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EXECUTIVE SYNOPSIS

DOSSIER NOTES

In preparing this background report, we undertook an examination of all readily available and relevant electronic and online records, several hundred Nexis and news articles, dozens of active and archived web pages, and several dozen public records from Nexis and the resources of various federal, state, and municipal government offices. The results of our analysis are contained below.

Legal

Social Media Lawsuit

- In January 2013, Vincent Gattuso and Michael Blaszczyk filed a complaint against Simmons and other members of the Gloucester County Board of Freeholders.
 - The plaintiffs alleged due to a new county policy, they were punished for sharing content critical of former board member and then-current New Jersey Senate Present Steve Sweeney due to his position on healthcare legislation.
 - In May 2014, the parties agreed to settle and the case was dismissed with prejudice.

Political

Campaign Finance

- Thus far, Simmons has received tens of thousands of dollars from several New Jersey labor and public sector unions as well as thousands of dollars from several New Jersey Democratic Party campaign committees.
- Simmons is known to have received financial support from public contractors.
 - 2011: "the joint campaign committee for Gloucester County Democratic Freeholders Warren Wallace, Lyman Barnes and Heather Simmons got \$134,300 from contractors".
 - In 2017, NJ ELEC noted that Simmons' Gloucester Co. Campaign slate was the second largest recipient of funds from public contractors.
 - 2021: "a joint committee for Democratic Gloucester County Commissioners Heather Simmons, Lyman Barnes and Jim Jefferson got \$147,500 from contractors...".

Party Affiliation & Voting History

- Since 2001, Simmons has failed to vote in five primary elections.
- Prior to registering in New Jersey, Simmons was a registered Republican Party voter in Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania from November 1988 to January 2001.

Partisan Ties

- Simmons has ties to several prominent liberal figures.
 - In 2011, Simmons listed Bill Clinton as one of three figures she would love to have dinner with and praised his intellectualism.
 - On social media, Simmons promoted content indicating support for Joe Biden.
 - On social media, Simmons promoted content indicating support for Corey Booker.
 - On social media, Simmons promoted content indicating support for Elizabeth Warren.

Controversial Notes

Conflicts

- Simmons work as an education consultant has created the appearance of potential conflicts.
 - In 2010, during her first campaign for Gloucester County Freeholder Board, Simmons called for additional support for Gloucester County College; Simmons is known to have served in a consulting role for the local college.
 - In 2011, a republican candidate filed a petition with the NJ Commissioner of Education claiming the Glassboro School District had violated state law by campaigning for budget passage using public funds by employing Simmons as a PR Consultant who listed annual budget passage as a goal.

Behaviors And Demeanor

- Simmons is known to have used controversial campaign tactics.
 - In 2010, Simmons was criticized by Republicans for using inflammatory cancer imagery on attack mailings despite her opponents having both suffered losses of loved ones to cancer; Simmons defended the mailer.
 - In 2011, complaints were filed "over a campaign commercial in which nowelected democrat Freeholders Heather Simmons, Adam Taliaferro and Lyman Barnes appeared to be talking with officers. The complaint claimed the trio were speaking with Gloucester county sheriff's officers, but it was later thrown out".

- Simmons has been criticized for a "lack of decorum".
 - In 2011, the Gloucester County times awarded a "jeers" to Simmons for a "lack of freeholder decorum" for accusing a republican freeholder without support that he disrespects women.

Governance And Policy

Fiscal And Economic

- As a candidate for public office, Simmons claimed to be seeking a reduction in spending and taxes.
 - In 2011, Simmons declared that she hoped to achieve reductions in spending, taxes, tax rate, and debt.
 - In 2014, Simmons defended Gloucester County Democrats' fiscal record contending that they had stabilized the tax rate and reduced the size of government.
- During Simmons' tenure with Gloucester County, the size of local government ballooned.
 - During her tenure with Gloucester County, Simmons served as a rubberstamp for the annual budgets put forth for the county.
 - During Simmons' tenure with Gloucester County, annual spending increased my millions of dollars.
- In order to pass the county's bloated budgets Simmons regularly supported a mechanism to exceed appropriations limits.
 - In 2023, Simmons voted yea on a resolution to "exceed the county budget appropriation limits".
 - In 2022, Simmons voted yea on a resolution to "exceed the county budget appropriation limits".
 - In 2021, Simmons voted yea on a resolution to "exceed the county budget appropriation limits".

 - In 2018, Simmons voted yea on an ordinance increasing the emergency medical services transportation fee per transport from \$750 to \$800.
 - In 2018, Simmons voted yea on a resolution "fixing a fee to be paid by members of the public for receiving personal notice of meetings".

Diversity And Free Speech

- Simmons backed measures seeking to "increase" diversity.
 - In 2015, Simmons voted yea on a resolution supporting the "Gloucester County Minority Recruitment Advisory Committee to increase the diversity of law enforcement agencies in Gloucester County".
 - Additionally, in 2022, Simmons attended and spoke at a local NAACP event.
- In 2013, Simmons pushed a measure that critics worried would restrict free speech locally.
 - In 2013, Simmons seconded and voted yea on a resolution "authorizing an amendment to the Gloucester County social media policy," which appeared to impose greater restrictions and punishment for speech critical of the county government.

Additional Policy

<u>Labor</u>

• Simmons enjoys the support prominent local unions – including the New Jersey Education Association.

<u>Covid</u>

- Simmons supported the left's big-government reaction to covid.
 - In 2022, Simmons voted nay on a resolution to rescind the county's "covid testing policy".

Social Issues

- On social media, Simmons has offered traditionally leftist views on social issues
 - In 2023, Simons' joint campaign page posted that she supports the idea that "reproductive health care decisions are between women and their doctors".
 - In 2023, Simmons promoted the "period equity is period justice' menstrual product drive".
 - On social media, Simmons has promoted her support for "pride" event.

Simmons has received tens of thousands of dollars from several New Jersey labor and public sector unions as well as thousands of dollars from several New Jersey Democratic Party campaign committees. Simmons has disbursed an aggregate of \$52,406 to date; however, nearly all of it was transfers to her general election fund.

Blaszcyzk would not again post comments on his Facebook page openly critical of current or former County officials or of policies promoted by them for fear of being disciplined up to and including termination.

