DOSSIER NOTES

In preparing this background report, we undertook an examination of all readily available and relevant electronic and online records, several hundred Nexis and news articles, dozens of active and archived web pages, and several dozen public records from Nexis and the resources of various federal, state, and municipal government offices. The results of our analysis are contained below.

Financial

Small Claims

- On at least three occasions, Gopal's businesses have filed small claims against others.
 - One of the cases settled while Gopal's business received default judgment in the other two, totaling \$831.50.

Legal

Breach Of Contract Lawsuits

- In both 2010 and 2016, Direct Development appears to have been named as a defendant in contract dispute lawsuits.
 - Both cases were dismissed following settlements.

Criminal

Traffic And Parking Citations

• Gopal has received at least 38 traffic and parking citations in the state of New Jersey for offenses such as unsafe operation of a vehicle, careless driving, obstructing the passage of other vehicles, delaying traffic, and speeding.

Political

Campaign Finance

- Thus far for Gopal has largely been funded by unions across the state such as IBEW, the NJ Laborer's PAC, and the NJ Carpenters PAC.
 - Gopal has also received nearly \$100,000 between the NJ Senate Democratic Majority and the Democratic Assembly Campaign Committee.

- Gopal has received tens of thousands of dollars from fellow Democratic candidates for elected office in the state.
- Gopal has received tens of thousands of dollars from liberal special interest groups like the NJ Association for Justice and the New Jersey Education Association.
- In 2011, and again between 2017 and 2021, Gopal received tens of thousands of dollars from labor and public sector unions in New Jersey like various chapters of Operating Engineers, Plumbers and Pipefitters, AFSCME, and SEIU.
 - Gopal received tens of thousands of dollars from liberal special interest groups like the New Jersey Association for Justice and the New Jersey Education Association.
 - Gopal received thousands of dollars from Phil Murphy's campaign committee.
- Federally, Gopal has contributed to various Democrats from the state of New Jersey including Bob Menendez, Josh Gottheimer, Frank Pallone.
 - Gopal also contributed to the presidential campaigns of Cory Booker and Pete Buttigieg while giving to other prominent Democrats such as Jon Ossoff, Sara Gideon, and Jaime Harrison.
 - Gopal has given to the liberal organizations including the Future Now Fund and the Progressive Democrats of America.
- In New Jersey, Gopal has contributed to Phil Murphy.

Partisan Ties And Activities

- Gopal has supported the left's electioneering power-grab through massive voting expansion.
- On social media, Gopal has touted endorsement from radical liberal organizations like Planned Parenthood.
- Gopal engages in blatantly partisan maneuvers in public office:
- Gopal has been accused of "using the state's legislature as a political payback machine".
- Gopal has relationships with prominent Democratic party figures known for promoting liberal beliefs.
 - In 2017, Al Gore helped rally Democrats to support Gopal.
 - In 2020, Gopal claimed Biden "is really going to be somebody who would unite our country which is currently divisive".
 - Gopal was recently endorsed by Gov. Phil Murphy.

• On social media, Gopal has praised multiple prominent democratic party figures known for promoting radically liberal beliefs such as Barack Obama, Cory Booker and Ruth Bader Ginsberg.

Miscellaneous

- Gopal's non-profit has been accused of possible violations of federal and state laws.
- Gopal led an effort to rid New Jersey of the "Freeholder" title.

Policy

Fiscal, Spending, Economic

- Gopal voted to increase the tax burden on New Jersey's higher-earners and corporations:
 - In 2020, Gopal supported legislation that "further soaks the rich in taxation by imposing the state's top income tax rate of 10.75% onto all earnings over \$1 million".
 - In 2018, Gopal supported legislation that "discourages economic growth and innovation by increasing the marginal gross income tax rate on income above \$5 million from 8.97 percent to 10.75 percent".
 - In 2018, Gopal supported legislation that "harms business growth and reduces employment opportunities by making numerous changes to the corporate business tax, resulting in higher taxation of businesses".
- Gopal has supported "fiscally irresponsible" state budgets:
 - In 2020, Gopal supported New Jersey's "fiscally irresponsible budget bill..."
 - The 2022 state budget appeared to feature funding for several pork projects championed by Gopal.
 - In 2023, Gopal supported New Jersey's state budget, which is "7 percent higher than last year's".
 - According to Rowan University's Steve Sweeny Center for Public Policy, "multibillion-dollar budget gaps are likely within a few years, under the state's current tax and spending policies".
- Gopal led an effort to restore cuts to local education, but the result was described as only a "bad aid".
- Gopal has voted to expand the welfare state in New Jersey.
- Gopal flip-flopped on increasing state wage mandates after facing progressive pressure.
- In 2023, Gopal sponsored a bill to allow public safety personnel enrolled in New Jersey's pension system to retire early with a reduced pension.

- Gopal pushes union priorities and enjoys the support from prominent unions including the local teachers' union.
- Gopal has supported efforts to increase regulations on New Jersey businesses.
- Gopal has supported the Biden Administration's fiscal agenda including Build Back Better and the American Rescue Plan.
- On social media, Gopal has indicated he supports U.S. funding for Ukraine.

Energy And Environment

- Gopal is known to support murphy's energy plan including controversial use of offshore wind power.
- Gopal has supported the left's anti-growth environmental agenda:
 - In 2022, Gopal praised a community solar energy pilot program as an effective counter to climate change.
 - In 2022, Gopal sponsored legislation to end diverting clean energy funds to nj transit's operating budget.
 - In 2021, Gopal supported legislation that would "unnecessarily drive-up consumer costs in order to advance a politicized leftist environmental agenda" by banning Styrofoam and imposing recycling mandates.
 - In 2020, Gopal supported legislation that "infringes consumer choice and drives up costs in the food service industry by banning several common consumer plastic, paper, and Styrofoam products".
 - In 2020, Gopal supported legislation that "infringes property rights and reduces economic growth by preventing the department of environmental protection from issuing permits in 'overburdened communities'".
 - In 2018, Gopal supported legislation that banned offshore drilling.
- On social media, Gopal's joint candidate campaign advocated for New Jersey to pass expensive clean energy legislation and join anti-growth climate change initiatives.
- Gopal has consistently enjoyed the support of environmental organizations.

Healthcare And Covid

- Gopal supported murphy's covid vaccination and testing requirements.
- Gopal supported the left's big-government reaction to covid-19:
 - In April 2020, Gopal planned to introduced legislation to impose severe fines and/ or jail party goers who violated social distancing orders.
 - In late April 2020, Gopal wrote in support of closing public parks.

- In June 2020, Gopal noted his request to have state officials investigate social distance violations.
- In July 2020, Gopal called for shore towns to impose capacity restrictions.
- In 2020, Gopal supported legislation that "attacks property rights by preventing landlords from evicting a tenant based on nonpayment of rent during the state of emergency declared by the Governor".
- In 2021, Gopal advocated for individuals to wear covid-19 masks even if they were fully vaccinated.

Public Safety, Immigration, Law Enforcement

- Gopal appears to support New Jersey's status as a sanctuary state for illegal immigrants.
- Gopal supports providing state benefits to illegal immigrants:
 - In 2019, Gopal supported legislation that "permits those who reside in the country illegally to obtain driver's licenses and state-issued identification cards".
 - In 2020, Gopal supported legislation that "is designed to circumvent federal immigration law and the visa process by mandating illegal immigrants be provided occupational and professional licenses".
- Gopal previously encouraged localities to "push for police reform".

Education Standards, Curriculum, Parental Rights

- Gopal appears to support the teaching of controversial content and curriculums in schools:
 - In 2019, Gopal voted in favor of a bill requiring "middle school and high school students to be taught the political, economic and social contributions of notable lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people throughout history".
 - In 2023, Gopal "denounced 'the misinformation and politicizing campaigns' pushed by politicians 'more interested in scaring parents instead of being truthful"".
 - As the Senate Education Chairman, Gopal appeared to defend and advance controversial sex ed standards for New Jersey students.
 - In 2022, Gopal claimed Republican opposition and rhetoric against the sex ed standards was a "dangerous game".
 - In 2022, Gopal praised Gov. Murphy's nominees to replace three State Board of Education members who protested the murphy administration's changes to sex ed standards.

- In 2021, Gopal supported legislation that would "indoctrinate" education fields with "leftist propaganda and enrich the companies and providers of [critical race theory related] training".
- Gopal has frequently attended and spoken at education policy conferences hosted by several teacher associations, including the American Federation of Teachers (AFT) which has described DEI ideology as "core values" and has pledged to promote DEI policies in pension funds across the country.
- In 2020, Gopal signaled support for making New Jersey the first state in the nation to incorporate climate change education across its k-12 learning standards.
- Gopal has voted to undermine parental transparency in education.
 - In 2021, Gopal supported legislation that "permits school districts to administer student health surveys after prior written notification to parents and legal guardians".

DEI, Additional Woke Ideology

- Gopal supports affirmative action, the promotion of DEI and other aspects of woke ideology:
 - In 2020, Gopal supported legislation that "requires certain health care professionals to undergo explicit and implicit bias training".
 - In 2020, Gopal supported legislation that "expands cronyism by establishing the office of clean energy equity".
 - In 2021, Gopal supported legislation that would "socialize private business investment onto taxpayers especially on the grounds of racial discrimination".
 - In 2023, the AAPI caucus, led by Gopal, issued a joint statement criticizing the supreme court's ruling rolling back affirmative action.

Race, Bail Funds

- On social media, Gopal has promoted divisive racial content including the Minnesota Bail Fund and Black Lives Matter.
 - In 2020, Gopal promoted the existence of "system racism".
 - In 2020, Gopal appeared to reference beliefs promoted by the liberal history program the 1619 project, who have claimed the United States has been a racist county for over 400 years.
 - Gopal has attended at least one Black Lives Matter rallies and has spoken at events with signs promoting divisive racial ideology.
 - In 2020, Gopal donated to a Facebook fundraiser for the Minnesota Freedom Fund, which opposes "oppressive jailing" and pays criminal bails for.

• Gopal has promoted several race-based holidays and events such as Juneteenth.

Traditional Social Issues

- Gopal is unapologetically pro-abortion:
 - In 2022, Gopal criticized the United States Supreme Court overturning Roe v. Wade and allowing abortion to be banned by state legislatures.
 - In 2022, Gopal supported legislation that establishes protections for individuals related to abortions.
 - In 2022, Gopal supported legislation that "prohibits extradition of individual from another state back to that state for actions related to conduct concerning [abortion]".
- Gopal has worked to undermine the second amendment:
 - In 2018, Gopal introduced legislation "barring New Jersey public employee pension funds or annuities from investing in gun manufacturer companies".
 - In 2018, Gopal supported legislation that "restricts second amendment rights unless citizens prove 'specific threats' against them".
 - In 2022, Gopal supported the creation of an ammunition registry, which is "strengthening measures to surveil law-abiding citizens".
 - Gopal has frequently posted support for strict gun control legislation on his social media accounts.
- Gopal is a staunch LGBTQ activist.
- Gopal has been pictured at local pride parades and has frequently promoted LGBTQ ideology, including showing support for "international transgender day of visibility".

