousands of dollars from labor and special interest groups, such as the Philadelphia Trial Lawyers Association, the Operating Engineers Local 66, the Keystone + Mountain + Lakes Regional Council of Carpenters, and the Pennsylvania Association for Justice. Williams received nearly \$55,000 from teacher unions such as the Pennsylvania State Education Association, the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers PAC, the Pennsylvania Federation of Teachers, and the American Federation of Teachers. Further, Williams received tens of thousands of dollars from pro-abortion groups, including Emily's List and Planned Parenthood.

Individually, Williams has contributed an aggregate of \$10,477.06 to federal and state campaign committees. Federally, Williams has contributed \$195.51, notably giving to Bernie Sander's 2016 presidential campaign and John Fetterman's 2018 senatorial campaign. Williams has additionally contributed to the pro-abortion group, Emily's List. At the state level, Williams has contributed \$10,281.55 to campaign committees in the state of Pennsylvania; however, nearly \$10,000 has gone towards her own campaigns. Williams has also contributed to the Senate Democratic Campaign Committee, Joanna Bryn Smith, and the Future of Pittsburgh PAC.



But state Republicans, who supported the legal challenge, indicated Wednesday evening that they might not be ready to drop the fight. Republicans are still not convinced that Ms. Williams meets the four-year residency requirement outlined in the state constitution and are weighing whether to appeal the issue to the state Supreme Court, Jason Gottesman, a spokesman for the state party, said in a statement. Whether they would succeed is unclear. WILLIAMS' LIBERAL FISCAL AGENDA

Williams participated in efforts promoting Gov. Tom Wolf's proposed \$4.5 billion oil and gas severance tax. Williams has joined a slim minority in opposing multiple bipartisan state budgets that increase education funding in a fiscally responsible way. However, Williams does appear to have joined in a bipartisan effort to raise fees on fishing and boating activities. Additionally, Williams has proposed a \$1 billion student debt relief program and has personally championed an effort to continue the state's socialization of the debt of medical students. Williams is also known to have supported the prolonging of social assistance programs.

Throughout her career, Williams has branded herself as a union leader and has promoted an aggressive pro-labor agenda. During her 2018 campaign, Williams is reported to have said she has "union in [her] blood". In 2018, Williams was known to have been the spokeswoman for the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers while it contemplated striking amid labor negotiations with Pittsburgh Public Schools. Beyond support for increasing wage mandates, Williams also appears to support changing Pennsylvania's overtime mandates. Additionally, Williams supported legislation that "authorizes unionization of waterways conservation officers, thus driving up taxpayer costs and making it harder for the state to dismiss poorly performing employees."

On energy and the environment, Williams has worked to undermine the oil and gas industry. Williams has opposed efforts to reduce the regulatory burden on the energy sector. Williams took part in hearings on efforts to address climate change and hearings that were critical of the Trump Administration's decision to withdraw from the Paris Climate Accord. In 2019, Williams was among the Allegheny County politicians to call for a crackdown on industrial air polluters in the county. Williams has previously earned the endorsement of environmentalists.

Beyond the energy sector, Williams has supported the growth of Pennsylvania's burdensome regulatory regime. In 2020, Williams was the primary sponsor of legislation to create a statebased version of the False Claims Act – a measure strongly opposed by business interests. In 2019, Williams voted against a bill "designed to improve oversight of the regulatory process and strengthen a crucial check on executive branch power".

Williams was opposed to the ratification of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement. Williams also has expressed support for the Biden Administration's infrastructure bill.

The 2019 Pennsylvania State Budget Increased Education Funding, Investment In School Security, And Agricultural Supports. "With Gov. Tom Wolf's signature, Pennsylvania will have a \$34 billion budget bill. The state Senate approved a budget bill Thursday that provides hundreds of millions more for schools, makes another investment in school security and provides help to the state's sputtering agricultural industry, all without a tax increase. The Senate voted 42-8 to approve the spending bill; the House passed it by a 140-62 vote Tuesday. The spending package does not include an increase in the state's minimum wage, a key goal for Democrats. The budget increases spending by nearly 4%, or just under \$1.3 billion, over the current year's budget of about \$32.7 billion, and by just 1.8% when the governor's overspending is taken into account. Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Pat Browne, R-Lehigh County, urged support for the budget. He called it a relief to consider a state budget that makes increases in important programs and services after a decade of financial turbulence. While Browne warned that the state's fiscal situation remains tenuous, he said this budget "ensures increased confidence to weather the next storm on the horizon." Senate Democratic Appropriations Committee Chairman Vince Hughes, D-Philadelphia, said he could support the budget despite what he

considered missed opportunities. He cited the failure to raise the state's \$7.25 hourly minimum wage. He also disliked the General Assembly's passage of a bill to cut off cash assistance to the state's poorest citizens, a debate that touched off a firestorm in the chamber Wednesday. Senate Majority Chairman Jake Corman, R-Centre County, said, "By and large on this particular budget, I think there's a lot to like because I think what we tried to do is fund what works." Sen. Katie Muth, D-Montgomery County, was among the Democratic senators who opposed the budget. She said, "This budget is not people-centered. This budget does not help enough people."" 'The Pennsylvania General Assembly passed a \$40.8 billion state budget Friday that sets aside billions in federal coronavirus relief funds into savings, bolsters spending on education and provides aid to personal care homes. Gov. Tom Wolf's office said he plans to sign it this week. The budget passed the House by a 140-61 vote, and the Senate approved it by a 43-7 vote. The budget calls for no increase in personal or business taxes. Members of the General Assembly who represent Berks County shared their views with the Reading Eagle on the spending plan: Sen. David Argall, a Schuylkill County Republican "The Senate, on a strong bipartisan vote, made it abundantly clear that our focus should be on funding public and private education, broadband and transportation needs - and that's exactly what we did. "We allocated money to provide additional support for schools, nursing homes, roads and bridges. The best part: We did not need to incorporate a massive tax hike as the governor originally suggested. We even have a sizable revenue surplus which we stowed away in our Rainy Day Fund to prevent future tax hikes. "Not everything in this budget was 100% perfect, but I think we can all be proud of this bipartisan budget which will help Pennsylvanians get back on their feet without weighing them down with more taxes." Sen. Bob Mensch, a Montgomery County Republican "It's a very good budget. We've increased education to record highs, we've restored Wolf's cuts to agriculture and health care, we've provided additional funds for infrastructure, we've eliminated the possibility of tax increases. The actual revenue impact may vary from estimate since commission revenues have decreased 7.6 percent to 9.6 percent in years when fees are increased.

The average college student in Pennsylvania carries \$36,000 in debt. Under PA Student HELP, a student could refinance his or her debt and save \$10,000 over a 20-year loan repayment. This would be achieved by slicing more than 2% off the blended federal loan repayment rate of 6.25%. The savings would be more pronounced for students who financed their education through private lenders. These students, who carry an average of \$50,000 in debt and a 10% interest rate (the current average private lending rate), would save more than \$43,000 from refinancing under the bill. There are other features. The plan includes a potential \$500 per year tax credit against personal income tax liability. The program would make up to \$10 million in tax credits available. Employers also have a role to play. To retain valuable, educated staff, employers could make contributions into a 529 account and have these contributions credited toward reducing student debt. The program would also open the possibility for employees to deploy the cash equivalent of unused carryover