27. Plaintiff Gattuso also would not post any comments on his Facebook page critical of current or former County officials or of policies promoted by them for fear of being disciplined up to and including termination.

28. The Policy chills the rights of plaintiffs and of all other County employees to communicate through the use of social media and social networking about matters of public concern.



"What I expect out of the budget is reduction in spending, reduction in taxes, reduction in the tax rate, reduction in debt," said Simmons. To accomplish her first goal, Simmons said her departments - economic development and public works - are aggressively pursuing grants. She also expects the board to explore more opportunities for shared services. Director Robert Damminger has indicated he plans on making cuts wherever possible. The county anticipates losing 14 positions to attrition this year, in addition to the 61 lost last year. Damminger said the budget in its current form contains no furloughs. The director has said several times he guarantees a cut in the tax rate of at least a penny, but also stressed his goals go beyond that. "This won't just be you'll see the tax rate come down," he said. "You'll see spending come down as well. They're both equally important." A third budget meeting is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 26 - two days after state aid numbers are supposed to go out - but Damminger said he needs to run that by the rest of the board." In August, freeholders adopted a list of reforms that had been whittled down to eight policy changes. While adding financial impact statements to agenda items was left out, freeholders did vote to add the online postings of meeting agendas, resolutions, county employment contracts, bill lists, financial disclosure forms and other county information. "Let's discuss it and bring it out in the open," Wallace said before making a motion to adopt the new

policy. "What's there to hide? What do we have to fear?" According to county Administrator Chad Bruner, the county's annual budget should be considered the impact statement for all county resolutions. Everything referenced in resolutions goes back to the budget, he said. "People aren't aware of what's going on. ... Let's make it easy for everybody," said Wallace. "We should be looking at all the short and long term dollars we spend ... the public has a right to know how their money is being spent." Democrat Freeholders Heather Simmons and Warren Wallace, who gave Wallace's proposal a no vote, noted that a copy of the resolution had not been distributed among the board. Simmons said later that she and her fellow freeholders do have a commitment to openness and transparency. But insufficient time to review the proposal was the issue." Ed Durr (R-Logan) in District 3, along with his running mates, Gloucester County Commissioner Heather Simmons (D-Glassboro) and Dave Bailey, Jr., a non-profit executive from Woodstown. Simmons and Bailey face Assemblywoman Bethanne McCarthy Patrick (R-Mannington) and Hopewell Township Committeeman Tom Tedesco. But in the 4th, where Assemblyman Paul Moriarty (D-Washington Township) faces former Washington Township Councilman Christopher Del Borrello for an open Democratic Senate seat in a district that has become more Republican, no endorsements were made. One of the GOP Assembly candidates, Amanda Esposito, is a public school teacher and NJEA member. The teacher's union also made no endorsements in the 2nd district where Democrat Alphonso Harrell, a veteran and kindergarten teacher, is running for the Assembly against incumbents Don Guardian (D-Atlantic City) and Claire Swift (R-Margate). No endorsements were made in District 8, where Hammonton Education Association President Anthony Angelozzi is challenging Republican Assemblyman Michael Torrissi, Jr. (R-Hammonton) and Brandon Umba (R-Medford)." Ed Durr (R-Logan); for the Assembly, the union is backing Democrats Heather Simmons, a Gloucester County freeholder, and Dave Bailey, Jr. against Assemblywoman Bethanne McCarthy Patrick (R-Mannington) and her running mate, Hopewell Township Committeeman Thomas Tedesco." In 2023, The New Jersey State Building & Construction Trades Council Backed Bailey, Simmons, And Burzichelli. "The New Jersey State Building & Construction Trades Council has endorsed Democrats in most of the state's competitive legislative races, but is not taking sides in the 11th district State Assembly race, where two freshman Republicans are seeking re-election. The labor group is backing Democrat John Burzichelli (D-Paulsboro) in the 3rd district against State Sen. Ed Durr (R-Logan) and Democrat Paul Moriarty (D-Washington Township) against Republican Christopher Del Borrello for the open Senate seat in the 4th district. But in the contest for two open Assembly seats in the 4th, the building trades council passed over Republican Matt Walker, an Operating Engineers Local 825 board member, and is backing Democrats Dan Hutchison and Codey Miller. The state building trades, which has strong ties to South Jersey Democrats, are staying out of the 1st and 2nd districts, where six Republican incumbents are seeing re-election, but are supporting Republican Latham Tiver, an Operating Engineers Local 825 official, for the open 8th district Senate seat; Republican Assemblymen Michael Torrissi (R-Hammonton) and Brandon Umba (R-Medford) were also endorsed. The endorsements largely favor sitting legislators, regardless of ideology: the building trades are backing some of the state's most liberal Democrats, like Britnee Timberlake (D-East Orange) and Shavonda Sumter (D-Paterson), and the most conservative Republicans, like Parker Space (R-Wantage), Joseph Pennacchio (R-Montville), and Doug Steinhardt (R-Lopatcong). In total, the building trades council endorsed 73 Democrats and 21 Republicans but made no endorsement in 23 races. "Both numbers indicate our Council's insistence on maintaining a bipartisan approach in our nomination process," said Council President Bill Mullen. "All of our endorsed candidates have stood with us on matters of vital importance to our livelihoods and to the future of the building and construction trades." Mullen added, "They also recognize that they must play a critical role in finally ending the irrational fears and partisanship that dominate the political dialogue. It's the only way we can hope to resolve the daunting social and economic issues that confront all of us." Bethanne McCarthy Patrick (R-Mannington) and Christopher DePhillips (R-Wyckoff) are the only incumbent Assembly members in the state to have the building trades endorsement go directly to a challenger. In addition to Burzichelli, the building trades is backing Democrat Heather Simmons and Dave Bailey, Jr. for Assembly in the 3rd. While the group is backing State Sen. Kristen Corrado (R-Totowa) for re-election in the 40th, they endorsed Democrats Giovanna Irizarry and Jennifer Marrinan over DePhillips." (NJ Globe, 6/8/23)