Miscellaneous

- Gopal supports assisted suicide.
- Gopal supports expanding access to marijuana.

It's one percent of our overall surplus that could make these districts whole this year when we have agreed, apparently, that we are going to revisit this formula and fix this. And we do need to it. We cannot continue down this path." "More than 160 New Jersey school districts that have suffered through six years of state aid cuts will receive onetime payments totaling \$102 million this year through a last-minute bill signed last week in Trenton. But many of those districts' leaders say the extra money, which is separate from Gov. Phil Murphy's budgeted school funding, is just a "Band-Aid" and they need a sustainable solution to keep serving their students. Many of the districts face dropping enrollment, but the aid cuts are driving them to cut programs, increase class sizes, and lay off teachers and staff. For instance, 40 faculty and staff members in Sussex County's Vernon Township school district were informed March 23 that they would not be returning to their jobs this fall. The district lost \$8.5 million over six years, school officials said. The additional aid from last week's legislation provides a one-time payment of \$211,000. "We need a long-term systemic solution ... this is a Band-Aid. It's only a one-time allocation," said Jeanne Howe, superintendent of Jefferson Township Public Schools in Morris County, another affected district. Jefferson will receive \$1 million through the legislation, more than most other school districts in Passaic, Morris and Sussex counties receiving the payments. The Jefferson district's enrollment dropped 29% since 2010 but its state aid has fallen by 60%, she said. Jefferson Township will likely spend its \$1 million on district technology needs. Instead, Murphy suggested extending a law he signed temporarily providing the 20-and-out benefit by another three years and reassess its impact after that. If it still makes financial sense, he said, the pension system's board can make the benefit permanent. This all relates to a complicated issue that has changed a few times in recent decades. State law requires members of the state's Police and Firemen's Retirement System to retire at 65 with their full pension. But a 1999 state law allowed people with 20 years of service to retire, albeit at half their final compensation. That was later changed during then-Gov. Chris Christie's administration so anyone hired after January 2000 has to be at least 55 years old or have 25 years of service to retire early. Murphy, though, signed a law in 2021 allowing nearly 8,000 police officers and firefighters about to reach 20 years of service a two-year window to retire early, regardless of

their age or enrollment date, with half their final compensation. The unions who advocated for the change said the law was not creating a new benefit, but bringing workers in line with those hired before 2000 to correct what they argued was a misrepresentation of the 1999 law by Christie's administration." The warehouse club would be forced to once again allow you to buy gas at their stores in New Jersey if a pair of state lawmakers get their way. State Sens. Richard Codey, D-Essex, and Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, have introduced nearly identical bills (S3000 and S3029) that would ban membership clubs from restricting gasoline sales only to paid members in the Garden State. The measures don't mention Costco by name, but they come three months after the company's gas stations in New Jersey switched to permitting only store members to purchase the often-cheaper gasoline at their pumps. That ended a longstanding policy letting everyone fill up there, whether they had a membership card or not. "Last time I checked, that's a commodity," Codey, a former New Jersey governor, said of gasoline. "What's going on here?" Gopal said this is especially an issue as people continue to deal with high gas prices, even though they've begun to drop. The average price for a gallon of regular gas in New Jersey as of Friday was \$3.44, according to AAA -- higher than it

was a year ago (\$3.22) but lower than it was a month ago (\$3.93). "I do believe gas is a public commodity, just like food and energy," Gopal said. "I don't believe there should be membership costs to get things generally in the public good." The lawmaker stressed he is not telling businesses what to charge for gas, just that "it shouldn't be done as a club." "I don't think adding an additional barrier is great," Gopal said." But what and how will it be taught? And what is the process for developing a curriculum that will benefit the students and the community? Those questions are left unaddressed in the onepage bill. The Legislature provided no framework or guidelines for what the curriculum should contain. It will be left to local school boards to determine exactly what to include in the lesson plans. That exercise isn't likely to be an easy one. Will the lessons be weaved into a broader curriculum? Will the lessons the LGBT community and lawmakers who supported the bill be confined to a single, self-contained unit? How will it be tailored differently for middle school and high school students? Will the contributions of lesbians, gays and transexuals be featured if their sexual orientation had nothing to do with their historical legacy? Will it focus more heavily on LGBT activists and their contributions to moving the LGBT agenda forward? How will the

curriculum deal with gay historical figures such as Socrates and Michelangelo? What about 20thcentury figures such as Susan B. Anthony, Eleanor Roosevelt and astronaut Sally Ride? How about more modern-day figures? Ellen DeGeneres? Rachel Maddow? Former New Jersey Gov. Jim McGreevey? Where will the line be drawn? Anything related to the LGBT community and education is inherently sensitive. That helps explain why so many legislators in Trenton refused to vote yes or no on the bill. In October 2022, Gopal Praised Murphy's Nominees To Replace Three State Board Of Education Members Who Protested The Murphy Administration's Changes To Sex Ed Standards. "Gov. Phil Murphy has nominated three women to serve on the state Board of Education, a group made up of 13 unelected members who approve rules and regulations and advise the state on educational policy. Mary Bennett, Kwanghee Jung and Claudine Keenan, who all hold credentials in the field of education, will replace current board members Mary Elizabeth Gazi, Mary Beth Berry and Vice President Andrew Mulvihill. This is the first group of nominations Murphy has made to the board since his reelection in 2021, even though most of the current members' terms are nearly ended and four board members' terms expired several years ago. State board members serve for six-year terms and without compensation. Mulvihill, Berry and Gazi, all had expired terms and were serving in holdover status. The three outgoing board members broke with protocol when they protested the Murphy administration's changes to the state's sex education standards, which have continued to fuel controversy in school districts and have become a rallying point for November's school board elections. The three members, along with Jack Fornaro, wrote an unofficial letter, leaked to the press in May, asking state Department of Education acting Commissioner Angelica Allen-McMillan to reopen and examine the 2020 Comprehensive Health and Physical Education standards and make "potential adjustments" to the language. Fornaro remains on the board. The letter also asked Allen-McMillan to permit districts to continue teaching the older 2014 standards until a review of the already-adopted 2020 standards could be completed. In the state Board of Education meeting that followed the letter, Allen-McMillan also went off script and made an opening statement not on the agenda in which she said she would not change the standards. Instead, she said, she "wholeheartedly disagrees" with anyone who suggests changing the standards and that retracting them would be "a disservice" to students. At the time, outgoing board member Mulvihill said the standards should be revisited because they offended some people's moral and religious beliefs. Board President Kathy Goldenberg tabled the discussion, saying changing the standards, which the board approved in 2020, wasn't "even a remote possibility." The three nominees must now be approved by their district senators before they can be confirmed to join the board by a vote in the Senate. The nominees were selected by Murphy with the consent of Allen-McMillan, and with some support from legislators. "I read and researched their biographies. I didn't talk to them directly, but they all seem to have excellent qualifications and a lot of public education experience," said Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, chair of the Senate Education Committee. "Marriage equality may soon be better protected in New Jersey as a bill moves on to votes in the state Senate and Assembly. A 2013 court ruling legalized same-sex marriage in New Jersey, but it has not been cemented in a statute. The New Jersey Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee

on Thursday voted almost unanimously to move the bill forward that would codify marriage equality into law. Legislators will consider the bill on Monday. If it passes both chambers, it heads to Gov. Phil Murphy for his likely approval. He has vocally supported LGBTQ rights during his tenure. The momentum in Trenton arrives at an important time, explained Christian Fuscarino, executive director of Asbury Park-based Garden State Equality. "With a conservativeleaning Supreme Court, we cannot afford to sit by in hopes the Justices will leave Obergefell v. Hodges intact," Fuscarino said, referring to the 2015 ruling that legalized marriage equality at a national level. "Our Legislature must act now to preserve this sacred right." When marriage equality got the all-clear from New Jersey courts, Amy Quinn and her partner of 10 years, Heather Jensen, were among the first to be wed, exchanging vows in a ceremony on Asbury Park Boardwalk. Nearly a decade later, Quinn is now deputy mayor of Asbury Park and the fight for marriage equality in New Jersey continues. "I can't believe we're still fighting for this, but here we are," Ouinn said. LGBTO couples worry that without protections granted by a law, "the rights given ... could change with a different court," said former state Sen. Bill Baroni, who was the first person to vote "yes" to marriage equality in 2013. "I envy one of you because one of you could be the last person to vote 'yes' on marriage equality and put it in our law forever and say to the people of New Jersey, no matter who you love we value you, we honor you, you are equal," Baroni said during Thursday's committee meeting. The last "yes" vote on Thursday came from state Sen. Dawn Marie Addiego, D- Burlington. State Sen. Steven Oroho, R-Sussex, cast the sole opposing vote, citing concerns over "a lack of religious exemption" in the bill. Quinn said the effort is "really smart" of the bill's lead sponsors: state Sens. Loretta Weinberg, D-Bergen; Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth; and Stephen Sweeney, D-Camden, the outgoing president of the Senate." (Asbury Park Press, 12/18/21)



First, this law bans abortions after an ultrasound can detect what lawmakers defined as a fetal "heartbeat," which can be as early as six weeks into pregnancy. However, as medical and legal experts explain, this term is misleading as embryos at this stage of development do not yet possess a heart. Second, this particular bill does not even make an exemption for pregnancies resulting from rape or incest. Third, and the main difference from all other bills relating to abortion law, this bill allows private citizens to sue abortion providers or anyone else who helps someone get an abortion, even if they have no direct relation to the person receiving the abortion. For example, if a woman were to request a car from a ride-sharing app such as Uber, Lyft, or taxi, the individual who drove the patient to the appointment could get sued for helping even though the individual had no idea what the appointment was for. The ensuing rush of private citizens now allowed to sue aims to put advocacy groups, doctors, clinics, and other pro-choice organizations out of business by taking up all of their time and money fighting against these suits. Furthermore, people who sued would be awarded at least \$10,000 as well as costs for attorney's fees, if they won their case. So what does this mean for New Jersey? Despite being legal, access to abortion has always been fragile and limited. In New Jersey, there exists strong case law that provides additional protections beyond the federal law for the right to access abortion care. But court cases may not be sufficient to fully protect and ensure New Jerseyans access to abortion, particularly if the U.S. Supreme Court follows their inaction on Texas by gutting Roe when they rule on the Mississippi case next year. 