days to retire student debt. A final feature would boost transparency and open additional tracts of financial data to students to better understand the cost of higher education. The plan would mandate that colleges provide students with an upfront estimated cost of a four-year degree. In July 2019, Williams Was Among The Democratic Senators To Express Opposition To The USDA's Reform Of SNAP Eligibility Rules. "As you may be aware, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently opened the public comment period for proposed changes to Section 5(a) of the SNAP program. These provisions allow individuals who are eligible for or receiving benefits from other assistance programs to qualify for SNAP without having to go through a separate financial eligibility review. Pennsylvania is one of a number of states that uses this provision to make it easier for those who are seeking necessary assistance to ensure they are receiving all the benefits they are entitled to. According to the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, approximately 200,000 individuals and 120,000 households in the Commonwealth will lose benefits if the "categorically" eligible rules are changed. Of those 120,000 households, more than 36% are households with children. Feeding America estimates that more than 1.5 million Pennsylvanians are food insecure. Worse, 1 in 6 of Pennsylvania's children struggles with hunger. These numbers are staggering enough without the addition of 200,000 more who could soon be without SNAP. The current rules allow those food insecure individuals who are single parents, disabled veterans, victims of domestic violence and individuals with a disability to receive vital benefits that allow them to put a healthy, fresh meal on their table. More alarming is the effect this rule change could have on free or reduced food programs for K through 12 schools. Across the nation, 29.7 million children receive a free or reduced meal at school. In Pennsylvania more than 167 million free or reduced lunches were provided during the last school year. These meals ensure that a child, who may not get a fresh meal at home, is able to eat at least one - but often two - meals a day. SNAP is an economic support for our already struggling food and supermarket retailers, especially those in brick and mortar locations, whose businesses operate on a very thin margin, and are further challenged by the growing on-line food delivery business. This proposal on SNAP eligibility is heartless, callous, and Pennsylvanians cannot afford it. Pennsylvanians living at or near poverty recently lost the state's General Assistance program; and it has been a decade since Pennsylvania has seen a minimum wage increase. Now, the federal government is threatening to cut food assistance. We cannot continue to eliminate safety nets and the programs that move people toward self sufficiency after they have fallen on difficult times. Societies are judged by how they treat their most vulnerable; if we let this change to SNAP go unchallenged, we will fail that judgement. Our caucus will oppose the rule change in every way that we are able, and we ask that our federal

representatives join us. We, and our constituents, thank you for the advocacy you have already undertaken. We look forward to fighting with you, on behalf of those who need it most." "It's been a long, tough race, but I'm proud of the campaign I ran." According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, methane warms our planet 86 times more than carbon emissions. Earlier this month, Andrew Williams, who serves as director of Regulatory and Legislative Affairs for the Environmental Defense Fund, criticized the Pennsylvania State Department of Environmental Protection's revised draft rule because it would only mandate the capture of 21 percent of methane emissions. If the rule were adopted, Williams claims Pennsylvania would have the least protective methane rule in the nation." In 2020, Williams Was The Primary Sponsor Of Legislation To Create A State-Based Version Of The False Claims Act – A Measure Strongly Opposed By Business Interests

In 2020, Williams Was The Primary Sponsor Of Legislation To Create A State-Based Version Of The False Claims Act – A Measure Strongly Opposed By Business Interests. "Attorney General Josh Shapiro joined a bipartisan group of lawmakers at the Capitol on Monday to back a plan to enact reforms intended to combat Medicaid fraud. The reforms include legislation that would allow anyone to file a whistleblower lawsuit alleging Medicaid fraud. Hospital and business groups immediately denounced the proposal, which would create a state version of the federal False Claims Act. Gene Barr, president and CEO of the Pennsylvania Chamber of Business and Industry said the measure would allow whistleblowers and their attorneys to receive a portion of any financial settlement reached due to a False Claims Act complaint. "This leads to the plaintiffs' lawyers' recovery increasing, while the commonwealth's portion of the recovery decreases. "Pennsylvania's legal climate already creates a challenging environment for job creators," Barr said. "Enacting a FCA will exacerbate this situation by further bogging down the state's already cumbersome and overly-crowded court system." The Pennsylvania Health Care Association, representing nursing homes and assisted living facilities said the legislation would "lead to a dramatic increase in frivolous lawsuits." Thirty-one states have state versions of the False Claims Act and of the eight states that spend the most on Medicaid, only Pennsylvania lacks a state False Claims Act, Shapiro said. Shapiro said prosecutors file criminal charges when they can, but allowing for civil lawsuits to expose Medicaid fraud would reveal more fraud and prevent new abuses. "The winners are going to be the taxpayers," Shapiro said. "The people we're going to go hold accountable are fraudsters." State Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-Allegheny County, said Maryland passed its version of the False Claims Act in 2015 and New Jersey passed its False Claims Act law in 2008. Since establishing state versions of the law, Maryland has received more than \$81 million and New Jersey has recovered \$122 million in settlements from fraud complaints, she said. New York has had its False Claims Act since 2007. From 2015 to 2018, New York recovered \$55 million from lawsuits alleging fraud under the False Claims Act, according to information provided by House Republicans. ANALYSIS: This legislation proposes three separate amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania as follows:

Article I: This resolution adds a new section that would prohibit denying or abridging equality of rights under the law in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania because of the race or ethnicity of an individual.

Section 9 of Article III: This resolution would add a provision allowing for nonpresentment to the governor of a Joint Resolution terminating or extending a declaration of disaster emergency.

Article IV: This resolution adds a new section that would authorize the Governor to issue emergency declarations under circumstances provided for by law for that purpose. The General Assembly could by law grant the Governor certain enumerated powers to address and abate the declared emergency. However, a declaration by the Governor of an emergency could not last longer than 21 days unless extended by a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly approving the continuation of the declaration. Upon the expiration of the Governor's emergency declaration, the Governor could not declare a new state of emergency based upon the same or substantially similar facts and circumstances without the passage of a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly expressly approving the new emergency declaration.

DESCRIPTION

House Bill 2412 amends the Administrative Code to add a new article relating to Emergency COVID-19 provisions regarding issuance of waiver to the Governor's Business Closure Order for legal services, residential and commercial real estate related activities.

The legislation requires the Secretary of Community and Economic Development to immediately issue a waiver to the Governor's Business Closure Order to all providers of legal services, and residential and commercial real estate services, including settlement services.

Until the Governor's March 6, 2020, proclamation of disaster emergency, and any renewal of the state of disaster emergency, is terminated or expires:

If a certificate is presumed to be issued, the municipality or municipal authority shall be enjoined from conducting a property transfer inspection after the proclamation has terminated or expired; and
- Taxing authorities and public utilities shall provide alternative means for residential home buyers or title insurers to ascertain the current status of tax payments or overdue utility obligations.

All businesses issued a waiver must comply with social distancing practices and other mitigation measures defined by the Centers for Disease Control and the order issued by the Secretary of Health directing public health safety measures for businesses permitted to maintain in-person operations.

Williams is associated with the pro-abortion advocacy group known as Emily's List. In 2019, Williams opposed legislation seeking to prohibit abortion if it is being sought because the unborn child receives a prenatal diagnosis of down syndrome.

Williams appears to have backed controversial measures making concessions to transgender individuals. In 2022, Williams was critical of measures intended to ban transgender athletes from competing in women's sports.

Williams has opposed efforts to expand gun rights and voted against the expansion of adding days eligible for hunting.

One notably policy matter than appears to have consumed Williams political energy is education. Williams is a consistent opponent of charter schools and school choice, seeking to impose additional regulations on the entities while cutting funding. 



In 2019, The PA Legislature Passed Legislation Allowing For SROs To Have Their Arrest Powers Restored. "Legislation aimed at restoring arrest powers for school police that was inadvertently taken away in a school safety law enacted last summer won passage in the Senate on Wednesday. The bill, which passed by a 28-20 vote, now goes to the House of Representatives for consideration. The House could consider voting on it as soon as next week, according to a House Republican leadership spokesman. A spokesman for Gov. Tom Wolf said he will make a determination as to whether he will sign it if or when it reaches his desk. The provision to return arrest powers was added to a noncontroversial school code bill that allows for students to receive course credit upon the successful completion of a personal financial literacy course during grades nine through 12. Sen. Mike Regan, R-York County, who advocated the legislative fix to the earlier enacted school safety law, said, "I am pleased that the Legislature acted quickly to reinstate arrest powers for school police officers so they can continue to do their jobs protecting our children."" 

We plan to re-introduce legislation amending the Abortion Control Act to prohibit the abortion of any child solely due to a diagnosis of possible Down Syndrome. Last session, this legislation passed the House with a bipartisan vote of 139-56.

Under current law, a woman can obtain an abortion prior to 24 weeks gestational age for any reason if a physician deems it is necessary, except if the woman's sole reason is to select the sex of the child. This bill will expand that exception to prohibit aborting the child solely due to a prenatal diagnosis that the unborn child has Down Syndrome. Nothing in this proposal would interfere with the existing ability of a woman to obtain an abortion in cases of rape, incest or endangement to the mother, which are contained in different sections of the Abortion Control Act.