"Simmons was raised in Philadelphia in a family that prized education and stressed its importance. She was valedictorian of her class at St. Joseph's University. Her first professional job was in public relations at Gloucester County College. She remained there for 13 years, earned a master's degree in public relations and began teaching. "The community college was a place of opportunity and access," Simmons said. Six years ago, she left the college and started her own media consulting business where she does contracted community relations work for schools and non-profit organizations. One of her main campaigning issues is the relationship between Gloucester County College, Rowan University and the county. "I think Gloucester County College can do a whole lot more in the area of driving our economic development strategy," Simmons said. "I think it's a little bit behind the time in terms of what other community colleges in the region are doing in terms of offering access to baccalaureate degrees. "If elected, I'll do everything I can do to support that to make sure it's tax-neutral wherever possible. Because we need to be helping people move forward in their lives." Simmons also said Gloucester County Institute of Technology's tuition should be paid at the county level to relieve the local districts of the burden." (Gloucester County *Times*, 10/10/10)

"A Glassboro man has filed a petition with the state Commissioner of Education claiming the borough's school board has violated state law by campaigning for budget passage using public funds. Allen Louie, a Glassboro resident and Republican candidate for borough council, filed the petition Tuesday that alleges Heather Simmons, contracted by the Glassboro School District for public relations services, "engaged in an ongoing campaign to ensure passage of the school budget for 2012," according to the petition. Simmons, owner of Heather Simmons Communications and a county freeholder seeking election this November, has been contracted by the school district for services since 2005 for \$36,000 a year. The petition sites documents drawn up by Simmons from 2009, 2010, and 2011 that outline her goals for the upcoming years including to "annually pass the proposed school budget." According to state law, "all activities involving promotional effort to advance a particular position on school election or any referenda are prohibited." "(Louie) was outraged that money, that could be used to keep teachers or buy textbooks, was instead being used for an illegal purpose," said attorney Mark Cimino, Louie's lawyer. "It is illegal under state law to use public money to campaign for a particular outcome of an election, whether it be a referendum or voting for somebody." Included in the petition are memos from 2009, 2010 and 2011 on the letterheads of Simmons' consulting firm that list the highlights of the previous year's achievements including passing the third, fourth and fifth consecutive district budgets, engaging in community relations activities and increasing communications among administration, school board members, parents and non-parents. The letters also detail Simmons' plans for the upcoming years, including increased communication between the superintendent and parents; getting media coverage of school events; boosting parent involvement; and "passing the budget again" by campaigning on behalf of the district throughout the year." In April 2012, The Petition Was Called Weak By A Judge. "A petition alleging that • Glassboro Public Schools' community relations consultant, Gloucester County Freeholder Heather Simmons, had campaigned for passage of district budgets was called flimsy this week by a judge. The petition, filed with the Commissioner of Education in September by Glassboro resident Allen Louie, alleged that Simmons "engaged in an ongoing campaign to ensure passage of the school district budget for 2012," according to the original petition. Administrative Law Judge Jeff Masin told Louie, a 2011 Republican candidate for borough council, and his attorney Mark Cimino, that their "evidence was not strong enough," according to Cimino. The judge's opinion was sent to the Commissioner of Education for review. The commissioner has 45 days to decide whether to accept, reject or amend the judge's opinion. "I think the judge recognized what everyone else recognized - that it was clearly a politically motivated stunt, and those kinds of things clearly have no place in a court of law," said Simmons, a Democrat, who was a candidate for a seat on the Gloucester County Freeholder board when the petition was filed. "It was baseless," Simmons added. "The judge's decision was a recognition that not only wasn't there anything improperly done here, even the allegations were frivolous." Included with the petition were memos from Simmons that listed the highlights of her previous years' accomplishments including passing the third, fourth and fifth consecutive school district budgets, engaging in community relations activities and increasing communications

SIMMONS IS KNOWN TO HAVE USED CONTROVERSIAL CAMPAIGN TACTICS

In 2010, Simmons And Gloucester Co. Democrats Were Criticized By Republicans For Using Inflammatory Cancer Imagery On Attack Mailings Despite Her Opponents Having Both Suffered Losses Of Loved Ones To Cancer; Simmons Defended The Mailer. "It started in August, when New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie vetoed legislation to fund women's health clinics throughout the state. "It's one of the most despicable political stunts I've ever seen," Wallace said of the mailing. "I don't think the residents of Gloucester County want to hear this kind of nonsense." The first side of the mailer depicts a female cancer patient -- her hair lost as a result of chemotherapy treatment -- and a line asking, "Why would Larry Wallace and Vincent Nestore's Republican cronies in Trenton cut life-saving cancer screening programs?" The other side shows an anxious looking woman and predicts fewer women will receive early breast cancer screening as a result of Christie's veto. Neither Wallace, a small business owner, nor Nestore, a high school physical education teacher, has ever held a political office. But the two candidates -- both 48 -- have lost immediate family members to cancer. Wallace's son died of cancer a decade ago at the age of 9, and Nestore lost his fiancee to the disease. Half a dozen more of Nestore's family have suffered from cancer. "I don't think they understand that cancer touches almost everyone in some way shape or form," said Wallace. "To make that part of a smear campaign or mudslinging in a desperate attempt to win office. I think points directly toward their character." The mailing, paid for by Robert Zimmerman and Heather Simmons for Freeholder, is the latest ad put out by the Democratic machine in Gloucester County. Simmons, 41, said women should be up in arms at what she says is Christie's stance to politicize medical care. "I stand by my feeling that I cannot support a governor or a party that would cut breast cancer screening," said Simmons, of Glassboro. "I have been in the situation of being denied prescriptions and procedures by insurance companies presuming to make decisions for me. "I simply do not believe that the government or those companies should be making medical decisions for me, my children or anyone else." Two television ads sponsored by the Gloucester County Democrat Committee against the GOP slate have featured actors portraying millionaires throwing their fictional support to Wallace and Nestore because of tax cuts given to some of the wealthiest residents in the state." • Simmons Ultimately Lost Her 2010 Campaign Following A Recount. "Despite Democratic freeholder candidates spending more than \$300,000 in their bid for two open seats here, and despite their call for a recount of every ballot in Gloucester County, Freeholders-elect Vincent Nestore and Larry Wallace prevailed over Democrats Heather Simmons and Robert Zimmerman. Only 119 votes separated Simmons from Nestore after provisionals were counted a week after Election Day. Thursday morning marked the end

of the three-day recount, where Simmons picked up four extra votes, decreasing Nestore's lead to 115. "I had no predisposed expectation other than I just had a strong desire to ensure all votes that were cast were counted," said Sen. Fred Madden, chairman of the county Democrats. "And now we have that." The Democrats called for a recount of all machines and paper ballots on the last day to make appeals. The process started on Tuesday when all machines were recounted. Those numbers didn't change. When election commissioners counted the more than 7,000 paper ballots, Simmons picked up four votes. According to Stephanie Salvatore, county superintendent of elections, two of the ballots were originally dismissed because of red ink. Two more had check marks next to candidates' names instead of filled-in circles." (*Gloucester County Times*, 12/3/10)