"Legislation prohibiting county constitutional officers from serving as political party bosses in New Jersey is on its way to the full state Senate. The bill, introduced last week by state Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, was approved along party lines in the state Senate Judiciary Committee on Thursday after a half-hour of intense opposition from Republican party leaders in Gopal's home district. The legislation would prevent county clerks, sheriffs and surrogates from serving as chairpersons, co-chairpersons and vice-chairpersons of county committees within political parties. Gopal called the bill "common sense" and a "no-brainer" because of the partisan implications political leadership could have on sensitive topics. "When you enter the judiciary, you have sheriff's officers there. When you handle an election matter, there are sheriff's officers there. Clerks run the elections and surrogates, who are also affected by this bill, are also quasijudges," Gopal said. "I don't understand how any rational person should think they could be political bosses." But as state Sen. Jon Bramnick pointed out, the roles are already partisan because many constitutional officers in New Jersey are elected and there are already systems in place to ensure that they don't exert undue influence." Holman, a political feud ensued for the next four years that continues today as Golden's operatives are now operating against Gilmore in Ocean County. The once untouchable chairman, losing the fear and respect he once wielded statewide, is seeing challenges to his own agenda in Ocean County elections each cycle, often by candidates with affiliations with the Monmouth GOP. Gopal and Gilmore are close allies and friends, according to Gopal. Both have been seen meeting with each other and with Governor Phil Murphy in recent months. Gilmore, the Ocean County GOP Chairman, now works for a lobbying firm owned by the brother of the state's most powerful political figure, George Norcross causing many insiders in Ocean County to question Gilmore's loyalty to the Republican party. 

"State Senator Vin Gopal's Republican challenger is accusing the "Vin Gopal Civic Association," a 501(c)(3) organization, of engaging in campaign-like activities which she says warrant action of authorities in Trenton and Washington, D.C. This week, Lori Annetta (R-Freehold Borough) wrote to the New Jersey Attorney General, Election Law Enforcement Commission and Internal Revenue Service requesting an investigation into possible violations of federal and state laws. "Senator Gopal specifically added his name and title as Senator to a bulk mailing sent by this 'charity, that landed in voters mailboxes during the first week of October just days before the start of early voting in New Jersey on October 23 and during the mail-in voting period," Annetta alleged in a statement. The cited mailer (pictured on the right) is an invitation to a "family day" event in Ocean Township purportedly intended to support local VFWs and American Legions. Ocean lies inside Gopal's 11th Legislative District. "This event, as well as the bulk mailing that was done by the charitable organization with not just the organization's name, but also 'Senator Vin Gopal' with top billing on the flier, in the days leading up to a hotly contested election for Senator Gopal's legislative seat, is clear evidence that Senator Gopal is utilizing the Vin Gopal Civic Association to solicit and spend 'charitable contributions' for the purpose of promoting himself throughout his legislative district while simultaneously operating his political reelection campaign," Annetta charged. Gopal Sponsored Legislation To Change The 'Freeholder' Title To Director Contending The Phrase "Has No Place In Modern Diverse Society." "One of the bill's sponsors in the Senate is Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Monmouth), who said, "The term 'freeholder' has its roots in pre-Colonial England and was used to describe free, white land owning men. This archaic phrase, blemished with negative connotations, has no place in a modern, diverse society. "We have a responsibility to recognize outdated components of our government and take steps to modernize where appropriate. I believe in this instance, it is more than appropriate. By transitioning from the phrase 'freeholder' to 'commissioner' we are bringing our county government, with a budget of nearly \$450 million and over 600,000 constituents, into the 21st century. "Here in Monmouth County, the term 'freeholder' often causes confusion, leading some to believe the title is associated with Freehold Borough or Freehold Township. The title, which is only used in our state, also tends to confuse public officials outside of New Jersey who use the term 'commissioner.' This long overdue change will provide some much needed clarity to both the residents of New Jersey and the out-of-state public officials we work with on a regular basis," Gopal said. On April 12, the Senate bill was passed 27-4 with nine senators not voting. There are four senators who represent Monmouth County in the state Legislature. Gopal, who is a sponsor of the bill, voted "yes," Republican Sam Thompson voted "yes," Republican Robert Singer voted "yes" and Republican Declan O'Scanlon voted "no." The Assembly bill was introduced on Jan. 29 and referred to the Assembly State and Local Government Committee." (*News Transcript*, 6/5/18)

Gopal's Legislation To Abandon The Freeholder Term Was Passed In 2020. "A bill that would rename the title of county officials in New Jersey from freeholder to commissioner is headed to Gov. Phil Murphy's desk after passing the state Senate on Thursday. After years of debate, the bill, S855, calls for a name change because of the history of the centuries-old term that many consider racist and offensive. It was a term coined when only white, male landowners could be hold public office. The measure was approved with a vote of 31-6 and is backed by Murphy, who announced his support of the bipartisan legislation on July 10 with state Senate President Steve Sweeney and Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin. There's been talk of abolishing the term for years. The latest push comes amid a new civil rights movement to address systemic racism in America, sparked by the police killing of George Floyd, a Black man, in Minnesota and fueled by protests across the country. "This is an outdated name that is rooted in the terminology and practices of bigotry that needs to be eliminated," Sweeney said in a statement. "As we work to bring justice and equality to all Americans we should recognize that symbolism matters and the titles we use for public offices have meaning. We should be diligent in erasing all remnants of oppression." Murphy is expected to sign the bill, which was sponsored by Sweeney and state Sens. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, and Joe Pennachio, R-Morris." "Lawmakers are pulling a vote Thursday on a controversial bill to suspend the state's yearly minimum wage increases now \$10 an hour, and slated to rise to \$15 an hour by 2024 in the event of an economic recession, according to the bill's main sponsor Sen. Vin Gopal, D-11th District. The measure met opposition from U.S. Rep. Don Norcross, D-1st District, who in a Tuesday afternoon statement called the proposal "irresponsible" and said that it would "harm both workers and businesses.""I've asked Chairman Madden to pull my bills tomorrow and he said OK," Gopal tweeted Wednesday morning. "There will be no discussion. I look forward to meeting with stakeholders in the weeks and months ahead on the positives and negatives of both bills."Under the first measure, Senate Bill 3607, the state-mandated pay increase schedule would be suspended in the event of a decline in employment and sales tax, at which point the suspension would be instituted on a year-by-year basis. The second scenario laid out in the bill would suspend the wage increase until the state regains revenue past 2 percent.Senate Bill 3608, meanwhile, would create a task force to studythe effect he minimum wage increase has on businesses including the ability to hire new workers, whether they needed to cut hours or lay off workers to make ends meet, and whether they switched to automation." "Gov. Phil Murphy on Monday rejected a proposal to immediately allow all police and firefighters enrolled in New Jersey's pension system to retire early with a reduced pension after 20 years of service. But the Democratic governor didn't rule out the idea completely as he issued a conditional veto of the measure, dubbed the "burnout bill." Instead, Murphy suggested extending a law he signed temporarily providing the 20-and-out benefit by another three years and reassess its impact after that. If it still makes financial sense, he said, the pension system's board can make the benefit permanent. This all relates to a complicated issue that has changed a few times in recent decades. State law requires members of the state's Police and Firemen's Retirement System to retire at 65 with their full pension. But a 1999 state law allowed people with 20 years of service to retire, albeit at half their final compensation. That was later changed during then-Gov. Chris Christie's administration so anyone hired after January 2000 has to be at least 55 years old or have 25 years of service to retire early. Murphy, though, signed a law in 2021 allowing nearly 8,000 police officers and firefighters about to reach 20 years of service a two-year window to retire early, regardless of their age or enrollment date, with half their final compensation. The unions who advocated for the change said the law was not creating a new benefit, but bringing workers in line with those hired before 2000 to correct what they argued was a misrepresentation of the 1999 law by Christie's administration." "Twenty-six New Jersey elected officials signed a letter of support for the recent unionization efforts at Starbucks stores in the state, urging CEO Howard Schultz to adhere to, and sign, the Fair Election Principles. Starbucks workers organizing a union drive gathered at the Hopewell store on Monday with legislators to support their campaign and other Starbucks union drives across the state. U.S. Rep. Bonnie Watson Coleman (D-12th Dist.) spoke at the event in solidarity with the workers, who launched their unionization effort in January, as the first New Jersey Starbucks to do so. "We stand in solidarity with Starbucks workers seeking to organize in our state and our communities," Watson Coleman said. "New Jersey is stronger when workers have a collective voice in their pay and working conditions." Watson Coleman was also one of the 26 New Jersey lawmakers who signed the letter addressed to Schultz. The letter lists nine fair election principles, including not making any implicit or explicit threats and giving equal space for pro-union materials if anti-union materials are posted on the premises. "All workers have the right to a union and to a

collective voice in the conditions of their own employment," part of the letter reads. "We believe that these organizing efforts will ultimately lead to a stronger and more sustainable future for Starbucks, the workers, and our State." 2023: "The New Jersey State Council Of The Service Employees International Union (Seiu) Endorsed Six Democratic State Legislators For The 2023 Elections Today - Two Of Whom, State Sens. Vin Gopal (D-Long Branch) And Andrew Zwicker (D-South Brunswick), Are Running For Re-Election In Two Of The State's Most Competitive Districts." "The New Jersey State Council of the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) endorsed six Democratic state legislators for the 2023 elections today - two of whom, State Sens. Vin Gopal (D-Long Branch) and Andrew Zwicker (D-South Brunswick), are running for re-election in two of the state's most competitive districts. Also getting the support of the union are State Sen. Linda Greenstein (D-Plainsboro), State Sen. Joe Vitale (D-Woodbridge), Assemblywoman Annette Quijano (D-Elizabeth), and Assemblywoman Britnee Timberlake (D-East Orange), who is running unopposed for her district's Senate seat. "These legislators have stood with us in the statehouse and in the streets," SEIU NJ Council President Megan Chambers said in a statement. "They have shown up for our members and for working people, and they deserve our strong support." Of the six endorsees, only Vitale and Quijano face a contested primary next month. Vitale is the heavy favorite against solo off-the-line candidate Michelle Burwell, while Quijano and her running mates are being challenged by a slate associated with former Assemblyman Jamel Holley (D-Roselle), who seemingly recruited candidates to boost his mayoral comeback campaign in Roselle. In November, the political limelight will be on Gopal and Zwicker, each of whom holds a competitive seat that Republicans hope to flip this year. The same could be true of Greenstein, though she is unlikely to be at serious risk of losing unless the GOP has a very strong year." (NJ Globe, 5/12/23)