"The Pennsylvania House of Representatives is poised to vote as early as Tuesday on legislation banning transgender athletes from competing in women's sports in a move supporters say is necessary to protect athletic opportunities for young women in the commonwealth. A similar bill moved out of the Senate Education Committee on Monday by a 7-4 party-line vote. Neither stand to win Gov. Tom Wolf's signature. He regards them as discriminatory, saying they would deny opportunities to certain children. "Trans youth should know that they belong, that they are valued, and that their participation in school activities is welcomed," a spokeswoman for Wolf has said. Both the House and Senate bills are characterized as efforts to preserve Title IX, a law that forbids sex-based discrimination in federally funded education programs including athletics. "It's essential to protect the opportunities for our female athletes to compete on the athletic field," said Sen. Judy Ward, R-Blair County, who is Senate bill's sponsor along with Sen. Kristin Phillips-Hill, R-York County, during the Senate Education Committee discussion of the bill. "Allowing biological males to compete in women's sports threatens to undo the progress that we've witnessed since the enactment of Title IX," Ward said. But Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-Allegheny County, listed a number of school counselors, social workers, psychologists and administrator organizations that oppose the bill. Those groups maintain it will cause harm to students. She read from a letter the groups sent that states there is no empirical evidence that cisgender females have been negatively impacted by the inclusion of trans females on athletic teams. It goes on to point out the high rates of violence, depression, substance abuse and suicidality of trans youth and concludes with a plea not to marginalize this group of people any further. "I'm disappointed that we're voting this bill," Williams said. "This bill will cause significant harm to the mental health of our transgender students."" (The Patriot News, 4/11/22)



HB 1747 amends the Crimes Code by removing the current prohibition of carrying a firearm in public during an emergency proclamation from the State or a municipal government.

In addition, HB 1747 further amends the Health and Safety Code by removing the gubernatorial authority to limit the sale, dispensing or transportation of firearms during a disaster emergency declaration.



"She noted that Pennsylvania ranks in the bottom of all states for educational funding. "Though Gov. "Our collective future depends on making sure that everyone has access to a quality education, from early childhood, to K though 12, to career and technical education to postsecondary. Thankfully, Pennsylvania may be right near the bottom, but we have a governor who has made strategic investments over the past four years to move that line. With so many critical infrastructure needs throughout Pennsylvania, I believe this is a reasonable and necessary approach to generating the resources needed for such a program." The governor's plan would invest \$4.5 billion over the next four years on technology, economic development, and infrastructure rehabilitation projects throughout Pennsylvania." The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission estimates additional revenues of \$1.46 million in FY 2021-22, \$2.23 million in FY 2022-23, \$2.98 million in FY 2023-24 and \$3.71 million in FY 2024-25 if all the proposed increases are implemented. The actual revenue impact may vary from estimate since commission revenues have decreased 7.6 percent to 9.6 percent in years when fees are increased.

Williams Is Known To Have Held Her 2018 Victory Rally At The IUOE Local 66 HQ In O'Hara. "Unofficial voting results put Democrat Lindsey Williams narrowly ahead of Republican Jeremy Shaffer in their liberal vs. conservative, closely watched contest to capture Pennsylvania's 38th Senate District Tuesday. As of 12:20 a.m., Allegheny County's elections website showed Ms. Williams leading by a mere 540 votes out of more than 122,000 cast for the two candidates. She declared victory, saying the tally included a count of absentee ballots, but Mr. Shaffer wasn't ready to concede defeat. "This is going to be a razor-thin race . really a coin flip, and we'll have to let the election officials count all the votes," the Ross Township commissioner told more than 100 supporters at the Pomodoro Pizzeria and Ristorante in Franklin

Park just before 11:30 p.m. Ms. Williams appeared before several hundred raucous supporters at the IUOE Local 66 headquarters in O'Hara at 11:45, telling them she was eager to get to Harrisburg with hopes "to accomplish a lot for progressive voters in the 38th." "If we don't get this right, the most vulnerable people of our commonwealth will be left out to dry with no means to the very basic necessities of life, which every human should have access to." "As the wife of a chronic cancer sufferer, I am acutely aware that my family is never more than one emergency away from being unable to pay for the medicine that keeps my husband alive," said Senator Maria Collett. "This program will be a lifeline for people with disabilities, domestic violence survivors and others in crisis."" <u>SNAP</u>

In July 2019, Williams Was Among The Democratic Senators To Express Opposition To The USDA's Reform Of SNAP Eligibility Rules. "As you may be aware, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently opened the public comment period for proposed changes to Section 5(a) of the SNAP program. These provisions allow individuals who are eligible for or receiving benefits from other assistance programs to qualify for SNAP without having to go through a separate financial eligibility review. Pennsylvania is one of a number of

states that uses this provision to make it easier for those who are seeking necessary assistance to ensure they are receiving all the benefits they are entitled to. According to the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, approximately 200,000 individuals and 120,000 households in the Commonwealth will lose benefits if the "categorically" eligible rules are changed. Of those 120,000 households, more than 36% are households with children. Feeding America estimates that more than 1.5 million Pennsylvanians are food insecure. Worse, 1 in 6 of Pennsylvania's children struggles with hunger. These numbers are staggering enough without the addition of 200,000 more who could soon be without SNAP. The current rules allow those food insecure individuals who are single parents, disabled veterans, victims of domestic violence and individuals with a disability to receive vital benefits that allow them to put a healthy, fresh meal on their table. More alarming is the effect this rule change could have on free or reduced food programs for K through 12 schools. Across the nation, 29.7 million children receive a free or reduced meal at school. In Pennsylvania more than 167 million free or reduced lunches were provided during the last school year. These meals ensure that a child, who may not get a fresh meal at home, is able to eat at least one - but often two - meals a day. SNAP is an economic support for our already struggling food and supermarket retailers, especially those in brick and mortar locations, whose businesses operate on a very thin margin, and are further challenged by the growing on-line food delivery business. This proposal on SNAP eligibility is heartless, callous, and Pennsylvanians cannot afford it. Pennsylvanians living at or near poverty recently lost the state's General Assistance program; and it has been a decade since Pennsylvania has seen a minimum wage increase. Now, the federal government is threatening to cut food assistance. We cannot continue to eliminate safety nets and the programs that move people toward self sufficiency after they have fallen on difficult times. Societies are judged by how they treat their most vulnerable; if we let this change to SNAP go unchallenged, we will fail that judgement. Our caucus will oppose the rule change in every way that we are able, and we ask that our federal representatives join us. We, and our constituents, thank you for the advocacy you have already undertaken. We look forward to fighting with you, on behalf of those who need it most." Biden Infrastructure Bill

In August 2021, Williams Noted She Was Supportive Of The Biden Infrastructure Bill. "State Sen. Lindsey Williams, a Democrat representing parts of the city of Pittsburgh, North Hills and the Allegheny River Valley, expects the proposed federal infrastructure package could ease some of the strain on her phone lines. Constituents most often call for two reasons, she said: unemployment and infrastructure. Infrastructure, in this case, covers everything from flooding to sewer systems to constituents who don't have access to a bus line that they need to get to work. The Biden administration's infrastructure bill could "address and help solve" those issues, Ms. Williams said Thursday at a news conference with Democratic lawmakers and leaders. "Not only will it solve those problems of flooding for our neighbors and dangerous conditions, it will also help put people back to work," she said. "Yes it's good union jobs for construction workers that you see on the side of the road but it's also engineers and architects and the pizza shop down the road where those workers go and take their lunch break. "This is so important that we get together and put those politics aside and vote for an infrastructure package that's going to help our communities," Ms. Williams said. In 2019, Williams And Muth Were Among The Democratic Senators To Vote In Committee Against A Resolution Urging Passage Of The USMCA. "The Pennsylvania Senate State Government Committee advanced a resolution by a vote of 7-4 along party lines encouraging Congress to approve the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement. Democrats Anthony Williams, Maria Collett, Katie Muth and Lindsey Williams voted no last week to Senate Resolution 153 sponsored by Sen. Kristin Phillips-Hill, R-York. "Until those changes relative to ensuring labor standards, certain environmental provisions as well as enforcement of the deal itself. ... I will be a 'no' vote," Muth said. Sen. Doug Mastriano, R-Franklin County, countered Muth's statements with support of the bill. "Once it passes, I believe we'll see a boom for our industry and agriculture here across Pennsylvania and then maybe once again Pennsylvania will be open for business." False Claims Act