• However, Simmons Was Tapped To Served As A Freeholder In 2011 With Stephen Sweeney Stepping Down. "Democrats have made their selection to fill the vacant freeholder seat, and it's someone who should be a familiar face to voters. Members of the Gloucester County Democratic Party met Friday night and unanimously selected Heather Simmons to fill the seat vacated by former director Stephen Sweeney at the end of 2010. Simmons, along with running mate Robert Zimmerman, lost to Republican freeholders Larry Wallace and Vince Nestore in November in a tight election. Following a recount requested by the Democratic Party - only 115 votes separated Simmons and Nestore, the second-place vote-getter. Consequently, Simmons may have been the natural choice to fill the vacancy, but Democratic Party chairman Sen. Fred. Madden said Simmons was simply the best candidate among those who applied. "She's a great individual. Very smart, articulate. I'm very confident with the way she will represent the party," said Madden, D-4 of Washington Township. "I just believe the party at large sees her as a solid candidate." Simmons, who runs a small media and community relations firm, said she was flattered to have been selected by the party." "A year after Gloucester Republicans slammed Democratic freeholder candidates for using county sheriff's officers and equipment in a campaign commercial, GOP chairman Larry Wallace claims to have plugged the loophole in the law to prevent another occurrence. Wallace announced Thursday his part in drafting state Senate and Assembly bills that would address the gap in the law, which currently allows the use of government employees and resources for partisan purposes like campaign ads. Last year, complaints were filed over a campaign commercial in which nowelected Democrat Freeholders Heather Simmons, Adam Taliaferro and Lyman Barnes appeared to be talking with officers. The complaint claimed the trio were speaking with Gloucester County sheriff's officers, but it was later thrown out. The images did not appear in the commercial for enough time to warrant prosecution. "I was frustrated last year that nothing could be done about

this. They broke policy and that's when I found out about this loophole in the law," Wallace said. "I wanted to figure out how to prevent this from happening again." State Senate Bill S2223 and Assembly Bill A3007 are sponsored by Sen. Samuel Thompson, R-12, of Middlesex County, and Assemblywoman Amy Handlin, R-13, of Monmouth County. The Republican Gloucester County freeholder also called on Senate President Stephen Sweeney, a West Deptford Democrat, "not to block it" from hitting the Senate floor." "With elections looming for both the governor's seat and both legislative houses this year as well as more fundraising events being held due to an easing of the virus threat, contributions from these donors are likely to bounce back," Brindle said General Majority PAC, a super PAC with ties to South Jersey powerbroker George Norcross, topped the recipients list with \$178,200 in contractor donations. It was also at the top last year. The next three slots were occupied by Middlesex County Democrats. Middlesex County Clerk Nancy Pinkin's campaign got \$157,150, while the campaigns of County Commissioners Leslie Koppel and Charles Tomaro received \$156,400 and \$149,900 respectively. In 2011, Simmons Declared That She Hoped To Achieve Reductions In Spending, Taxes, Tax Rate, And Debt. "Everyone on the board seems to be on the same page as far as what they want to accomplish. "My goal is to look for unnecessary spending," Wallace said. "I'll be looking at all areas. I don't think there's any sacred cows." "What I expect out of the budget is reduction in spending, reduction in taxes, reduction in the tax rate, reduction in debt," said Simmons. To accomplish her first goal, Simmons said her departments - economic development and public works - are aggressively pursuing grants. She also expects the board to explore more opportunities for shared services. Director Robert Damminger has indicated he plans on making cuts wherever possible. The county anticipates losing 14 positions to attrition this year, in addition to the 61 lost last year. Damminger said the budget in its current form contains no furloughs. The director has said several times he guarantees a cut in the tax rate of at least a penny, but also stressed his goals go beyond that. "This won't just be you'll see the tax rate come down," he said. "You'll see spending come down as well. They're both equally important." A third budget meeting is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 26 - two days after state aid numbers are supposed to go out - but Damminger said he needs to run that by the rest of the board." We're reducing the size of government while at the same time stabilizing the tax rate because of regionalized services, such as the jail, which over a 25-year period will save residents over \$250 million, and we're well on track to meet that. We've proven that's the opposite of the case. We are running for small government and more efficient use of taxpayer dollars."" (*South Jersey Times*, 10/23/14)

Fiscal Transparency

In 2011, Simmons Voted Against A Proposal To Add Financial Impact Statements To Resolutions That Appear On The Board Agenda. "Republican Freeholder Larry Wallace made another attempt Wednesday to add financial impact statements to resolutions that appear on board agendas. But the resolution Wallace put up - which was not listed on the meeting's agenda - did not receive votes from Democrat freeholders who said appropriate time was not given to review Wallace's proposed resolution. "This was brought up before, this was no surprise," said Wallace. Financial impact statements, which Wallace has pushed to include on resolutions and agenda items, was one of 11 transparency reforms that had been proposed in February. In August, freeholders adopted a list of reforms that had been whittled down to eight policy changes. While adding financial impact statements to agenda items was left out, freeholders did vote to add the online postings of meeting agendas, resolutions, county employment contracts, bill lists, financial disclosure forms and other county information. "Let's discuss it and bring it out in the open," Wallace said before making a motion to adopt the new policy. "What's there to hide? What do we have to fear?" According to county Administrator Chad Bruner, the county's annual budget should be considered the impact statement for all county resolutions. Everything referenced in resolutions goes back to the budget, he said. "People aren't aware of what's going on. ... Let's make it easy for everybody," said Wallace. "We should be looking at all the short and long term dollars we spend ... the public has a right to know how their money is being spent." Democrat Freeholders Heather Simmons and Warren Wallace, who gave Wallace's proposal a no vote, noted that a copy of the resolution had not been distributed among the board. Simmons said later that she and her fellow freeholders do have a commitment to openness and transparency. But insufficient time to review the proposal was the issue." Union Associations