"By acting early in these key races, we will have more time to do the grassroots work needed to elect our endorsed candidates. And our endorsement comes with our commitment to do that work," said NJEA President Sean Spiller in a joint statement with his union leadership. "Every candidate endorsed in this first round has proven they deserve the support of NJEA members." Endorsements from the NJEA also went to nine Democrats in Hudson County, including Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Brian P. Stack (D-Union City) in the 33rd, Assemblyman Raj Mukherji (D-Jersey City) in the 32nd, and Assemblywoman Angela McKnight (D-Jersey City) in the 31st. Stack and Mukherji are unopposed; McKnight faces a minimal primary challenger. The NJEA is backing two Middlesex County state senators with nominal primary opponents, Patrick Diegnan (D-South Plainfield) and Joseph Vitale (D-Woodbridge)." (NJ Globe, 4/26/23)

In 2023, The New Jersey State Building & Construction Trades Council Endorsed Gopal. "The New Jersey State Building & Construction Trades Council has endorsed Democrats in most of the state's competitive legislative races, but is not taking sides in the 11th district State Assembly race, where two freshman Republicans are seeking re-election. The labor group is backing Democrat John Burzichelli (D-Paulsboro) in the 3rd district against State Sen. Ed Durr (R-Logan) and Democrat Paul Moriarty (D-Washington Township) against Republican Christopher Del Borrello for the open Senate seat in the 4th district. But in the contest for two open Assembly seats in the 4th, the building trades council passed over Republican Matt Walker, an Operating Engineers Local 825 board member, and is backing Democrats Dan Hutchison and Codey Miller. In the 11th, the group endorsed State Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Long Branch) for reelection but passed on his two running mates. That's good news for Republican Assemblywomen Marilyn Piperno (R-Colts Neck) and Kim Eulner (R-Shrewsbury), who want to return to Trenton for second terms. The state building trades, which has strong ties to South Jersey Democrats, are staying out of the 1st and 2nd districts, where six Republican incumbents are seeing re-election, but are supporting Republican Latham Tiver, an Operating Engineers Local 825 official, for the open 8th district Senate seat; Republican Assemblymen Michael Torrissi (R-Hammonton) and Brandon Umba (R-Medford) were also endorsed. The endorsements largely favor sitting legislators, regardless of ideology: the building trades are backing some of the state's most liberal Democrats, like Britnee Timberlake (D-East Orange) and Shavonda Sumter (D-Paterson), and the most conservative Republicans, like Parker Space (R-Wantage), Joseph Pennacchio (R-Montville), and Doug Steinhardt (R-Lopatcong)." In 2023, Gopal, Donlon And Peterpaul Were Backed By The CWA. "The CWA made no Assembly endorsements in South Jersey, except for Majority Whip Carol Murphy (D-Mount Laurel), who is in the safely Democratic 7th district. A previous announcement listed

endorsements for Democratic State Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Long Branch) and his running mates, Luanne Peterpaul and Margie Donlon. Peterpaul and Donlon face incumbents Marilyn Piperno (R-Colts Neck) and Kim Eulner (R-Shrewsbury). Four Democratic incumbents don't have CWA endorsements: Richard Codey (D-Roseland), Renee Burgess (D-Irvington), Teresa Ruiz (D-Newark), and Brian P. Stack (D-Union City). "Everyone deserves the opportunity to work in a safe, respectful environment with fair wages and benefits," said Dennis Trainor, Vice President for CWA District 1. "We are extremely proud to back these Assembly and Senate candidates, because we know they'll be steadfast, strong supporters of working families and the labor movement here in New Jersey."" In 2023, Donlon, Peterpaul, And Gopal Were Backed By The AFL-CIO. "The AFL-CIO endorsed three Republican incumbents for re-election: State Sen. Vince Polistina (R-Egg Harbor Township), Assemblyman Don Guardian (R-Atlantic City), and Assemblywoman Claire Swift (R-Margate). The building trades declined to support anyone in the 2nd district. The endorsements in the 3rd district went to Democrat John Burzichelli, a former ten-term assemblyman who is challenging State Sen. Ed Durr (R-Logan); for the Assembly, the union is backing Democrats Heather Simmons, a Gloucester County freeholder, and Dave Bailey, Jr. against Assemblywoman Bethanne McCarthy Patrick (R-Mannington) and her running mate, Hopewell Township Committeeman Thomas Tedesco. In the 8th district, the AFL-CIO went Republican: Latham Tiver, a business agent for Operating Engineers Local 825 for Senate, and incumbents Brandon Umba (R-Medford) and Michael Torrissi, Jr. for Assembly. No endorsement was made for State Senate in the 1st district, where Republican Michael Testa, Jr. (R-Vineland) is seeking a third term, but AFL-CIO endorsements went to his running mates, Assemblymen Antwan McClellan (R-Ocean City) and Erik Simonson (R-Lower Township). The AFL-CIO went with Democratic challengers Luanne Peterpaul, a former municipal court judge, and Ocean Township Councilwoman Margie Donlon, in their bids to unseat freshmen Republican Assemblywoman Marilyn Piperno (R-Colts Neck) and Kim Eulner (R-Shrewsbury) in the 11th. State Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Long Branch) also won the union endorsement." (NJ Globe, 6/14/23)

In 2023, The Monmouth-Ocean County Building and Construction Trades Council Backed Donlon, Peterpaul, And Gopal. "The Monmouth-Ocean County Building and Construction Trades Council has endorsed two Democratic challengers for State Assembly in the 11th district and is asking the state building trades council to do the same. "The Monmouth-Ocean County Building Trades gives our full endorsement to Senator Vin Gopal's running mates: Assembly candidates Dr. Margie Donlon and former Judge Luanne Peterpaul," said Tom DeBartolo, the president of the local building trades council. Last year, the Senate picked this issue up again, passing legislation to increase the number of CNAs in each nursing home, improving the ratio of aides-to-patients and spreading out the work over a greater number of bodies. This bill — which prescribed one caregiver per eight patients during the day, one per 10 residents in the evening, and one per 16 residents at night — was a clear and commonsense reform. If we make these changes, we can breathe new life into a battered and exhausted industry. We can create more personal time for each aide to care for the seniors in their service, and more opportunities to see to their individual needs. We can cut down on emotional burnout, injuries and accidents, and transform these nursing homes into the sanctuaries that they were always meant to be. These reforms add up to a safer, more robust system that's not only better-equipped to help the seniors with disabilities already living there, but the aging generation that will soon follow. And at the end of the day, that goal — improving the lives of our seniors — needs to be our No. 1 priority. Our hardworking and dedicated CNAs have held the line for our seniors against overwhelming odds and impossible challenges. It's time to give them the support they need to keep going." Costco

In 2022, Gopal Noted His Support For Legislation To Ban Membership From Restricting Gasoline Sales To Only Paid Members. 'Not a Costco member? The warehouse club would be forced to once again allow you to buy gas at their stores in New Jersey if a pair of state lawmakers get their way. State Sens. Richard Codey, D-Essex, and Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, have introduced nearly identical bills (S3000 and S3029) that would ban membership clubs from restricting gasoline sales only to paid members in the Garden State. The measures don't mention Costco by name, but they come three months after the company's gas stations in New Jersey switched to permitting only store members to purchase the often-cheaper gasoline at their pumps. That ended a longstanding policy letting everyone fill up there, whether they had a membership card or not. "Last time I checked, that's a commodity," Codey, a former New Jersey governor, said of gasoline. "What's going on here?" Gopal said this is especially an issue as people continue to deal with high gas prices, even though they've begun to drop. The average price for a gallon of regular gas in New Jersey as of Friday was \$3.44, according to AAA -- higher than it was a year ago (\$3.22) but lower than it was a month ago (\$3.93). "I do believe gas is a public

commodity, just like food and energy," Gopal said. "I don't believe there should be membership costs to get things generally in the public good." The lawmaker stressed he is not telling businesses what to charge for gas, just that "it shouldn't be done as a club." "I don't think adding an additional barrier is great," Gopal said." 2022: "Lawmakers From The New Jersey Congressional Delegation And The New Jersey Legislature This Week Called On Members Of Congress To Commit To Funding From The "Build Back Better Act" That Would Expand Rental Assistance, Fund Public Housing Repairs, And Grow The National Housing Trust Fund To Build More Affordable Homes." "Lawmakers from the New Jersey Congressional Delegation and the New Jersey Legislature this week called on members of Congress to commit to funding from the "Build Back Better Act" that would expand rental assistance, fund public housing repairs, and grow the national Housing Trust Fund to build more affordable homes. The announcements were part of an event hosted by the Housing and Community Development Network of NJ (the Network) in support of the Network's HouseNJ campaign, which calls for federal- and state-level housing investments. With the "Build Back Better Act" stalled in the U.S. Senate, state and national housing advocates are urging lawmakers to support essential Build Back Better Act investments in any upcoming budget reconciliation bill. "It took us years to build back from the foreclosure crisis and now we run the risk of seeing all of our hard fought progress erased," said U.S. Senator Bob Menendez (D-NJ). "That's why we must make the transformative investments in the President's 'Build Back Better' plan to address our country's affordable housing crisis. If this pandemic has taught us anything it's that housing is healthcare and at a time like this we should be doing everything we can to help families find a safe and affordable place to call home." "It is time for us to make long overdue investments to create, preserve and improve our affordable housing infrastructure," said U.S. Senator Cory Booker (D-NJ). "We must use this opportunity to build back better and bring down the cost of housing, improve housing conditions, and remove historic barriers to housing access." The Network's HouseNJ campaign urges the Biden Administration and Congress to include the housing investments from the House-passed Build Back Better Act in any reconciliation deal, which is the expected path for the bill's final passage. These investments will provide rental assistance to additional extremely low-income households, increase the National Housing Trust Fund, as well as repair and preserve public housing. If the House version of the "Build Back Better Act" were enacted, NJ would receive 21,000 new rental vouchers. The state would also receive \$545.3 million from the National Housing Trust Fund for 5,000 new homes affordable to households at extremely low incomes. In comparison, NJ received \$24.3 million in 2021." (Insider NJ, 2/25/22)