In 2020, Williams Was The Primary Sponsor Of Legislation To Create A State-Based Version Of The False Claims Act – A Measure Strongly Opposed By Business Interests. "Attorney General Josh Shapiro joined a bipartisan group of lawmakers at the Capitol on Monday to back a plan to enact reforms intended to combat Medicaid fraud. The reforms include legislation that would allow anyone to file a whistleblower lawsuit alleging Medicaid fraud. Hospital and business groups immediately denounced the proposal, which would create a state version of the federal False Claims Act. Gene Barr, president and CEO of the Pennsylvania Chamber of Business and Industry said the measure would allow whistleblowers and their attorneys to receive a portion of any financial settlement reached due to a False Claims Act complaint. "This leads to the plaintiffs' lawyers' recovery increasing, while the commonwealth's portion of the recovery decreases. "Pennsylvania's legal climate already creates a challenging environment for job creators," Barr said. "Enacting a FCA will exacerbate this situation by further bogging down the state's already cumbersome and overly-crowded court system." The Pennsylvania Health Care Association, representing nursing homes and assisted living facilities said the legislation would "lead to a dramatic increase in frivolous lawsuits." Thirty-one states have state versions of the False Claims Act and of the eight states that spend the most on

Medicaid, only Pennsylvania lacks a state False Claims Act, Shapiro said. Shapiro said prosecutors file criminal charges when they can, but allowing for civil lawsuits to expose Medicaid fraud would reveal more fraud and prevent new abuses. "The winners are going to be the taxpayers," Shapiro said. "The people we're going to go hold accountable are fraudsters." State Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-Allegheny County, said Maryland passed its version of the False Claims Act in 2015 and New Jersey passed its False Claims Act law in 2008. Since establishing state versions of the law, Maryland has received more than \$81 million and New Jersey has recovered \$122 million in settlements from fraud complaints, she said. New York has had its False Claims Act since 2007. From 2015 to 2018, New York recovered \$55 million from lawsuits alleging fraud under the False Claims Act, according to information provided by House Republicans. In November 2018, PA Senate Democrats Held A Hearing On Efforts To Address Climate Change And Were Critical Of The Trump Administration's Decision To Withdraw From The Paris Climate Accord. 'The Pennsylvania Senate Democrats issued the following news release: At the request of state Senate Democratic Leader Jay Costa, the Senate Democratic Policy Committee today held a hearing in Pittsburgh on local and state efforts to address climate change. "In the absence of federal leadership on climate change, it is imperative that Pennsylvania continue to participate in cooperative efforts to stave off the catastrophic consequences of global warming," Costa (D-Allegheny) said. "We need to maintain efforts to keep Pennsylvania on track to combat climate change." Sen. Lisa Boscola (D-Northampton/Lehigh), who chairs the committee, added, "Controlling carbon emissions and building a strong economy are not competing interests. There are numerous ways we can slow the devastating effects of climate change while strengthening and expanding our economy." In withdrawing from the Paris Climate Accord in 2017, President Donald Trump defended his decision by claiming he was "elected to represent the citizens of Pittsburgh, not Paris." Costa and Sen. Wayne Fontana (D-Allegheny) immediately joined Pittsburgh Mayor Bill Peduto in criticizing the president's decision. In the accord, the United States had committed to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by 26-28 percent below the 2005 level in 2025, and to make "best efforts" to reduce emissions by 28 percent. That would include curbs on carbon dioxide, methane, nitrous oxide, perfluorocarbons, sulfur hexafluoride and nitrogen trifluoride, all of which contribute to global warming." "At the request of state Senate Democratic Leader Jay Costa (D-Forest Hills) and Senator Wayne Fontana (D-Brookline), the Senate Democratic Policy Committee held a hearing today in Pittsburgh on strategies for combatting climate change by reducing methane gas emissions. "Methane has a huge impact on global warming," Costa said. "As the second largest gas-producing state in the nation, it is imperative that Pennsylvania do all it can to reduce methane emissions." Fontana added, "While our federal government should be taking the lead on developing policies, emissions reduction goals and coordinating a national response on climate change, our president's shameful abandonment of the Paris climate accord makes it imperative that state leaders take the helm on this critical issue." Methane is an odorless, colorless, flammable greenhouse gas (CH4) that is used as fuel. It is also an important source of hydrogen and part of a wide variety of organic compounds. Methane is a huge component of natural gas and can remain in the atmosphere for about 9 to 15 years. According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, methane warms our planet 86 times more than carbon emissions. Earlier this month, Andrew Williams, who serves as director of Regulatory and Legislative Affairs for the Environmental Defense Fund, criticized the Pennsylvania State Department of Environmental Protection's revised draft rule because it would only mandate the capture of 21 percent of methane emissions. If the rule were adopted, Williams claims Pennsylvania would have the least protective methane rule in the nation." "It gives a voice back to the people by allowing those of us who represent them to have a say in this process," Struzzi, an Indiana Republican, said in a news release. "Given Pennsylvania is already ahead of the carbon dioxide reduction goals established under the governor's Climate Action Plan, why would we want to jeopardize thousands of Pennsylvania jobs and trigger significantly higher electricity rate increases when the existing competitive market has already achieved these gains?" The vote was 33-17, with one Republican, Thomas Killion of Delaware County, voting in the minority and five Democrats, Christine Tartaglione of Philadelphia and Allegheny County senators James Brewster, Wayne Fontana, Pam Iovino and Lindsey Williams voting with the majority." In April 2022, Williams Sided With Republicans In An Unsuccessful Attempt To Override Wolf's Veto Of A Resolution Blocking The RGGI Rules From Going Into Effect. "A bare minimum of Senate Democrats held fast with Gov. Tom Wolf Monday to win a vote that likely represents the last major legislative hurdle to Pennsylvania's participation in a multi-state capand-trade program aimed at gradually weaning the state's power generation industry away from fossil fuels like natural gas and coal. On a 32-17 vote, the program's opponents came up one vote short of the two-thirds majority needed to block Pennsylvania's entry into the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative, which requires power plant operators in member states to pay for each ton of carbon emissions they generate. All Republicans voted to override Wolf's veto of their resolution blocking RGGI rules from taking effect, along with Democrat Sens. Jim Brewster, Wayne Fontana and Lindsey Williams, all of Allegheny County. The rest of the 20-member Democratic caucus stuck with the governor. One seat in the 50-member chamber is vacant. "We can fix this problem by setting strict, healthbased emissions limits on polluters; making sure they face meaningful penalties if and when they break the law; and ensuring our region has strong clean air champions who fight for residents. We, the undersigned local elected officials from across Allegheny County, are committing to make Allegheny County a great place to live and breathe." "We all know Pittsburgh's history of industrial pollution, but many of our communities continue to live that history today. Every Pennsylvanian, regardless of race, class or where they live, has a right to clean air and water, and that includes the people of Pittsburgh," said State Rep. Jake Wheatley. "It is immoral that in this day and age we continue to struggle to breathe, that the very air poisons our children and elderly neighbors."" Williams Voted Nay On SB 790, Which Establishes The Conventional Oil And Gas Wells Act. (SB 790, Bill Passed - Senate (26-23), Pennsylvania State Senate, 10/21/19, Williams Voted Nay)

Williams Voted Yea On SB 596, To Provide For Transportation Fueling Infrastructure Development. (SB 596, Bill Passed - Senate (43-6), Pennsylvania State Senate, 11/19/19, Williams Voted Yea)

Medicare For All/Single-Payer

<u>Overview</u>

In October 2018, Williams Was Reported By Pittsburgh City Paper To Be Among The Candidates To Support A Single-Payer/ Medicare For All System. "PREVIOUSLY, a Medicare-for-all health care system had been mostly considered a fringe idea on the left. But over the last couple of years, the idea of Americans getting insurance from a single government insurance plan, or single-payer, has taken off in popularity. According to a recent poll, 52 percent of Pennsylvanians support Medicare-for-all, while 29 percent oppose it. State Democrats are joining the public. Progressive candidates like Sara In-namorato and Summer Lee won competitive primaries while advocating for Medicare-for-all. Moderate Democratic state Rep. Adam Ravenstahl said he would support single-payer if Democrats took control of the legislature. Even Democrats running in very red districts, like Terri Mitko in Beaver County, are considering backing single-payer. State Republicans, on the other hand, are attacking Democrats for their support. Mailers linked to GOP state Senate candidate Jeremy Shaffer's campaign called his Democratic opponent, Lindsey Williams, a radical for her single-payer support. For Medicare-for-all to stand a chance at becoming a reality, Democrats must take the state House and Senate, and then some. Even then, it would be a heavy load with several details to finalize. Masking