In 2023, Bailey And Simmons Were Endorsed By The NJEA. "In two of the state's most competitive legislative contests, the New Jersey Education Association has endorsed Democratic candidates for the State Senate and Assembly in the 3rd, but isn't taking sides in the next-door 4th. The state's largest public employee union is backing former Assembly Appropriations Committee Chairman John Burzichelli's bid to unseat State Sen. Ed Durr (R-Logan) in District 3, along with his running mates, Gloucester County Commissioner Heather Simmons (D-Glassboro) and Dave Bailey, Jr., a non-profit executive from Woodstown. Simmons and Bailey face Assemblywoman Bethanne McCarthy Patrick (R-Mannington) and Hopewell Township Committeeman Tom Tedesco. But in the 4th, where Assemblyman Paul Moriarty (D-Washington Township) faces former Washington Township Councilman Christopher Del Borrello for an open Democratic Senate seat in a district that has become more Republican, no endorsements were made. One of the GOP Assembly candidates, Amanda Esposito, is a public school teacher and NJEA member. The teacher's union also made no endorsements in the 2nd

district where Democrat Alphonso Harrell, a veteran and kindergarten teacher, is running for the Assembly against incumbents Don Guardian (D-Atlantic City) and Claire Swift (R-Margate). No endorsements were made in District 8, where Hammonton Education Association President Anthony Angelozzi is challenging Republican Assemblyman Michael Torrissi, Jr. (R-Hammonton) and Brandon Umba (R-Medford)." In 2023, The AFL-CIO Backed Bailey, Simmons, And Burzichelli. "The New Jersey AFL-CIO today endorsed seven Republicans in South Jersey, putting them at odds with the Building and Construction Trades Council, and are backing Democratic challengers for State Assembly in the 11th district. In the highly competitive 4th district, the union is backing Assemblyman Paul Moriarty (D-Washington Township) for an open State Senate seat against Republican Christopher Del Borrello, a former Washington Township councilman. But for the Assembly, the AFL-CIO endorsement went to Republican Matthew Walker, a former Buena councilman. No endorsement was made for the second Assembly seat. That follows a decision last week by Bill Mullen, the state building trades president, to endorse Democrats Dan Hutchinson and Cody Miller against Walker, an Operating Engineers Local 825 executive board member. The AFL-CIO endorsed three Republican incumbents for re-election: State Sen. Vince Polistina (R-Egg Harbor Township), Assemblyman Don Guardian (R-Atlantic City), and Assemblywoman Claire Swift (R-Margate). The building trades declined to support anyone in the 2nd district. The endorsements in the 3rd district went to Democrat John Burzichelli, a former ten-term assemblyman who is challenging State Sen. Ed Durr (R-Logan); for the Assembly, the union is backing Democrats Heather Simmons, a Gloucester County freeholder, and Dave Bailey, Jr. against Assemblywoman Bethanne McCarthy Patrick (R-Mannington) and her running mate, Hopewell Township Committeeman Thomas Tedesco." In 2023, The New Jersey State Building & Construction Trades Council Backed Bailey, Simmons, And Burzichelli. "The New Jersey State Building & Construction Trades Council has endorsed Democrats in most of the state's competitive legislative races, but is not taking sides in the 11th district State Assembly race, where two freshman Republicans are seeking re-election. The labor group is backing Democrat John Burzichelli (D-Paulsboro) in the 3rd district against State Sen. Ed Durr (R-Logan) and Democrat Paul Moriarty (D-Washington Township) against Republican Christopher Del Borrello for the open Senate seat in the 4th district. But in the contest for two open Assembly seats in the 4th, the building trades council passed over Republican Matt Walker, an Operating Engineers Local 825 board member, and is backing Democrats Dan Hutchison and Codey Miller. In the 11th, the group endorsed State Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Long Branch) for re-election but passed on his two running mates. That's good news for Republican Assemblywomen Marilyn Piperno (R-Colts Neck) and Kim Eulner (R-Shrewsbury), who want to return to Trenton for second terms. The state building trades, which has strong ties to South Jersey Democrats, are staying out of the 1st and 2nd districts, where six Republican incumbents are seeing re-election, but are supporting Republican Latham Tiver, an Operating Engineers Local 825 official, for the open 8th district Senate seat; Republican Assemblymen Michael Torrissi (R-Hammonton) and Brandon Umba (R-Medford) were also endorsed. The endorsements largely favor sitting legislators, regardless of ideology: the building trades are backing some of the state's most liberal Democrats, like Britnee Timberlake (D-East Orange) and Shavonda Sumter (D-Paterson), and the most conservative Republicans, like Parker

Space (R-Wantage), Joseph Pennacchio (R-Montville), and Doug Steinhardt (R-Lopatcong). In total, the building trades council endorsed 73 Democrats and 21 Republicans but made no endorsement in 23 races. "Both numbers indicate our Council's insistence on maintaining a bipartisan approach in our nomination process," said Council President Bill Mullen. "All of our endorsed candidates have stood with us on matters of vital importance to our livelihoods and to the future of the building and construction trades." Mullen added, "They also recognize that they must play a critical role in finally ending the irrational fears and partisanship that dominate the political dialogue. It's the only way we can hope to resolve the daunting social and economic issues that confront all of us." Bethanne McCarthy Patrick (R-Mannington) and Christopher DePhillips (R-Wyckoff) are the only incumbent Assembly members in the state to have the building trades endorsement go directly to a challenger. In addition to Burzichelli, the building trades is backing Democrat Heather Simmons and Dave Bailey, Jr. for Assembly in the 3rd. While the group is backing State Sen. Kristen Corrado (R-Totowa) for re-election in the 40th, they endorsed Democrats Giovanna Irizarry and Jennifer Marrinan over DePhillips." (NJ Globe, 6/8/23)

ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE SCHEDULE OF FEES FOR EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES.