In 2018, Gopal Praised Passage Of A \$20 Million Annual Subsidy For The NJ Horse

Racing Industry. "New Jersey lawmakers are considering doling out \$100 million over five years to prop up the state's financially-strapped horse racing industry, which has continued to struggle despite beginning to offer sports betting this summer. The money would be used for "purses," the name for the award money paid out to race winners. "This will be a huge help for the horse racing industry that is an important part of New Jersey's heritage and culture and a key source of jobs and economic activity," said state Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Monmouth), who co-sponsored the bill. New Jersey racetracks used to get an annual \$17 million subsidy from Atlantic City casinos in return for not having slot machines, as is common at many tracks around the country. But former Republican Gov. Chris Christie ended the subsidy for racetracks in 2011 when he privatized the industry in an attempt to make it self-sustaining." The commercial aims at New Jersey Democrat Senator Vin Gopal, who has fallen in line with Governor Phil Murphy and his radical clean energy plan that could once again put the species in danger. The video, sponsored by the Republican State Leadership Committee, portrays offshore wind energy projects as the next great threat to the whales after decades-long conservation efforts brought them from the brink of extinction. the governor, Gopal and those who stand ready to make billions of dollars off of the Murphy's master energy plan. Clearly, they could care less about 40 dead dolphins and countless whales washing up on our beaches." The plight of the humpback whale was so dire in the 1980s that in the 1986 Star Trek film The Voyage Home, whales had become extinct by the 23rd century. "Republicans in the 4th legislative district have begun attacking Assemblyman Paul Moriarty (D-Washington), who is running for the district's Senate seat this year, over his recent vote for a bill allowing the offshore wind company Ørsted to access substantial federal tax credits. "This is a classic 'Robin Hood in Reverse' scheme that screws local ratepayers to bail out a multi-billion-dollar company," said Chris Del Borrello, a former Washington Township Councilman and the Republican Senate nominee in the 4th district. "What was Paul Moriarty thinking? Or better yet, follow the money." The offshore wind farms currently in the early stages of construction along the Jersey Shore have long been the subject of intense debate in New Jersey politics. Democrats, most prominently Gov. Phil Murphy, have said offshore wind development is a necessary part of the fight against climate change; Republicans have responded that wind farms would harm tourism along the Shore, and have connected the development to a spate of whale deaths earlier this year. The battle came to a head in the state legislature over the Ørsted bill, which essentially gives the company federal tax credits that would have instead gone to ratepayers in New Jersey. Murphy signed the bill last week, shortly after it passed the legislature on a near-party line vote. Only one Democrat voted against the bill: State Sen. Restrictions And Enforcement

In April 2020, Gopal Planned To Introduced Legislation To Impose Severe Fines And/ Or Jail Party Goers Who Violated Social Distancing Orders. "Despite daily reminders that verge on begging for public compliance, gatherings continue. "It angers us," Murphy said Tuesday. "We believe the more swift, visible action that is taken such as you saw in Newark last night ... the more quickly we can bring this non-compliant behavior to zero." Lawmakers are proposing their own ways to crack down. Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, says partygoers should be penalized, too. He plans to introduce a bill that will direct law enforcement to cite attendees, potentially resulting in a fine of \$1,000 or six months in jail. "Proper social distancing is essential for keeping our hospitals from being overwhelmed, and these arrogant and shortsighted gatherings are putting every one of us at risk," Gopal said in a statement. A group of Ocean County Republican lawmakers want to give the health commissioner power to collect a \$10,000 to \$15,000 fine if anyone hosts a party in violation of the governor's order." In Late April 2020, Gopal Wrote In Support Of Closing Public Parks. "Living near a public park — whether state, local or county — is one of the many upsides of residing in the Garden State. Whether it's walking through Seven Presidents Oceanfront Park or hiking in South Mountain Reservation, New Jersey's open spaces often provide a welcome respite to our lives. We know that Gov. Phil Murphy and New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Catherine R. McCabe also treasure our open spaces and recognize their importance to people across our state. That's why we understand how difficult it must have been to close New Jersey's state and county parks as part of our statewide response to COVID-19. Unfortunately, we do not live in a time of easy decisions. And we support the decision to temporarily close New Jersey's parks. As of Monday, more than 88,000 of our fellow New Jerseyans have tested positive for COVID-19. Sadly, more than 4,300 have passed away. Statewide, we owe it to them — and to their families and loved ones — to take an aggressive approach to protect public health, especially when it comes to social distancing. Over 14,000 New Yorkers have also died so far from COVID-19. Between, New Jersey and New York, we are averaging nearly 1,000 deaths per day this past week. This is a horrific statistic. As Murphy and state health experts have said on many occasions, we must do everything we can to flatten the curve and slow the rate of new COVID-19 infections Unfortunately, just as the COVID-19 outbreak was surging, so were the crowds at state parks and forests. Just prior to closing state and county parks, visitation numbers to state parks were at unusually high levels. And so were the behaviors that threaten public health." In June 2020, Gopal Noted His Request To Have State Officials Investigate Donovan's Reef Bar For Social Distancing Violations. "Lewis contacted both Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, and Gov. Phil Murphy, asking for action to be taken against Donovan's Reef. Gopal said Monday that after hearing from Lewis he contacted James Graziano, acting director of the state's Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control, who said he would investigate. There was no immediate word from the division or from the state Attorney General's Office on whether any action has been taken. "That's where you're seeing the spikes (in coronavirus infections) in Texas and Florida coming from, the bars and clubs," Gopal said. "So this is unacceptable." Donovan's Reef lists on its website the precautions the bar says it is taking during the pandemic. They include "hygiene hand washing stations located throughout the venue," social distance markers and signs, and "practicing safe staff social distancing and continual education." The website reads "We will have dedicated hygiene specialists on staff during all operating hours. PPE (personal protective equipment) i.e.: gloves and masks will be available to all our staff at all times, and to customers upon request." Phil Murphy mentioned the out-of-state spikes when he announced at his daily press briefing that he was canceling a plan to reopen indoor dining in restaurants." (Asbury Park Press, 6/30/20)

In July 2020, Gopal Called For Shore Towns To Impose Capacity Restrictions. "According to Murphy's May executive order, towns are required to implement "reasonable restrictions," including non-discriminatory capacity restrictions. Those capacity limits, determined by local officials, could be achieved through limiting beach badge sales or monitoring the crowds with technology. "I think both are good options," says state Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth. "I think the towns have got to handle this on their own. "They know their beaches, they know their entry points, they know their populations, and I think the state has to enforce it." Which option are Shore towns choosing for limiting capacity?" Phil Murphy's New Vaccination And Testing Requirements For Employees Of Health Care And Congregate Living Facilities." "State Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Long Branch), the chair of the Senate Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee, announced on Tuesday that he supports Gov. Phil Murphy's new vaccination and testing requirements for employees of health care and congregate living facilities. The requirements, which Murphy unveiled at a press briefing yesterday, mandates that all workers in such facilities will either need to show proof of vaccination or get a minimum of one Covid test per week beginning September 7. "The state-run veterans homes were among some of the hardest facilities hit in the beginning of the global COVID-19 pandemic," Gopal said. "This mandate to either have state health care employees get vaccinated or be tested every two weeks means we can give some assurance to our veterans and other community members that they are safe, and their health will continue to be a priority in this state." Several of the state's veterans' homes were horrifically impacted by Covid in 2020, with at least 102 residents of the Veterans Memorial Home in Menlo Park dying of the virus, and at least 89 deaths at another facility in Paramus. The catastrophes have been subject to a statewide grand jury investigation, and Murphy announced the appointment of new CEOs at both devastated facilities in March." (NJ Globe, 8/3/11)

Of Note, In 2022, Gopal Signed Onto Legislation To Curb Murphy's Emergency Powers. "Republican state lawmakers have repeatedly pushed bills aiming to curb the sweeping emergency powers Democratic Gov. Phil Murphy has used to combat the coronavirus pandemic in New Jersey. None of the measures have gone anywhere in the Democratic-controlled state Legislature. But their latest effort has something notable: the support of at least one Democrat. The proposal would limit the length a New Jersey governor could declare a state of emergency and public-health emergency to 60 days, unless the Legislature approves an extension. Under current state law, a state of emergency lasts until the governor lifts it, while a public-health emergency expires after 30 days, though the governor can keep issuing renewals every 30 days. The bill (S1200) would also give lawmakers the authority to terminate either emergency declaration if two-thirds of the Legislature vote to do so. State Sen. Declan O'Scanlon, R-Monmouth, a main sponsor, said state Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, has signed on as a cosponsor of the measure." (*Star Ledger*, 1/31/22)

Smoking

In 2019, Gopal Sponsored Legislation Banning Smoking On New Jersey Beaches. "New Jersey's beaches will soon be smoke free. A state law banning smoking on beaches will go into effect this month, with the onus on towns to figure out how to enforce the rule. Gov. Phil Murphy signed a measure in July prohibiting smoking on public beaches and parks, though municipalities can create small sections for smokers. The goal is to keep cigarettes off the sand and out of the ocean, where marine life could ingest them. "We can now breathe easier because the new ban on smoking in beaches and parks will go into effect," said New Jersey Sierra Club Director Jeff Tittel. Those who violate the law are subject to a \$250 fine for their first offense, \$500 for a second offense and \$1,000 for each subsequent offense. The bill doesn't specify which government body is responsible for enforcing the ban, leaving it up to towns to decide. State legislators Steve Sweeney, Vin Gopal, Bob Smith, Vincent Mazzeo, Clinton Calabrese, Valerie Vainieri Huttle and Paul Moriarty were primary sponsors of the bill." LGBT Content And Equity Plans

In 2019, Gopal Voted In Favor Of A Bill Requiring "Middle School And High School Students To Be Taught The Political, Economic And Social Contributions Of Notable Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual And Transgender People Throughout History." "The bill requires middle school and high school students to be taught the political, economic and social contributions of notable lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people throughout history. New Jersey is the second state to do so. If you guessed California was first, you guessed right. What's wrong with teaching students about the contributions of the LGBT community? Maybe nothing. But what and how will it be taught? And what is the process for developing a curriculum that will benefit the students and the community? Those questions are left unaddressed in the one-page bill. The Legislature provided no framework or guidelines for what the curriculum should contain. It will be left to local school boards to determine exactly what to include in the lesson

plans. That exercise isn't likely to be an easy one. Will the lessons be weaved into a broader curriculum? Will the lessons the LGBT community and lawmakers who supported the bill be confined to a single, self-contained unit? How will it be tailored differently for middle school and high school students? Will the contributions of lesbians, gays and transexuals be featured if their sexual orientation had nothing to do with their historical legacy? Will it focus more heavily on LGBT activists and their contributions to moving the LGBT agenda forward? How will the curriculum deal with gay historical figures such as Socrates and Michelangelo? What about 20thcentury figures such as Susan B. Anthony, Eleanor Roosevelt and astronaut Sally Ride? How about more modern-day figures? Ellen DeGeneres? Rachel Maddow? Former New Jersey Gov. Jim McGreevey? Where will the line be drawn? Anything related to the LGBT community and education is inherently sensitive. That helps explain why so many legislators in Trenton refused to vote yes or no on the bill. In the Assembly, 15 lawmakers abstained, including several who represent Ocean and Monmouth counties: Anne Gove, Ronald Dancer, Amy Handlin, Serena DiMaso and Edward Thomson. Most Ocean County legislators voted against the bill. In the Senate, Vin Gopal was the only one of the six Ocean or Monmouth legislators to support it." (Asbury Park Press, 2/5/19)