In September 2021, Williams Was Critical Of GOP Legislation Allowing Parents To Let Their Children Opt Out Of School Mask Mandates; Williams Noted Her Support For Universal School Mask Mandates. "Fourteen schoolchildren have died in Pennsylvania from COVID-19, Mastriano said, further pointing to the age group's 'resiliency.' 'Parents throughout our districts have echoed their concerns about the negative impacts of mask wearing on their children,' Ward said. 'Parents know what their children are going through and parents can assess these risks and decide whether a mask is necessary for their children's health and success in school.' Democratic Chairwoman Lindsey Williams, D-Pittsburgh, questioned the data Mastriano and Ward relied upon for their bill. She also said parents, educators and medical professionals have expressed to her their support for universal masking as a way to protect children from the virus and keep schools open for in-person instruction. 'There's a lot of risk I'm not willing to take with our kids,' she said. 'Fourteen deaths is tragic. How many deaths does it take to change your mind on mask mandates?' Mastriano reiterated that while all deaths are tragic, 'heavy handed, draconian edicts' go too far. 'Where do you stop? This is overreach by the government and it's time to let parents decide,' he said. 'Parents know best - not any government official or bureaucrat.' Remote Participation

In April 2021, Williams Was Critical Of Suggestions Calling For Senators To Return To In-Person Proceedings Despite The Lack Of Universal Vaccine Access And The Tendency **Of Some Legislators To Forgo Masks.** "But two younger members of the Senate Democratic Caucus – Sens. Lindsey Williams of Allegheny County and Amanda Cappelletti of Delaware County – made it clear Corman's memo was disturbing to them. They found it disappointing that he would want to return to in-person sessions before all senators and staffers were eligible to schedule their COVID-19 vaccination. (On Monday, Gov. Tom Wolf and the vaccine task force announced starting on Tuesday, all Pennsylvania adults were eligible to schedule an appointment.) Emergency Declaration

In June 2021, Williams Was Critical Of The Pennsylvania Senate For Voting To End Gov. Tom Wolf's Emergency Declaration. "The amendment, hammered out overnight by the General Assembly and the Wolf administration, takes into account the special conditions and for at least some of them extends their end until Sept. 30. It wasn't immediately clear what the amendments said and trade group representatives also weren't exactly sure at the final language. The amendments have to be approved by the House as well. Yet Democrats, in a sometimes sharp exchange on the Senate floor, warned that approving the resolution to end the emergency declaration threatened federal funding for SNAP and potentially other programs. Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-Allegheny County, called it "an act of political theater." Sen. Amanda M. Cappelletti, D-Chester County, agreed. Legislative Oversight Of Emergency Declarations

Williams Voted Nay On SB 1166, Which "Amends The Constitution Of Pennsylvania Providing For Equality Of Rights Because Of Race And Ethnicity, Concurrent Orders And Resolutions, And For Disaster Emergency Declaration And Management." (SB 1166, Bill Passed - Senate (33-17), Pennsylvania State Senate, 7/15/20, Williams Voted Nay) **ANALYSIS:** This legislation proposes three separate amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania as follows:

<u>Article I:</u> This resolution adds a new section that would prohibit denying or abridging equality of rights under the law in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania because of the race or ethnicity of an individual.

Section 9 of Article III: This resolution would add a provision allowing for nonpresentment to the governor of a Joint Resolution terminating or extending a declaration of disaster emergency.

Article IV: This resolution adds a new section that would authorize the Governor to issue emergency declarations under circumstances provided for by law for that purpose. The General Assembly could by law grant the Governor certain enumerated powers to address and abate the declared emergency. However, a declaration by the Governor of an emergency could not last longer than 21 days unless extended by a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly approving the continuation of the declaration. Upon the expiration of the Governor's emergency declaration, the Governor could not declare a new state of emergency based upon the same or substantially similar facts and circumstances without the passage of a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly expressly approving the new emergency declaration.

Business Closures And Shutdowns

In May 2020, Williams Accused Republicans Of "Grandstanding" After They Subpoenaed Documents Relating To Business Closure Waivers Relating To The Wolf Administration's COVID-19 Response. "The subpoenas, signed by Regan to be sent to Davin and Wolf, ask for a response by Friday, May 8, the same day that Wolf has said some areas of Pennsylvania will be allowed to partially re-open. Senate Republicans could take Wolf to court for violating their legal subpoena power if the deadline is not met, Corman said. Democratic Senator Lindsey Williams, the minority chair of the Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee, said Republicans are "grandstanding for clips that will be used in future campaign advertisements," and questioned why the committee was not working on legislation to address the spread of the novel coronavirus in the state's veterans' homes. The Southeastern Veterans' Center in Chester County has seen 26 residents die of COIVD-19, according to a report this week from the Philadelphia Inquirer. "But we aren't talking about that today in the veterans' affairs committee," Williams said. DESCRIPTION

House Bill 2412 amends the Administrative Code to add a new article relating to Emergency COVID-19 provisions regarding issuance of waiver to the Governor's Business Closure Order for legal services, residential and commercial real estate related activities.

The legislation requires the Secretary of Community and Economic Development to immediately issue a waiver to the Governor's Business Closure Order to all providers of legal services, and residential and commercial real estate services, including settlement services.

Until the Governor's March 6, 2020, proclamation of disaster emergency, and any renewal of the state of disaster emergency, is terminated or expires:

- A municipality or municipal authority that requires a use and occupancy certificate, or any other similar certificate or certification as a condition of a property transfer, shall be presumed to have issued a full and unconditional permit without requiring an inspection of the property. If a certificate is presumed to be issued, the municipality or municipal authority shall be enjoined from conducting a property transfer inspection after the proclamation has terminated or expired; and
- Taxing authorities and public utilities shall provide alternative means for residential home buyers or title insurers to ascertain the current status of tax payments or overdue utility obligations.

All businesses issued a waiver must comply with social distancing practices and other mitigation measures defined by the Centers for Disease Control and the order issued by the Secretary of Health directing public health safety measures for businesses permitted to maintain in-person operations.

In May 2019, Williams Was Among The Democratic Legislators To Call For Additional **Education Funding And Opposition To Legislation Weakening School District Oversight** Of Charter Schools. "Allegheny Traditional Academy, a K-5 school on the North Side that was built in 1904, needs about \$10 million worth of "significant" capital improvements just so it can remain functional and safe for teachers and students, educators say. Pittsburgh Public Schools Superintendent Anthony Hamlet highlighted the building during a news conference at the school Thursday in which he and several other local educators and advocates called on the Pennsylvania Legislature to provide better funding for public schools. "To do what is right for our kids, we must acknowledge the financial stressors that our district is under," Mr. Hamlet said. "I look forward to working with members of the Legislature, the Pennsylvania Department of Education and to ensure students in Pittsburgh Public Schools receive the valuable resources they deserve." He was joined by state Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-West View; PPS board member Sylvia Wilson; Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers President Nina Esposito-Visgitis; and Angel Gober, an education organizer with ONE Pennsylvania. During brief remarks, they called on the state to invest more in its public schools, particularly in programs like PlanCon for capital improvement and building projects. They want lawmakers to reject proposed legislation they believe will weaken school district oversight on charter schools, and they want to prevent the expansion of the Education Improvement Tax Credit program." In May 2019, Williams Was Among A Group Of Democratic Legislators Who "Decried Proposed Legislation Regarding Facilities That Charter Schools Can Use And Creating A Uniform Application Process For New Charter Schools; A \$100 Million Expansion Of The EITC Private School Scholarship Program, Which Ms. Williams Called A "Back Door Voucher Program"; The Makeup Of The Charter Appeals Board, Whose Members Were Appointed Years Ago By Former Gov. Tom Corbett; And Funding For Cybercharter

Schools, Which They Argue Should Be Lower Because They Have Lower Overhead Costs Than Brick-And-Mortar Schools." "She noted that Pennsylvania ranks in the bottom of all states for educational funding. "Though Gov. [Tom] Wolf has supported education by increasing funding each year since he was elected - and we do appreciate that - it's unacceptable for a state that leads in so many ways." During the news conference, the group decried proposed legislation regarding facilities that charter schools can use and creating a uniform application process for new charter schools; a \$100 million expansion of the EITC private school scholarship program, which Ms. Williams called a "back door voucher program"; the makeup of the Charter Appeals Board, whose members were appointed years ago by former Gov. Tom Corbett; and funding for cybercharter schools, which they argue should be lower because they have lower overhead costs than brick-and-mortar schools. Public school districts pay charter schools "tuition" for students who live within the district's borders and attend a charter school. Some of the speakers argued that the charter schools and the EITC program siphon money from school districts and students who need the most resources. "We all know that one of the best investments we can make as a commonwealth is in education," Ms. Williams said. "Our collective future depends on making sure that everyone has access to a quality education, from early childhood, to K though 12, to career and technical education to postsecondary. Thankfully, Pennsylvania may be right near the bottom, but we have a governor who has made strategic investments over the past four years to move that line. Williams Voted Nay On HB 800, Which Amends Article XX-B (Educational Tax Credits) Of The Public School Code To Make Changes To The Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) Program. (<u>HB 800</u>, Bill Passed - Senate (28-21), Pennsylvania State Senate, 6/11/19, Williams Voted Nay)