GCEMS seeks reimbursement from insurance carriers for emergency medical service treatment and transportation provided to patients. Under the current fee structure adopted in 2014, GCEMS charges up to \$700.00 per transport and up to \$17.00 per loaded mile. This ordinance would increase the transport charge to \$750.00, and the loaded mile fee would remain as is at \$17.00 per loaded mile. Rates charged by New Jersey Basic Life Support (EMS) providers range from \$550 to \$850 for transport, and \$14 to \$18 for mileage. The fees reflect the maximum amount sought from insurance carriers, including Medicare and Medicaid, and not the actual reimbursement received by GCEMS. In 2013, GCEMS realized \$3,802,249.86 in reimbursement from insurance carriers. 

In 2010, During Her First Campaign For Gloucester County Freeholder Board, Simmons Called For Additional Support For Gloucester County College. "Simmons was raised in

Philadelphia in a family that prized education and stressed its importance. She was valedictorian of her class at St. Joseph's University. Her first professional job was in public relations at Gloucester County College. She remained there for 13 years, earned a master's degree in public relations and began teaching. "The community college was a place of opportunity and access," Simmons said. Six years ago, she left the college and started her own media consulting business where she does contracted community relations work for schools and non-profit organizations. One of her main campaigning issues is the relationship between Gloucester County College, Rowan University and the county. "I think Gloucester County College can do a whole lot more in the area of driving our economic development strategy," Simmons said. "I think it's a little bit behind the time in terms of what other community colleges in the region are doing in terms of offering access to baccalaureate degrees. "If elected, I'll do everything I can do to support that - to make sure it's tax-neutral wherever possible. Because we need to be helping people move forward in their lives." Simmons also said Gloucester County Institute of Technology's tuition should be paid at the county level to relieve the local districts of the burden." (*Gloucester County Times*, 10/10/10)

"Gloucester County College, Which Receives Funding From The Freeholders, Has Used Her Services. She Is A Newcomer To Politics." "Literature handed out by Simmons and Zimmerman also does not mention specific issues. There are quotes about "hard decisions" and "improving the quality of life in Gloucester County," along with detailed resumés. Their slogan is: "New Leadership for a Better Gloucester County." Simmons, of Glassboro, is a public relations consultant whose company, Heather Simmons Communications, promotes educational institutions and nonprofit organizations in numerous news releases sent to media outlets. Gloucester County College, which receives funding from the freeholders, has used her services. She is a newcomer to politics. Zimmerman, a Mantua Township committeeman and former president of the town's school board, is a police captain in Pitman." (*Philadelphia Inquirer*, 10/11/10)

In 2011, A Republican Candidate Filed A Petition With The NJ Commissioner Of Education Claiming The Glassboro School District Had Violated State Law By Campaigning For Budget Passage Using Public Funds By Employing Simmons As A PR Consultant Who Listed Annual Budget Passage As A Goal. "A Glassboro man has filed a petition with the state Commissioner of Education claiming the borough's school board has violated state law by campaigning for budget passage using public funds. Allen Louie, a Glassboro resident and Republican candidate for borough council, filed the petition Tuesday that alleges Heather Simmons, contracted by the Glassboro School District for public relations services, "engaged in an ongoing campaign to ensure passage of the school budget for 2012," according to the petition. Simmons, owner of Heather Simmons Communications and a county freeholder seeking election this November, has been contracted by the school district for services since 2005 for \$36,000 a year. The petition sites documents drawn up by Simmons from 2009, 2010, and 2011 that outline her goals for the upcoming years including to "annually pass the proposed school budget." According to state law, "all activities involving promotional effort to advance a particular position on school election or any referenda are prohibited." "(Louie) was outraged that money, that could be used to keep teachers or buy textbooks, was instead being used for an illegal purpose," said attorney Mark Cimino, Louie's lawyer. "It is illegal under state

law to use public money to campaign for a particular outcome of an election, whether it be a referendum or voting for somebody." Included in the petition are memos from 2009, 2010 and 2011 on the letterheads of Simmons' consulting firm that list the highlights of the previous year's achievements including passing the third, fourth and fifth consecutive district budgets, engaging in community relations activities and increasing communications among administration, school board members, parents and non-parents. The letters also detail Simmons' plans for the upcoming years, including increased communication between the superintendent and parents; getting media coverage of school events; boosting parent involvement; and "passing the budget again" by campaigning on behalf of the district throughout the year." (*Gloucester County Times*, 9/21/11)

• In April 2012, The Petition Was Called Weak By A Judge. "A petition alleging that Glassboro Public Schools' community relations consultant, Gloucester County Freeholder Heather Simmons, had campaigned for passage of district budgets was called flimsy this week by a judge. The petition, filed with the Commissioner of Education in September by Glassboro resident Allen Louie, alleged that Simmons "engaged in an ongoing campaign to ensure passage of the school district budget for 2012," according to the original petition. Administrative Law Judge Jeff Masin told Louie, a 2011 Republican candidate for borough council, and his attorney Mark Cimino, that their "evidence was not strong enough," according to Cimino. The judge's opinion was sent to the Commissioner of Education for review. The commissioner has 45 days to decide whether to accept, reject or amend the judge's opinion. "I think the judge recognized what everyone else recognized - that it was clearly a politically motivated stunt, and those kinds of things clearly have no place in a court of law," said Simmons, a Democrat, who was a candidate for a seat on the Gloucester County Freeholder board when the petition was filed. "It was baseless," Simmons added. "The judge's decision was a recognition that not only wasn't there anything improperly done here, even the allegations were frivolous." Included with the petition were memos from Simmons that listed the highlights of her previous years' accomplishments including passing the third, fourth and fifth consecutive school district budgets, engaging in community relations activities and increasing communications among administrators, school board members, parents and non-parents." Campaign Tactics