"There is a continual attempt by these politicians to mislead parents with outlandish accusations of schools teaching children inappropriate things with zero evidence of that taking place across over 600 school districts throughout the state," they said. Gopal is facing a tough reelection bid in November — he represents the only New Jersey legislative district where different parties hold upper and lower chamber seats — and Lagana's district is expected to host a close race as well. Schepisi charged the criticism of the board from Scutari and Coughlin is itself rooted in electoral politics. Sex Ed Standards

In 2022, "Gopal -- The Senate Education Chairman Who Was Re-Elected By A Close Margin In November -- Stressed That Most Of What He's Read In Articles About The Controversy Is Not Included In The Guidelines"; He Claimed The Standards Were Just General Recommendations. "In a Facebook post Tuesday morning, Gopal -- the Senate education chairman who was re-elected by a close margin in November -- stressed that most of what he's read in articles about the controversy is not included in the guidelines. "There is generic language on identifying gender roles and treating all kids, regardless or their gender, with respect," Gopal said. "Anything that is more specific than that is coming from a specific Board of Education locally." Gopal also said the guidelines are simply recommendations from the state. "It is up to a local board of education to use them if they want but they don't have to," he said. The senator also said parents can opt their students out of the lessons. Other critics focused their comments generally on when it's appropriate to teach children about sex." (*Star Ledger*, 4/13/22)

In May 2022, Gopal's "Senate Education Committee Voted Along Party Lines To Move Forward With A Democratic-Sponsored Bill That Doesn't Undo The Standards But Aims To Allay Concerns By Mandating School Districts Publish Their Sex Ed Curriculums Online In The Summer, Ensuring Parents Can Ask Questions About The Lessons, And Reinforcing Their Right To Opt Children Out Of The Classes." "For about two hours Monday, a state Senate panel heard often-heated testimony from some parents, conservative groups, and religious leaders who voiced fear about children being exposed to what they see as inappropriate or even pornographic material under New Jersey's new sex education standards. At the same time, Republican lawmakers repeated their calls to repeal the incoming guidelines -despite Democrats, education officials, and progressive advocates who insist the issue is being twisted and blown out of proportion. In the end, the Senate Education Committee voted along party lines to move forward with a Democratic-sponsored bill that doesn't undo the standards but aims to allay concerns by mandating school districts publish their sex ed curriculums online in the summer, ensuring parents can ask questions about the lessons, and reinforcing their right to opt children out of the classes. "If this becomes law ... we will know what's going on in our curricula in all of our school districts," state Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, the committee's chairman and bill's main sponsor, said during the hearing at the Statehouse in Trenton. "And if we see bad actors out there, this will be how we can try to correct that -- if we do see things being taught that shouldn't be taught." New Jersey's updated health and physical education standards, adopted by the state Board of Education in June 2020, outline when students should learn about topics such as sexual orientation, gender identity, and anatomy. It's up to individual school districts to implement their own curricula based on the guidelines starting in the 2022-23 school year." (Star Ledger, 5/9/22)

"Gopal -- who narrowly won re-election last year -- said he sponsored the bill that advanced Monday (S2481) to give parents a greater say in the matter, even though he has said critics are spreading misinformation about the standards. The measure would require school boards in the state to offer an annual opportunity for parents, guardians, and other residents to publicly comment on any curriculum using the standards. It would also require districts to post curricula to their websites at least two weeks before classes start, while also reiterating parents' rights to opt their child out of sex education at school. The latter part is already guaranteed by a 1980 state law. This was the first time Gopal's measure received a public hearing. The result was less a debate on the bill and more a forum for Republicans and opponents of the standards to keep pressing Democrats to repeal them completely and start over." (*Star Ledger*, 5/9/22)

"So why is a Democrat backing what seems to be a popular conservative talking point? What started as a worthy debate on educational standards, Gopal said, was hijacked, manipulated and distorted by GOP operatives. The purpose of his bill is simply to strengthen and clarify transparency and public access to the curriculum process, said Gopal, who narrowly won reelection last year in a competitive district. "Politicians and political consultants ... are trying to mislead well-meaning very reasonable parents who want to know what's in their child's classroom," Gopal told NJ Spotlight News. "The state Republican Party is doing a lot of it. They're doing paid ads and ... trying to mislead people and drive up votes." In a written response to NJ Spotlight News, Brad Schnure, communications director for the state Senate Republican Office, said "These concerns are being driven first and foremost by parents who were shocked by the explicit and age-inappropriate nature of some of the sample teaching materials they were provided to demonstrate how school districts might teach the new state mandated sex education standards this fall." No one is disputing Schnure's assertion that Westfield parents brought the debate into public view. But what was a local debate in Westfield was quickly weaponized for political reasons and then refracted through the lens of biased media platforms. Along the way, facts give way to erroneous spin and a debate devolved into a tribal fight. That was on display during Monday's committee hearing on Gopal's bill. Some parents, religious officials and conservative advocates said these sex-education standards are "sexualizing" and "grooming" children." (NJ Spotlight News, 5/11/22)

In October 2022, Gopal Praised Murphy's Nominees To Replace Three State Board Of Education Members Who Protested The Murphy Administration's Changes To Sex Ed Standards. "Gov. Phil Murphy has nominated three women to serve on the state Board of Education, a group made up of 13 unelected members who approve rules and regulations and advise the state on educational policy. Mary Bennett, Kwanghee Jung and Claudine Keenan, who all hold credentials in the field of education, will replace current board members Mary Elizabeth Gazi, Mary Beth Berry and Vice President Andrew Mulvihill. This is the first group of nominations Murphy has made to the board since his reelection in 2021, even though most of the current members' terms are nearly ended and four board members' terms expired several years ago. State board members serve for six-year terms and without compensation. Mulvihill, Berry and Gazi, all had expired terms and were serving in holdover status. The three outgoing board members broke with protocol when they protested the Murphy administration's changes to the state's sex education standards, which have continued to fuel controversy in school districts and have become a rallying point for November's school board elections. The three members, along

with Jack Fornaro, wrote an unofficial letter, leaked to the press in May, asking state Department of Education acting Commissioner Angelica Allen-McMillan to reopen and examine the 2020 Comprehensive Health and Physical Education standards and make "potential adjustments" to the language. Fornaro remains on the board. The letter also asked Allen-McMillan to permit districts to continue teaching the older 2014 standards until a review of the already-adopted 2020 standards could be completed. In the state Board of Education meeting that followed the letter, Allen-McMillan also went off script and made an opening statement not on the agenda in which she said she would not change the standards. Instead, she said, she "wholeheartedly disagrees" with anyone who suggests changing the standards and that retracting them would be "a disservice" to students. At the time, outgoing board member Mulvihill said the standards should be revisited because they offended some people's moral and religious beliefs. Board President Kathy Goldenberg tabled the discussion, saying changing the standards, which the board approved in 2020, wasn't "even a remote possibility." The three nominees must now be approved by their district senators before they can be confirmed to join the board by a vote in the Senate. The nominees were selected by Murphy with the consent of Allen-McMillan, and with some support from legislators. "I read and researched their biographies. I didn't talk to them directly, but they all seem to have excellent qualifications and a lot of public education experience," said Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, chair of the Senate Education Committee. He commended Murphy for selecting individuals who show "steadfast commitment to public education in their careers." Not all lawmakers were aware of the nominations." (Asbury Park Press, 10/2/22)

With this adoption, climate change education will be incorporated across seven content areas-21st Century Life and Careers, Comprehensive Health and Physical Education, Science, Social Studies, Technology, Visual and Performing Arts, and World Languages. Climate change standards have also been added to the appendices of the Mathematics and English Language Arts guidelines, which are up for review in 2022."In New Jersey, we have already begun to experience the effects of climate change, from our disappearing shorelines, to harmful algal blooms in our lakes, super storms producing torrential rain, and summers that are blazing hot," said First Lady Murphy. "The adoption of these standards is much more than an added educational requirement; it is a symbol of a partnership between generations. Decades of short-sighted decision-making has fueled this crisis and now we must do all we can to help our children solve it. This generation of students will feel the effects of climate change more than any other, and it is critical that every student is provided an opportunity to study and understand the climate crisis through a comprehensive, interdisciplinary lens." State Aid

In 2023, 'Monmouth And Ocean Counties Are Proposed To Lose Nearly \$46 Million In State Education Funding Despite A State Budget That Increases Spending On Schools Overall." "Several Shore schools have suffered drastic cutbacks in state aid dating back to 2018 when state Senate Bill 2, or S2, realigned the school funding formula in the state. Monmouth and Ocean counties are proposed to lose nearly \$46 million in state education funding despite a state budget that increases spending on schools overall. The New Jersey Department of Education released its proposed state aid funding the 2023-24 school year Thursday afternoon. That data shows 43 districts in Monmouth and Ocean counties would lose a combined \$60.4 million next school year, with Toms River Regional, Asbury Park, Freehold Regional and Jackson school districts poised to take some of the biggest hits. Those losses are offset by 39 school districts that expected to gain about \$14.5 million in state aid. Proposed funding for the counties' vocational school districts remained flat. The cuts to the Jersey Shore school districts come despite Gov. Phil Murphy's proposed budget adding more than \$834 million in K-12 education statewide." (*Asbury Park Press*, 3/9/23)