 NOTE: "House Bill 800 amends Article XX-B (Educational Tax Credits) of the Public School Code to make changes to the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program. The legislation increases the total amount of tax credits available for contributions to scholarship organizations by \$100 million from the current \$110 million to \$210 million. Beginning July 1, 2019, the legislation provides for the amount of tax credits available for contributions to scholarship organizations to increase by 10% annually if more than 90% of the total aggregate amount of tax credits are used by taxpayers during the prior fiscal year and the General Assembly has not otherwise enacted an increase to the dollar amount provided for scholarship organizations." The organization then provides the funds as vouchers to parents so they can enroll their child in a private or charter school. Under the bill, the cap on the amount of tax credits that may be issued each year would be increased from \$100 million to \$210 million, thus allowing more funding to be redirected to school choice. It follows Wolf's call last year to overhaul Pennsylvania's rules for charter school funding and accountability, as districts statewide complained about how their budgets are affected by schools that they say they have insufficient ability to regulate. "Governor Wolf helped establish a charter school in York County and is a longtime supporter of school choice, but real choice means quality learning. While some charter schools provide a great education, many charters, especially cyber charter schools, have poor educational outcomes. The plan ensures charter schools are providing students with a quality education. Despite costing taxpayers more than \$2 billion a year, charter schools have little public oversight and no publicly elected school board. For-profit companies that manage many charter schools are not required to have independent financial audits. The governor's plan increases transparency to restore the public's trust in charter schools by holding the for-profit companies that manage many of the schools to the same financial and ethical standards as school districts. The governor was joined for a press conference by Sen. Lindsey Williams and Rep. Joe Ciresi, State College Area School District Superintendent Dr. Robert O'Donnell and Bellefonte Area School District Board member Donna Smith. Sens. Joe Ciresi, D-Royersford, And Educational Leaders From Across The State To Stump For A Forthcoming Bill That Standardizes Charter School Tuition Rates And Adds Accountability Provisions To Give Local Districts A Clearer View Of How The Funding Gets Spent." "Gov. Tom Wolf said recently that cutting funding and increasing accountability for underperforming charter schools makes better use of taxpayer dollars than the current system. "If we don't fix the problems in our charter schools now, we are setting our children up for failure and that's unacceptable," Wolf said during a news conference. "We are also charging our taxpayers too much and that's unacceptable. Both of these are unacceptable." But school choice groups say the repackaged messaging doesn't change the fact that districts don't undergo the same level of scrutiny or face funding cuts for poor student performance. "Pennsylvania families across the Commonwealth are enjoying their lawful rights to enrolling their children in public charter schools," said Lenny McAllister, CEO of the Pennsylvania Coalition of Public Charter Schools. "The General Assembly created charter schools 24 years ago to be a public alternative to school districts for families who couldn't afford the educational choices available to those with the resources to pay for it. The governor wants to slash funding and limit these options for our state's neediest families to benefit his political allies." The governor joined Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-Pittsburgh, Rep. Joe Ciresi, D-Royersford, and educational leaders from across the state to stump for a forthcoming bill that standardizes charter school tuition rates and adds accountability provisions to give local districts a clearer view of how the funding gets spent." In June 2021, Williams Was Vocally Opposed To SB 1, Which Proposed To Dramatically **Increase The Tax Credits Available To Corporations That Donated To Scholarship Funds** For Private Schools. "It also boosts the cap available for tax credits to fund innovative public education programs from \$37.5 million to \$50 million and for pre-kindergarten scholarship organizations from \$12.5 million to \$15 million. Further, it provides for an automatic 25% increase in the amount of tax credits available if 90% or more of the tax credits are claimed in the prior year, which would begin in 2022-23. Could property taxes rise? Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-Allegheny County, said with that automatic escalator included, it means these tax credits could swell to a maximum of \$1 billion in five years, \$3 billion in 10 years, and \$8.5 billion in 15 years. "Senate Bill 1 is entitled Excellence in Education for All but I'm struggling with how this bill accomplishes that," Williams said. "Senate Bill 1 is a massive tax break for corporations which ultimately leads to incredible increases to property taxes for average Pennsylvanians." She also was critical of the bill's failure to reform how cyber charter schools are funded as well as to apply the special education funding formula that the state uses to distribute money to school districts to charter schools. 

In January 2019, Williams Urged The PA Charter School Appeal Board To Reject Catalyst Academy's Appeal Of Their Denied Charter Application By The Pittsburgh Public School **Board.** "The Pennsylvania Senate Democrats issued the following news release: Senator Lindsey Williams joined education advocates and representatives of One Pennsylvania, Education Rights Network, Pennsylvania Interface Impact Network, and the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers today to urge the Pennsylvania Charter School Appeal Board to reject Catalyst Academy's efforts to challenge the denial of their charter application. "I listened to the Catalyst Academy presentation and read their materials with an open mind during their application," said Senator Williams, "but what I found was that Catalyst's proposed charter school didn't offer anything that Pittsburgh Public Schools doesn't already offer to its students." Pittsburgh Public School board members unanimously rejected the Catalyst Academy charter application in February 2018, citing concerns including the school's overbroad, aggressive proposed disciplinary policies and lack of plans to meet the needs of special education students. "We're here today asking the Charter School Appeal Board to look at the mountain of evidence that the Pittsburgh Public School Board has presented about the deficiencies in Catalyst Academy's application and to follow existing charter school law and deny the application."" In February 2019, "Catalyst Academy, A Proposed Kindergarten Through Eighth Grade Charter School, Won Its Appeal To The State By A 3-2 Vote, After The Board Of Pittsburgh Public Schools Denied The School's Charter Application In A Unanimous Vote In February 2018." "The Pennsylvania Charter Appeals Board voted Tuesday to overturn a decision of the Pittsburgh school board and approve a new charter school in the city. Catalyst Academy, a proposed kindergarten through eighth grade charter school, won its appeal to the state by a 3-2 vote, after the board of Pittsburgh Public Schools denied the school's charter application in a unanimous vote in February 2018. In a news release, leaders for Catalyst Academy argued that it had the strongest charter application of any considered in recent years by the city school board. "We developed a detailed, innovative school plan that has now been recognized by both Pittsburgh school district experts and the (Pennsylvania) Charter Appeals Board as having met the rigorous criteria," said Brian Smith, Catalyst's founder and CEO, in a statement. "We are excited that today's decision enables us to put our plan into action and provide a high-quality school that prepares our future students for college, career and life."" "A bill that would require school districts to post curriculum online received approval from a key Senate panel on Monday. The Senate Education Committee voted along party lines to advance House Bill 1332[1] to the chamber floor for consideration. '[The bill] allows parents to play a greater and more active role in the oversight of what their children are being taught,' said Sen. Doug Mastriano, R-Gettysburg, before noting that giving online access to the course information will help 'restore trust.' But Democrats on the committee warned that unfunded mandate will further burden school staff and invite unwarranted criticism. 'I'm all for transparency and accountability but right here we have an unfunded mandate on school districts who are already under a lot of pressure,' said Democratic Chairwoman Lindsey Williams. 'And this is also part of a larger movement to pit the public against teachers and politicize education while undermining the teaching of accurate history and racial and cultural confidence.' In 2019, Williams Was Among The Democratic Senators To Propose A \$1 Billion Program, Funded By Bonds, To Help Borrowers Pay Down Student Loan Debt. "The following information was released by the Pennsylvania State Senator Vincent J. Hughes: A bold and innovative plan to help students and their families save thousands of dollars, pay down crushing student loan debt and better deal with the high cost of borrowing was unveiled by Sens. Vincent J. Hughes (D-Philadelphia/Montgomery), Katie Muth (D-Montgomery/Chester) and Lindsey Williams (D-Allegheny) today. The plan, called the PA Student HELP (Higher Education Lending Protection) Act, is a multi-pronged effort which allows students to refinance highinterest debt and provide tax credits for those who have outstanding student loans. The plan also includes incentives for employers to help pay down student loan debt of their employees. The refinancing program aimed at curbing excessive student debt would be funded by up to \$1 billion in bond financing. "It's plain and simple: students face crushing loan obligations once they complete years of higher education," Hughes said. "Not only is the expense of postsecondary education sky high, but the cost of borrowing to meet tuition and living expenses financially cripples graduates for years." Early Estimates Indicate That More Than 28,000 Students Would Benefit From It." "PA Student HELP calls for refinancing highinterest student debt using up to \$1 billion in bond financing. Early estimates indicate that more than 28,000 students would benefit from it. In Pennsylvania today, there is \$68 billion in outstanding student loan debt — the highest student loan debt per capita in the United States. Nearly 2 million Pennsylvanians carry student loan debt. The average college student in Pennsylvania carries \$36,000 in debt. Under PA Student HELP, a student could refinance his or her debt and save \$10,000 over a 20-year loan repayment. This would be achieved by slicing more than 2% off the blended federal loan repayment rate of 6.25%. The savings would be more pronounced for students who financed their education through private lenders. These students, who carry an average of \$50,000 in debt and a 10% interest rate (the current average private lending rate), would save more than \$43,000 from refinancing under the bill. There are other features. The plan includes a potential \$500 per year tax credit against personal income tax liability. The program would make up to \$10 million in tax credits available. Employers also have a role to play. To retain valuable, educated staff, employers could make contributions into a 529 account and have these contributions credited toward reducing student debt. The program would also open the possibility for employees to deploy the cash equivalent of unused carryover days to retire student debt. A final feature would boost transparency and open additional tracts of financial data to students to better understand the cost of higher education. The plan would mandate that colleges provide students with an upfront estimated cost of a four-year degree. 