In 2010, Simmons And Gloucester Co. Democrats Were Criticized By Republicans For Using Inflammatory Cancer Imagery On Attack Mailings Despite Her Opponents Having Both Suffered Losses Of Loved Ones To Cancer; Simmons Defended The Mailer. "It started in August, when New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie vetoed legislation to fund women's health clinics throughout the state. "It's one of the most despicable political stunts I've ever seen," Wallace said of the mailing. "I don't think the residents of Gloucester County want to hear this kind of nonsense." The first side of the mailer depicts a female cancer patient -- her hair lost as a result of chemotherapy treatment -- and a line asking, "Why would Larry Wallace and Vincent Nestore's Republican cronies in Trenton cut life-saving cancer screening programs?" The other side shows an anxious looking woman and predicts fewer women will receive early breast cancer screening as a result of Christie's veto. Neither Wallace, a small business owner, nor Nestore, a high school physical education teacher, has ever held a political office. But the two candidates -- both 48 -- have lost immediate family members to cancer. Wallace's son died of cancer a decade ago at the age of 9, and Nestore lost his fiancee to the disease. Half a dozen more of Nestore's family have suffered from cancer. "I don't think they understand that cancer touches almost everyone in some way shape or form," said Wallace. "To make that part of a smear campaign or mudslinging in a desperate attempt to win office. I think points directly toward their character." The mailing, paid for by Robert Zimmerman and Heather Simmons for Freeholder, is the latest ad put out by the Democratic machine in Gloucester County. Simmons, 41, said women should be up in arms at what she says is Christie's stance to politicize medical care. "I stand by my feeling that I cannot support a governor or a party that would cut breast cancer screening," said Simmons, of Glassboro. "I have been in the situation of being denied prescriptions and procedures by insurance companies presuming to make decisions for me. "I simply do not believe that the government or those companies should be making medical decisions for me, my children or anyone else." Two television ads sponsored by the Gloucester County Democrat Committee against the GOP slate have featured actors portraying millionaires throwing their fictional support to Wallace and Nestore because of tax cuts given to some of the wealthiest residents in the state." (Courier Post, 10/27/10)

- Simmons Ultimately Lost Her 2010 Campaign Following A Recount. "Despite • Democratic freeholder candidates spending more than \$300,000 in their bid for two open seats here, and despite their call for a recount of every ballot in Gloucester County, Freeholders-elect Vincent Nestore and Larry Wallace prevailed over Democrats Heather Simmons and Robert Zimmerman. Only 119 votes separated Simmons from Nestore after provisionals were counted a week after Election Day. Thursday morning marked the end of the three-day recount, where Simmons picked up four extra votes, decreasing Nestore's lead to 115. "I had no predisposed expectation other than I just had a strong desire to ensure all votes that were cast were counted," said Sen. Fred Madden, chairman of the county Democrats. "And now we have that." The Democrats called for a recount of all machines and paper ballots on the last day to make appeals. The process started on Tuesday when all machines were recounted. Those numbers didn't change. When election commissioners counted the more than 7,000 paper ballots, Simmons picked up four votes. According to Stephanie Salvatore, county superintendent of elections, two of the ballots were originally dismissed because of red ink. Two more had check marks next to candidates' names instead of filled-in circles." (Gloucester County Times, 12/3/10)
- However, Simmons Was Tapped To Served As A Freeholder In 2011 With Stephen Sweeney Stepping Down. "Democrats have made their selection to fill the vacant freeholder seat, and it's someone who should be a familiar face to voters. Members of the Gloucester County Democratic Party met Friday night and unanimously selected Heather Simmons to fill the seat vacated by former director Stephen Sweeney at the end of 2010. Simmons, along with running mate Robert Zimmerman, lost to Republican freeholders Larry Wallace and Vince Nestore in November in a tight election. Following a recount requested by the Democratic Party - only 115 votes separated Simmons and Nestore, the second-place vote-getter. Consequently, Simmons may have been the natural choice to fill the vacancy, but Democratic Party chairman Sen. Fred. Madden said Simmons was simply the best candidate among those who applied. "She's a great individual. Very smart, articulate. I'm very confident with the way she will represent the party," said

Madden, D-4 of Washington Township. "I just believe the party at large sees her as a solid candidate." Simmons, who runs a small media and community relations firm, said she was flattered to have been selected by the party." (*Gloucester County Times*, 1/15/11)

In 2011, Complaints Were Filed "Over A Campaign Commercial In Which Now-Elected Democrat Freeholders Heather Simmons, Adam Taliaferro And Lyman Barnes Appeared To Be Talking With Officers. The Complaint Claimed The Trio Were Speaking With Gloucester County Sheriff's Officers, But It Was Later Thrown Out." "A year after Gloucester Republicans slammed Democratic freeholder candidates for using county sheriff's officers and equipment in a campaign commercial, GOP chairman Larry Wallace claims to have plugged the loophole in the law to prevent another occurrence. Wallace announced Thursday his part in drafting state Senate and Assembly bills that would address the gap in the law, which currently allows the use of government employees and resources for partisan purposes like campaign ads. Last year, complaints were filed over a campaign commercial in which nowelected Democrat Freeholders Heather Simmons, Adam Taliaferro and Lyman Barnes appeared to be talking with officers. The complaint claimed the trio were speaking with Gloucester County sheriff's officers, but it was later thrown out. The images did not appear in the commercial for enough time to warrant prosecution. "I was frustrated last year that nothing could be done about this. They broke policy and that's when I found out about this loophole in the law," Wallace said. "I wanted to figure out how to prevent this from happening again." State Senate Bill S2223 and Assembly Bill A3007 are sponsored by Sen. Samuel Thompson, R-12, of Middlesex County, and Assemblywoman Amy Handlin, R-13, of Monmouth County. The Republican Gloucester County freeholder also called on Senate President Stephen Sweeney, a West Deptford Democrat, "not to block it" from hitting the Senate floor." "The biggest recipient of donations from contractors was a political action committee called CSC NJ, which is run by Cablevision and took in \$145,200. Constructors for Good Government, another PAC, came in second with \$139,310. The joint campaign committee for Gloucester County Democratic Freeholders Warren Wallace, Lyman Barnes and Heather Simmons got \$134,300 from contractors. Next on the list were Middlesex County Democratic Freeholders Charles Tomaro, at \$125,175, and Carol Barrett Bellante, at \$120,675. The engineering firm CME Associates, usually one of the state's top donors, did not report its contributions last year, even though it is required by state law. In 2010, CME made \$346,650 in contributions, the second most of any contractor in the state. A search of ELEC's database, which does not provide a complete picture of the company's donations, reveals its partners made thousands of dollars in contributions last year." (*Star Ledger*, 4/6/12)