In 2023, Under A Legislative Compromise Between Murphy And Legislators, A Bill Would Restore \$102.7 Million In State Aid, Reducing Originally Proposed State Aid Cuts By Two-Thirds In The NJ State Budget. "A host of New Jersey school districts slated to have their state aid cut in Gov. Phil Murphy's new state budget proposal would see smaller reductions than originally planned under a deal the governor's administration just reached with top Democratic lawmakers. The bill would restore about \$102.7 million in state aid for districts in Murphy's budget plan for the fiscal year that begins in July. That means affected districts would ultimately see only one-third of the decreases they were originally scheduled to get. State Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, said this will help several districts across the state help avoid layoffs and program cuts. "Hundreds of thousands of teachers have their jobs on the line," Gopal told NJ Advance Media. "These districts have higher inflation costs, mental health costs, technology costs. The state is sitting on a surplus right now. We should be helping these districts." Murphy said in a statement released late Friday that his administration "remains committed to providing New Jersey students with a world-class education, which is why we continue to dedicate historic levels of aid for our schools in each year's budget." • "The Bill's Two Sponsors, Gopal And State Sen. Andrew Zwicker, D-Middlesex, Are Both Running For Reelection In Competitive Districts." "Republicans have hammered Murphy in recent weeks for the cuts to some school districts. This comes in a big legislative election year. All 120 seats in the Legislature are up for grabs in November, with Democrats hoping to retain control as Republicans aim to take at least one house for the first time in 20 years. The bill's two sponsors, Gopal and state Sen. Andrew Zwicker, D-Middlesex, are both running for reelection in competitive districts. The allocation of state school aid is based on a series of formulas designed to bridge the gap between the amount of money a district can take in and the amount of money it needs to provide a good education. Factors like property tax revenues, enrollment size and number of students who need higher levels of support, like those from low-income families or English language learners, are taken into account when determining how much aid a district needs. Despite the current funding formula being developed in 2008, a provision that prevented any districts from losing aid stayed in place until 2017. The 2008 formula is on track to be fully funded by 2025, the governor's office has said." (*Star-Ledger*, 3/18/23)

- The School Aid Restoration Bill Passed In Late March 2023. "Lawmakers have fasttracked a bill that would restore two-thirds of the state aid that school districts were set to lose in the upcoming year. Schools throughout the state were collectively preparing for a loss of about \$157 million. The proposed legislation would restore \$102.8 million and provide a one-time payment to districts that were losing funding for the 2023-24 school year. The bill cleared committee Monday morning and unanimously passed the Senate on Monday afternoon. It is expected to move through the Assembly later this month. Gov. Phil Murphy has said he will sign the legislation. Although the bill garnered unanimous support, some said it did not go far enough. Sen. Declan O'Scanlon, R-Monmouth, proposed an amendment to increase the amount of aid to restore it completely. That was tabled. O'Scanlon called the process "policy malfeasance" and said it doesn't matter "where your district is or what your circumstances are," because "further cuts like this are a problem." "It's a shame we can't simply do the right thing," he said. "We have to continue to torture these districts for some reason. It's one percent of our overall surplus that could make these districts whole this year when we have agreed, apparently, that we are going to revisit this formula and fix this. And we do need to it. We cannot continue down this path." To qualify, districts will have to send the commissioner of education a written plan explaining how they plan to use the funds and how they will fund operations in future school years." - School Leaders Described The Relief Funding Bill As Only A "Band Aid." "More than 160 New Jersey school districts that have suffered through six years of state aid cuts will receive one-time payments totaling \$102 million this year through a last-minute bill signed last week in Trenton. But many of those districts' leaders say the extra money, which is separate from Gov. Phil Murphy's budgeted school funding, is just a "Band-Aid" and they need a sustainable solution to keep serving their students. Many of the districts face dropping enrollment, but the aid cuts are driving them to cut programs, increase class sizes, and lay off teachers and staff. For instance, 40 faculty and staff members in Sussex County's Vernon Township school district were informed March 23 that they would not be returning to their jobs this fall. The district lost \$8.5 million over six years, school officials said. The additional aid from last week's legislation provides a one-time payment of \$211,000. "We need a long-term systemic solution ... this is a Band-Aid. It's only a one-time allocation," said Jeanne Howe, superintendent of Jefferson Township

Public Schools in Morris County, another affected district. Jefferson will receive \$1 million through the legislation, more than most other school districts in Passaic, Morris and Sussex counties receiving the payments. The Jefferson district's enrollment dropped 29% since 2010 but its state aid has fallen by 60%, she said. Jefferson Township will likely spend its \$1 million on district technology needs. It is "a one-year source of money, so it's not as though we can build this into our regular budget account," Howe said." (North Jersey, 5/4/23)

Our county vocational-technical schools and county colleges are at capacity. Last year alone, 17,000 qualified applicants were turned away from county vo-tech programs because there just wasn't any room for them in the schools. Votech schools receive 2.3 applications for every seat. Ironically, this comes at a time when there is growing concern about the high cost of a four-year college degree and burdensome student loan debt, and an increasing demand for other educational options. Many young people are looking for family-sustaining careers that can be launched with technical credentials and perhaps an associate's degree or an industry certificate. This investment in county vocational schools and county colleges will build the high-tech shops and labs needed to prepare young people with the skills, certifications and degrees needed to fill critical jobs in New Jersey's emerging and growing industries, like distribution and logistics, health care, advanced manufacturing, construction and clean energy." "Two Monmouth County state senators and the state Senate president from southern New Jersey have announced they are introducing legislation to encourage the creation of K-12 regional and county-wide school districts in an effort to improve educational quality and efficiency. Senate President Steve Sweeney (D-Gloucester, Salem, Cumberland), Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Monmouth) and Sen. Declan O'Scanlon (R-Monmouth) made the bipartisan announcement in a Feb. 22 press release. The legislation establishes criteria for state-funded regionalization studies, increases flexibility on regionalization cost apportionment, bars any regionalization that would have a segregative effect, and provides financial incentives for districts losing state aid because of declining enrollment to regionalize by extending the schedule for their Adjustment Aid cuts from four years to eight years, according to the press release. The three state legislators weighed in on the proposal. All were quoted in the press release. "This will be the first major overhaul of New Jersey's school regionalization statute in over 25 years," Sweeney said. "It is designed to improve the quality of education by ensuring coordination of curriculum from K to 12, provide the enriched educational experience smaller districts cannot offer, and generate long-term savings that can be used to hold down property taxes or reinvest in expanded educational programs." Affirmative Action

In June 2023, The AAPI Caucus, Led By Gopal, Issued A Joint Statement Criticizing The Supreme Court's Ruling Rolling Back Affirmative Action. "The members of the New Jersey Legislative Latino, Black and Asian-American and Pacific Islander Caucuses issued the following statement on the Supreme Court decision that rolls back race-based Affirmative Action measures at American universities: "Once again, the U.S. Supreme Court has delivered a shattering blow to our democracy with a recent decision that strikes down decades of legal precedent. Laws are enacted to help right a wrong, provide direction to ensure we move society toward equality and justice, protect citizens and give, regardless of race or heritage, access to opportunities once closed off to them. "This is not only just a setback for the country's higher education institutions. Corporate diversity programs promoting equity are also at risk. The systemic unequal treatment and discrimination people of color experienced in corporate America was brought to light through the discussions taking place around affirmative action and businesses had to find a solution to answering the call for diversity. "Racial inequalities still persist and pervade our educational and business spaces. We cannot simply turn a blind eye and pretend they will go away. Diversity, equity and inclusion programs make access to higher education possible for everyone. Preserving and protecting DEI programs and ensuring access for all people of color remains a steadfast priority for our caucuses. We did not come this far to turn the clocks back now."" Gopal Voted For Legislation Codifying The Legalization Of Marijuana. "In previous comments about S-3454, Arnone said, "Not only does this (law) keep parents in the dark about what may be happening in their child's life, it also shows children there are no major consequences if they are found using marijuana or alcohol for the first time. "Parents should have the right to know if their child is using or in possession of marijuana from the first encounter and be given the chance to discuss its consequences before it potentially becomes a larger issue." In a press release addressing the issue, state Sen. Robert Singer (R-Monmouth and Ocean) was quoted as saying, "People are starting to realize some of the concerning provisions of New Jersey's new marijuana laws that will cause real problems if we don't address them now. "Parents are worried that parental notification is now prohibited when kids are caught with drugs or alcohol. They have a right to know if their 12-year-old is smoking pot. "Police officers are concerned the new laws treat them like criminals. They are not the enemy and we should not hamstring their efforts to keep kids away from drugs and alcohol," Singer said. In 2021, "Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, Introduced A Bill, S3582, Monday That Would Allow Anyone 21 And Older To Grow Up To Six Marijuana Plants At Home, With A Maximum Of 12 Plants Per Household. Medical Patients Could Grow Up To 10 Plants." "Another lawmaker is taking a shot at letting people grow their own marijuana now that New Jersey has legalized the drug. Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, introduced a bill, S3582, Monday that would allow anyone 21 and older to grow up to six marijuana plants at home, with a maximum of 12 plants per household. Medical patients could grow up to 10 plants. Currently, growing five plants or less can result in three to five years in prison and a \$25,000 fine. Gopal's bill is the latest to touch on home grow for recreational use. Another was introduced in February by the late Sen. Gerald Cardinale, R-Bergen. He died before the bill made its way through Legislative committees. Sen. Troy Singleton, D-Burlington, also introduced a bill last month to allow the state's medical marijuana patients to grow up to four plants. That could help patients circumvent high prices and supply limitations that have hampered patient access. Many states with medical cannabis programs allow patients to grow their own medicine at home, but New Jersey lawmakers have shied away from the idea, saying it may come down the line, but for now will is likely to remain banned." Abortion

In 2021, Gopal Wrote In Opposition To Abortion Restrictions Passed In Texas. "First, to fully understand what is at stake, we need to know what the Texas abortion law does exactly. This law contains three major points of horror. New Jerseyans need to understand that this isn't just a simple abortion law, this law turns upside down the safety and security of every woman in

Texas. First, this law bans abortions after an ultrasound can detect what lawmakers defined as a fetal "heartbeat," which can be as early as six weeks into pregnancy. However, as medical and legal experts explain, this term is misleading as embryos at this stage of development do not yet possess a heart. Second, this particular bill does not even make an exemption for pregnancies resulting from rape or incest. Third, and the main difference from all other bills relating to abortion law, this bill allows private citizens to sue abortion providers or anyone else who helps someone get an abortion, even if they have no direct relation to the person receiving the abortion. For example, if a woman were to request a car from a ride-sharing app such as Uber, Lyft, or taxi, the individual who drove the patient to the appointment could get sued for helping even though the individual had no idea what the appointment was for. The ensuing rush of private citizens now allowed to sue aims to put advocacy groups, doctors, clinics, and other pro-choice organizations out of business by taking up all of their time and money fighting against these suits. Furthermore, people who sued would be awarded at least \$10,000 as well as costs for attorney's fees, if they won their case. So what does this mean for New Jersey? Despite being legal, access to abortion has always been fragile and limited. In New Jersey, there exists strong case law that provides additional protections beyond the federal law for the right to access abortion care. But court cases may not be sufficient to fully protect and ensure New Jerseyans access to abortion, particularly if the U.S. Supreme Court follows their inaction on Texas by gutting Roe when they rule on the Mississippi case next year. New Jerseyans will be vulnerable to the same uncertainties that we now face at the federal level." (Vin Gopal, Op-Ed, Star Ledger, 10/4/21)