In 2019, The PA Legislature Passed Legislation Allowing For SROs To Have Their Arrest Powers Restored. "Legislation aimed at restoring arrest powers for school police that was inadvertently taken away in a school safety law enacted last summer won passage in the Senate on Wednesday. The bill, which passed by a 28-20 vote, now goes to the House of Representatives for consideration. The House could consider voting on it as soon as next week, according to a House Republican leadership spokesman. A spokesman for Gov. Tom Wolf said he will make a determination as to whether he will sign it if or when it reaches his desk. The provision to return arrest powers was added to a noncontroversial school code bill that allows for students to receive course credit upon the successful completion of a personal financial literacy course during grades nine through 12. Sen. Mike Regan, R-York County, who advocated the legislative fix to the earlier enacted school safety law, said, "I am pleased that the Legislature acted quickly to reinstate arrest powers for school police officers so they can continue to do their jobs protecting our children." 

We plan to re-introduce legislation amending the Abortion Control Act to prohibit the abortion of any child solely due to a diagnosis of possible Down Syndrome. Last session, this legislation passed the House with a bipartisan vote of 139-56.

Under current law, a woman can obtain an abortion prior to 24 weeks gestational age for any reason if a physician deems it is necessary, except if the woman's sole reason is to select the sex of the child. This bill will expand that exception to prohibit aborting the child solely due to a prenatal diagnosis that the unborn child has Down Syndrome. Nothing in this proposal would interfere with the existing ability of a woman to obtain an abortion in cases of rape, incest or endangerment to the mother, which are contained in different sections of the Abortion Control Act.



senwilliamspa In light of District Attorney Stephen Zappala's retaliatory actions against clients of attorney Milton Raiford, a Black attorney who called out the systemic racism of the Allegheny County DA's office, I am joining my House colleagues in asking for Mr. Zappala to do the following: 1. Immediately rescind this policy and publicly commit to enacting policies in the DA's office that seek justice fairly and impartially; 2. Formally apologize to Attorney Raiford and to the residents of Allegheny County for using the position that they entrusted to him

to pursue vengeance and not justice; and 3. Open his office to a review by a special prosecutor of cases of Raiford and other attorneys, like Frank Walker, who may have agreed with Raiford's statements regarding how defendants were treated.

ANALYSIS:

HB 1747 amends the Crimes Code by removing the current prohibition of carrying a firearm in public during an emergency proclamation from the State or a municipal government.

In addition, HB 1747 further amends the Health and Safety Code by removing the gubernatorial authority to limit the sale, dispensing or transportation of firearms during a disaster emergency declaration.





In January 2022, Williams And Muth Were Among The Senators To Back A Proposed Reform To Remove Sex From Birth Certificates In Order To Better Accommodate Transgender Individuals. "State Senate Democrats want to remove sex from Pennsylvania birth certificates among a series of policy changes they say will make life in the commonwealth easier for transgender individuals. In a joint memo seeking support for legislation they're about to propose, Sens. Tim Kearney, Amanda Cappelletti, Katie Muth and Lindsey Williams told their colleagues they were motivated to introduce a package of bills after a Senate Democratic Policy Hearing in June taught them more about the challenges facing transgender Pennsylvanians. The senators said they want to "remove some of the legal barriers the LGBTQ community faces when living as their authentic selves." "Soon, we intend to introduce legislation to protect individual privacy and prevent discrimination by removing sex designations on PA birth certificates," the memo said. As of Wednesday, the proposed legislation from Senate Democrats was little more than a wish list and likely to stay that way in the Republican-controlled Legislature." (*The Herald-Mail*, 1/24/22)

In April 2022, Williams Was Critical Of Measures Intended To Ban Transgender Athletes From Competing In Women's Sports. "The Pennsylvania House of Representatives is poised to vote as early as Tuesday on legislation banning transgender athletes from competing in women's sports in a move supporters say is necessary to protect athletic opportunities for young women in the commonwealth. A similar bill moved out of the Senate Education Committee on Monday by a 7-4 party-line vote. Neither stand to win Gov. Tom Wolf's signature. He regards

them as discriminatory, saying they would deny opportunities to certain children. "Trans youth should know that they belong, that they are valued, and that their participation in school activities is welcomed," a spokeswoman for Wolf has said. Both the House and Senate bills are characterized as efforts to preserve Title IX, a law that forbids sex-based discrimination in federally funded education programs including athletics. "It's essential to protect the opportunities for our female athletes to compete on the athletic field," said Sen. Judy Ward, R-Blair County, who is Senate bill's sponsor along with Sen. Kristin Phillips-Hill, R-York County, during the Senate Education Committee discussion of the bill. "Allowing biological males to compete in women's sports threatens to undo the progress that we've witnessed since the enactment of Title IX," Ward said. But Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-Allegheny County, listed a number of school counselors, social workers, psychologists and administrator organizations that oppose the bill. Those groups maintain it will cause harm to students. She read from a letter the groups sent that states there is no empirical evidence that cisgender females have been negatively impacted by the inclusion of trans females on athletic teams. It goes on to point out the high rates of violence, depression, substance abuse and suicidality of trans youth and concludes with a plea not to marginalize this group of people any further. Hunting

In June 2021, Williams Was Among The Legislators To Vote In Committee Against A Measure Adding Sunday Hunting Days. "The Senate Game and Fisheries Committee have voted to approve legislation that would allow the Game Commission to determine how many Sundays should be open to hunting. Current law limits Sunday hunting to three weekends and until last year, Sunday hunting was prohibited. Act 107 of 2019, which was introduced as Senate Bill 147, allowed the Pennsylvania Game Commission to designate three Sundays for hunting. Last year, Sunday hunting debuted in Pennsylvania with hunting allowed on Sunday, Nov. 15 for archery deer hunting and the following two Sundays for firearms bear season and firearms deer season. Senate Bill 607, sponsored by state Sen. Dan Laughlin, R-Erie County, the chairman of the Game and Fisheries Committee, would completely repeal the Sunday hunting ban and allow the Game Commission to determine how many hunting seasons should include Sunday hunting. The measure was approved by the Game and Fisheries committee by a 7-4 vote with three Republicans — Senate President Pro Tem Jake Corman, R-Centre County, Sen. Cris Dush, R-Indiana County and Sen. Scott Hutchison, R-Venango County — and state Sen. Lindsey Williams, D-Allegheny County, opposed." (*The Danville News*, 6/16/21)