In 2017, NJ ELEC Noted That Simmons' Gloucester Co. Campaign Slate Was The Second Largest Recipient Of Funds From Public Contractors. "Following another trend, the biggest recipients of contractor contributions were county-level candidates, including five of the top ten. Topping the list was Senate President Stephen Sweeney (D-3), whose reelection campaign appears to be the most expensive legislative district race in U.S. history with combined spending of nearly \$18.7 million. Two federal independent spending-only committees that backed him also received contractor support- General Majority PAC (\$47,500) and New Jerseyans for a Better Tomorrow (\$41,750). Totaled, public contractors gave about \$7.8 million in 2020, a 16% drop from the \$9.3 million donated in 2019 and just \$195,181 less than the \$8 million they reported giving in 2012, the previous recorded low, though late or amended reports submitted after April 5 could cause last year's contributions to exceed 2012's figures. The pandemic likely affected the giving, said ELEC Executive Director Jeff Brindle, adding that last year's political lull — one that saw campaigning drastically shift and cancelled most fundraising events for months as all attention turned to the virus — likely contributed to the decline. But ELEC officials don't expect that lull to continue into this year's state elections. "With elections looming for both the governor's seat and both legislative houses this year as well as more fundraising events being held due to an easing of the virus threat, contributions from these donors are likely to bounce back," Brindle said General Majority PAC, a super PAC with ties to South Jersey powerbroker George Norcross, topped the recipients list with \$178,200 in contractor donations. It was also at the top last year. The next three slots were occupied by Middlesex County Democrats. Middlesex County Clerk Nancy Pinkin's campaign got \$157,150, while the campaigns of County Commissioners Leslie Koppel and Charles Tomaro received \$156,400 and \$149,900 respectively. A joint committee for Democratic Gloucester County Commissioners Heather Simmons, Lyman Barnes and Jim Jefferson got \$147,500 from contractors, and some local candidates and party organizations also made the list." 

Charged with first-degree aggravated sexual assault, second-degree sexual assault, aggravated criminal sexual conduct and aggravated criminal restraint for an incident on April 1 involving a 15-year-old girl, Justin Breaker was allowed to take the football field as the school's starting quarterback? He was permitted to sit next to your daughter in math class? According to Heather Simmons, public relations coordinator for Glassboro Public Schools, school administrators did not know until Wednesday that the senior was indicted by a Salem County grand jury. "They did not know of the charges until (Wednesday) when they read it in the newspaper," Simmons said. A statement released by the district on Thursday read: "The administration of the Glassboro Public School District acted to suspend Glassboro High School senior Justin Breaker on Wednesday, December 5 immediately after learning about the indictment against him from the Salem County Prosecutor's Office. Breaker will attend classes at the Gloucester County Alternative School in Deptford until the case is resolved. The suspension precludes Breaker from participating in any school-related or extracurricular activities." That's awfully nice. Glad to hear it. But how did this happen? How could school officials not know the status of a student who transfered into their school from Schalick prior to the start of the school year with such a questionable past? According to court records, Breaker, 19, and Mark A. Wood II, 19, of Pittsgrove, were arrested by police shortly after the April 1 incident. They were held at the Salem County Correctional Facility in lieu of \$100,000 full cash bail. Breaker remained there until April 7. But when it became time for football season to begin, Breaker was in Glassboro. He put on his pads and helmet, going about his business as if no cloud hung over his head. It boggles the mind how school officials had no clue as to what was going on. It's inexcusable for a school district to have this type of situation over its head and not realize it." "Breaker, Charged In April With Gang Raping A Juvenile Girl In 0 Pittsgrove, Salem County, Was Indicted On Several Charges Nov. 28."; Breaker Was Only Suspended In Glassboro In Early December 2007. "Glassboro school officials said Thursday they immediately suspended the high school football team's starting quarterback earlier this week after learning of sexual assault charges against him. The suspension, which began Wednesday, limits Justin Breaker, 19, from participating in "any school-related or extracurricular activities." In a statement, officials also said Breaker will attend the Gloucester County Alternative School in Deptford until the case is resolved. Breaker, charged in April with gang raping a juvenile girl in Pittsgrove, Salem County, was indicted on several charges Nov. 28. He played in Glassboro High School's South Jersey Group 1 championship game win over Paulsboro on Dec. 1. Glassboro school officials said they had no knowledge of the criminal charges against Breaker until they read accounts in a local newspaper on Wednesday. First Assistant Salem County Prosecutor William Brennan said Breaker faces charges of first-degree aggravated sexual assault, second-degree sexual assault, aggravated criminal sexual contact and criminal restraint stemming from an April 1 incident in Pittsgrove. He declined to provide details of the alleged incident

because the victim is a juvenile. Two others were charged in the incident. A juvenile male has already pleaded guilty, Brennan said. Heather Simmons, spokeswoman for the Glassboro School District, wrote in an e-mail on Thursday that "the administration acted yesterday (Wednesday) in the best interest of the school and student body." She did not answer questions concerning the school's discipline policy." (*Courier Post*, 12/7/07)

Simmons Claimed That If The School Had Known About The Charges Earlier, It Would Have Acted Earlier. "Interim Glassboro School Superintendent Leonard D. Fitts suspended Breaker immediately after district officials learned of the indictment, district spokeswoman Heather Simmons said. Fitts did not return messages left at his office yesterday. "To my knowledge nobody knew," Simmons said. "I don't know if anyone at the school has been in touch with the prosecutor's office. "I'm sure if they [the school] had learned earlier, they would have acted earlier," she said. Because Breaker is an adult, the prosecutor's office was not obligated to notify schools of his arrests, according to the state Attorney General's Office. Calls to A.P. Schalick High School in Pittsgrove, where Breaker was a student at the time of the alleged attack, were not returned. The Glassboro district does not have a policy concerning student athletes facing criminal charges and their eligibility to play, Simmons said." (*Philadelphia Inquirer*, 12/7/07)