In February 2019, "State Sen. Lindsey Williams, Who Flipped The 38th District To Democratic In November, Said The Success Of The Progressive Agenda Will Rely On Help From Advocacy Groups To Ensure That Legislators Do "The Right Thing."" "But beyond elections, progressives spoke of the need to put pressure on legislators who don't back their agenda. State Sen. Lindsey Williams, who flipped the 38th district to Democratic in November, said the success of the progressive agenda will rely on help from advocacy groups to ensure that legislators do "the right thing." Kadida Kenner, director of campaigns for the Pennsylvania Budget and Policy Center, encouraged the audience to visit offices of representatives in the area, and to call the leadership of the state Legislature. 2018 Complaint

In October 2018, The Pennsylvania Republican Party Filed A Lawsuit Contending That Williams Was Ineligible To Run Due To Not Having Lived In Pennsylvania For 4 Consecutive Years. "The following information was released by the Pennsylvania Republican Party: Monday, a lawsuit was filed to declare SD-38 Democrat nominee Lindsey Williams ineligible to hold the seat she aspires to due to failing to meet the constitutionally-required residency requirements. Williams falls several weeks short of meeting the four-year Pennsylvania residency requirement in order to run for a seat and serve in the Pennsylvania General Assembly. In response, Republican Party of Pennsylvania Chairman Val DiGiorgio , made the following statement: "The Republican Party of Pennsylvania stands by our legal analysis that shows Lindsey Williams fails the constitutionally-required residency requirements and is ineligible to hold a seat in the Pennsylvania General Assembly at this time. "Lindsey Williams running while ineligible to serve as a state legislator is, at best, demonstrating her ignorance of the PA Constitution and Pennsylvania law at worst, it is lying to the voters of Pennsylvania about her eligibility to run office. "Lindsey Williams is unfit to take the oath to defend the state constitution when she has already violated its provisions."" Williams Claims To Have Started The Process Of Moving Back To Pennsylvania To Begin Her Work With The Pittsburgh Federation Of Teachers On The Weekend Of Friday, October 31, 2014. "The following timeline is based on public records, a prior interview with Ms. Williams or materials provided by her campaign: Ms. Williams said she attended Dickinson College and the Duquesne University School of Law, both in Pennsylvania. She later lived in Maryland, registering to vote in Anne Arundel County in January 2014. Ms. Williams said she received an employment offer from the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers on Oct. 28, 2014, and gave notice to her prior employer on Oct. 29, 2014. The Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers dated a formal offer letter Oct. 30, 2014, and Ms. Williams signed it on Nov. 2, 2014. Ms. Williams said she "drove to Pennsylvania the weekend of Friday, Oct. 31, to Sunday, Nov. 2 to begin the process of moving back. I began moving my belongings and searching for apartments."" Williams Asked Commonwealth Court To Dismiss The Case Against Her. 'Democratic state Senate candidate Lindsey Williams on Friday asked Commonwealth Court to dismiss a case challenging her residency. Her attorney, Charles Pascal, argued the case should be dismissed on technical grounds. He wrote that the deadline for challenging Ms. Williams' nominating petitions, on which she declared her residency, had long passed and that they were therefore considered valid. Removing her from the ballot this close to the Nov. 6 election "would promote uncertainty and instability in the election process," he wrote. He also wrote that Commonwealth Court was not the proper venue to bring such challenges. Two residents in the 38th state Senate district, with support from the Republican Party, filed a measure in Commonwealth Court earlier this week seeking to have her removed from the ballot on the grounds that she does not meet the four-year residency requirement outlined in the state constitution. Ms. Williams disputes that. Further filings in the case are due next week. Ms. Williams is running against Republican candidate Jeremy Shaffer, who ousted current state Sen. Randy Vulakovich in the GOP primary earlier this year." (*Pittsburgh Post-Gazette*, 10/20/18)

In Late October 2018, Commonwealth Court Dismissed The Lawsuit Against Williams. 'A Commonwealth Court judge on Wednesday dismissed a case challenging the residency of a Democratic state Senate candidate and allowed her name to remain on the November ballot. Democrat Lindsey Williams, who is running in the 38th District north of Pittsburgh, said she was happy "that this distraction is over" and she could return to focusing on policy issues, such as public education and health care. But state Republicans, who supported the legal challenge, indicated Wednesday evening that they might not be ready to drop the fight. Republicans are still not convinced that Ms. Williams meets the four-year residency requirement outlined in the state constitution and are weighing whether to appeal the issue to the state Supreme Court, Jason Gottesman, a spokesman for the state party, said in a statement. Whether they would succeed is unclear. Commonwealth Court Judge Michael Wojcik, who ran as a Democrat, wrote in his 10-page opinion issued Wednesday that the challenge to Ms. Williams' residency was "a barely colorable claim." Ms. Williams is running against Republican Jeremy Shaffer in a fierce fight to replace current state Sen. Randy Vulakovich, who lost the GOP primary in May." (*Pittsburgh Post-Gazette*, 10/25/18)

In November 2018, PA Senate Republicans Called On Williams To Show That She Met The Residency Requirement Following Her Campaign Victory. "Republicans who control Pennsylvania's Senate want a Democrat who is the apparent winner in the race for an open suburban Pittsburgh seat to prove she meets the residency requirement to serve in the chamber, senators said Wednesday. Senate Majority Leader Jake Corman, R-Centre, said Republicans plan to ask Democrat Lindsey Williams to show how she meets a constitutional requirement that newly elected senators must have lived in Pennsylvania for the prior four years. "She needs to have the ability to come in and lay out that she does meet the requirements and, if she does, that'll be the end of it," Corman said. "If she doesn't, then we've got an issue that we need to deal with." Corman would not say how Republicans will handle it if they decide that Williams doesn't meet the requirement. Republican senators discussed the matter for the first time Wednesday during a closed-door caucus meeting. A judge threw out a Republican-backed lawsuit last month challenging Williams' eligibility, saying the plaintiffs had missed a seven-day period in March to challenge her nomination petition for the primary ballot." "State Senate President Pro-Tempore Joe Scarnati, R-Jefferson, has asked Democratic Sen.-elect Lindsey Williams to provide more documentation about her residency as Republicans decide whether to block her from taking her seat next year. In the weeks before the November election, Republicans backed an unsuccessful legal effort to get her kicked off the ballot on the grounds that she did not meet the residency requirements outlined in the state constitution, which says that lawmakers must live in the state for at least four years. A judge dismissed the case. Ms. Williams, who has repeatedly said she does meet the requirements, won election in the 38th Senatorial District, which includes parts of Pittsburgh and its northern suburbs. In a letter dated Thursday, Mr. Scarnati said he questions "your qualification to be sworn in to serve in accordance with the Constitutional requirements." He gave her seven days to provide copies of her driver's license, employment history, tax withholdings, home purchase or rental agreements, and any other information she deems relevant. He said she may request a hearing before a panel of senators. He said she may receive pay, hire employees and do other administrative duties during December, but if the Senate decides not to seat her in January, she will have to repay her salary." In January 2019, GOP Senate Leader Joe Scarnati Relented And Agreed That Williams Should Be Sworn In. "In the Senate, Scarnati ended weeks of uncertainty on Friday by announcing he supported the seating of Democrat Lindsey Williams in an Allegheny County district. Republicans had raised questions about whether Williams had lived in the state for four years to the day before being elected, a state constitutional requirement. She was sworn in. Williams' win was one of five Republican seats in the Senate that Democrats flipped in November, including four in the Philadelphia suburbs. The two new Republican senators are Judy Ward of Blair County and Kristin Phillips-Hill of York County, both filling vacancies created when an incumbent sought higher office. Sen. "Q: Which voting modernization reforms (such as no-excuse absentee voting, early voting, same day voter registration, additional funding for voting technology upgrades) would you support to ensure that our elections are accessible, efficient, and secure? A: Voting should be easy. There are obvious policy changes to improve the ability for people to vote, including early voting, no excuse absentee requests, preregistration for 17-yr olds, and same day registration. Automatic voter registration for all those who use government services should be the standard. We also need to inform those who served time in prison and have a criminal record that they are eligible to vote and ensure that they are registered. Absentee ballot reform must be undertaken to reduce the opportunity of fraud. Other broader reforms, such as vote-by-mail should also be made available. DRE touchscreen machines used in most counties do not allow for meaningful recounts, are nearly impossible to audit, and are subject to being hacked fairly easily. Additional funding should be allocated to update these machines with paper ballots which are counted by an optical scan system. These paper ballots could be manually recounted and audited to verify the count accuracy." (New Pittsburgh Courier, 10/24/18)