In 2017, Gopal Was Endorsed By Garden State Equality. 'Garden State Equality, the state's largest and most active gay and lesbian rights advocacy organization, today plans to formally back Democrat Vin Gopal for state senate in the battleground 11th District. "We consider Vin Gopal a friend, and we know he will have our back with Phil Murphy in Trenton," Christian Fuscarino, executive director of Garden State Equality, told InsiderNJ. "We know we will have two allies." Gopal is seeking to oust long-serving state Senator Jennifer Beck (R-11) in New Jersey's most-watched senate election this year. "It came down to Senator Beck having told us she would support issues and then reversing her decision, and with what is happening federally, we cant have that uncertainty," Fuscarino said. He noted a birth certificate bill that Beck sponsored, which she ultimately opposed; and pointed out that she first opposed the marriage quality bill and then later voted for it, after redistricting rearranged Asbury Park into the 11th District. In 2021, Gopal Sponsored Legislation Codifying Gay Marriage Rights Into Law. "Marriage equality may soon be better protected in New Jersey as a bill moves on to votes in the state Senate and Assembly. A 2013 court ruling legalized same-sex marriage in New Jersey, but it has not been cemented in a statute. The New Jersey Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee on Thursday voted almost unanimously to move the bill forward that would codify marriage equality into law. Legislators will consider the bill on Monday. If it passes both chambers, it heads to Gov. Phil Murphy for his likely approval. He has vocally supported LGBTO rights during his tenure. The momentum in Trenton arrives at an important time, explained Christian Fuscarino, executive director of Asbury Park-based Garden State Equality. "With a conservativeleaning Supreme Court, we cannot afford to sit by in hopes the Justices will leave Obergefell v. Hodges intact," Fuscarino said, referring to the 2015 ruling that legalized marriage equality at a national level. "Our Legislature must act now to preserve this sacred right." When marriage equality got the all-clear from New Jersey courts, Amy Ouinn and her partner of 10 years, Heather Jensen, were among the first to be wed, exchanging vows in a ceremony on Asbury Park Boardwalk. Nearly a decade later, Quinn is now deputy mayor of Asbury Park and the fight for marriage equality in New Jersey continues. "I can't believe we're still fighting for this, but here we are," Quinn said. LGBTQ couples worry that without protections granted by a law, "the rights given ... could change with a different court," said former state Sen. Bill Baroni, who was the first person to vote "yes" to marriage equality in 2013. "I envy one of you because one of you could be the last person to vote 'yes' on marriage equality and put it in our law forever and say to the people of New Jersey, no matter who you love we value you, we honor you, you are equal," Baroni said during Thursday's committee meeting. The last "yes" vote on Thursday came from state Sen. Dawn Marie Addiego, D- Burlington. State Sen. Steven Oroho, R-Sussex, cast the sole opposing vote, citing concerns over "a lack of religious exemption" in the bill. Quinn said the effort is "really smart" of the bill's lead sponsors: state Sens. Loretta Weinberg, D-Bergen; Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth; and Stephen Sweeney, D-Camden, the outgoing president of the Senate." (Asbury Park Press, 12/18/21)

"I cannot, and should not pretend that I have ever experienced the plight or experiences of America's black community-but I want to understand, and I stand with our black community in their fight for justice. Watching this video was sickening, inhumane, disgusting and horrifying. Point blank - it was murder sanctioned by individuals sworn to protect us. The officers involved in the murder of George Floyd without a doubt failed to uphold their oath to protect and serve. This should not discount the tens of thousands of officers who risk their lives each day upholding their oath and protecting their communities, but we must also understand that benevolent words and apologies from upstanding members of law enforcement will not undo the pain of generations of pain, anguish, and oppression. We need action. We cannot afford to let this tragedy pass into yesterday's headlines. America needs healing, and our black community deserves justice for the bigotry and systematic prejudice that many black Americans face every day. Abusive and prejudiced police officers must be held accountable for their actions, and good police officers must be empowered to speak up if they see something wrong-not pressured or shamed into staying silent. This incident is not an isolated one, nor does the violent policing of black Americans exist in a vacuum. Today's conflicts grew from seeds first planted four hundred years ago, and have been nurtured and twisted by decades of segregation and prejudice. Addressing this problem will take accountability, proper bias training, support for community policing, and the installation of a culture that punishes abuse and rewards integrity. We cannot solve the problem of systemic racism overnight, but we can and must come together as a nation to agree that it exists, to heal the wounds in our nation's psyche, and to make sure that this kind of tragedy never happens again." 2018: "State Sen. Vin Gopal, D 11th District, Plans To Introduce A Bill Barring New Jersey Public Employee Pension Funds Or Annuities From Investing In Gun Manufacturer Companies." "State Sen. Vin Gopal, D 11th District, plans to introduce a bill barring New Jersey public employee pension funds or annuities from investing in gun manufacturer companies. Assemblyman Eric Houghtalin, D-11th District, and Assemblywoman Joan Downey, D-11 District, will co-sponsor similar legislation at the assemblys next quorum. We cannot stand by and let gun manufacturers that profit by producing weapons benefit from the investment of our pension funds, Gopal said in a news release. With this bill we are sending a message that New Jersey is making a conscious decision about the type of companies the state should invest in. The bill also would require the State Investment Council and the director of the Division of Investments to submit an initial report on its prohibited investments and to submit annual reports on its progress towards compliance with the prohibition. The pension funds from public employees should not in any way serve to help these firearms companies become richer at the expense of the lives of many innocent people who are being murdered with firearms throughout the country, Houghtalin said." (NJBIZ, 2/22/18) In 2022, Gopal Was Among The Legislators To Vote For A 4769, Which Imposed Additional Restrictions On Concealed Carry. "The legislation (A4769) comes after the U.S. Supreme Court in June effectively invalidated tough concealed-carry restrictions in states like New York and New Jersey and made it easier to obtain carry permits there. Democrats introduced this bill in response to the decision. It would require gun owners in New Jersey seeking to get a carry permit to purchase liability insurance and take training courses, while increasing permit fees and prohibiting people from carrying firearms in a wide range of "sensitive places" in the state -- including schools, public parks, courthouses, and bars. It would also prohibit carrying guns on private property unless the property owner allows it. Supporters say the measure would help protect residents if the court ruling leads to more guns being carried in public. Critics counter that it's unconstitutional and unfair, essentially barring law-abiding gun owners from carrying in most public places once they leave home, while criminals would simply ignore the rules. The state Assembly voted narrowly along party lines, 42-29, last month to pass the measure. The state Senate voted narrowly largely along party lines, 21-16, on Monday." (*Star Ledger*, 12/20/22)

Norcross. "Gopal, 32, is the former chairman of the Monmouth County Democrats. He fundraised at a steady pace all year and got some last-minute help from a super PAC aligned with South Jersey power broker George Norcross, which dropped more than \$876,000 on the race in the last days. On the campaign trail, Gopal repeatedly tied Beck to Gov. Chris Christie, who has become deeply unpopular in New Jersey. "I'm a lifelong resident of Monmouth County. Phil Murphy as well as elected officials throughout the state from both parties including former Republican Governor nominee and Senate nominee Doug Forrester. "I'm here first and foremost actually not as Governor, I'm here as a resident of Monmouth County," said Gov. Murphy. "There's no one I know who gets more stuff done than this guy. He checks the partisan politics at the door and focuses on things like mental health and women's healthcare," said Gov. Murphy, adding, "No one has the backs of our Veterans more than Vin Gopal. No one has the back of our members of law enforcement and first responders more than Senator Gopal." Senator Gopal was elected in 2017 and re-elected in 2021. He has since sponsored dozens of pieces of legislation that have become laws including increasing access to services and programs for people with mental and behavioral disabilities. If elected this November, Senator Gopal will become the first Democrat in Monmouth County to serve a third term in the state senate. **BULLSEYE Senate President Nick Scutari, D-Linden, who was the evening's emcee, expressed his support for Senator Gopal. "Vin has been an amazing voice for civil discourse in a political reality that does not have enough of that," said Scutari, noting that Gopal has been a bipartisan person throughout his entire career." Vin Gopal Civic Association

In 2021, "Lori Annetta (R-Freehold Borough) wrote to the New Jersey Attorney General, Election Law Enforcement Commission and Internal Revenue Service requesting an investigation into possible violations of federal and state laws" By The Vin Gopal Civic Association. "State Senator Vin Gopal's Republican challenger is accusing the "Vin Gopal Civic Association," a 501(c)(3) organization, of engaging in campaign-like activities which she says warrant action of authorities in Trenton and Washington, D.C. This week, Lori Annetta (R- Freehold Borough) wrote to the New Jersey Attorney General, Election Law Enforcement Commission and Internal Revenue Service requesting an investigation into possible violations of federal and state laws. "Senator Gopal specifically added his name and title as Senator to a bulk mailing sent by this 'charity, that landed in voters mailboxes during the first week of October just days before the start of early voting in New Jersey on October 23 and during the mail-in voting period," Annetta alleged in a statement. The cited mailer (pictured on the right) is an invitation to a "family day" event in Ocean Township purportedly intended to support local VFWs and American Legions. Ocean lies inside Gopal's 11th Legislative District. "This event, as well as the bulk mailing that was done by the charitable organization with not just the organization's name, but also 'Senator Vin Gopal' with top billing on the flier, in the days leading up to a hotly contested election for Senator Gopal's legislative seat, is clear evidence that Senator Gopal is utilizing the Vin Gopal Civic Association to solicit and spend 'charitable contributions' for the purpose of promoting himself throughout his legislative district while simultaneously operating his political reelection campaign," Annetta charged. Freeholder Title

Gopal Sponsored Legislation To Change The 'Freeholder' Title To Director Contending The Phrase "Has No Place In Modern Diverse Society." "One of the bill's sponsors in the Senate is Sen. Vin Gopal (D-Monmouth), who said, "The term 'freeholder' has its roots in pre-Colonial England and was used to describe free, white land owning men. This archaic phrase, blemished with negative connotations, has no place in a modern, diverse society. "We have a responsibility to recognize outdated components of our government and take steps to modernize where appropriate. I believe in this instance, it is more than appropriate. By transitioning from the phrase 'freeholder' to 'commissioner' we are bringing our county government, with a budget of nearly \$450 million and over 600,000 constituents, into the 21st century. "Here in Monmouth County, the term 'freeholder' often causes confusion, leading some to believe the title is associated with Freehold Borough or Freehold Township. The title, which is only used in our state, also tends to confuse public officials outside of New Jersey who use the term 'commissioner.' This long overdue change will provide some much needed clarity to both the residents of New Jersey and the out-of-state public officials we work with on a regular basis," Gopal said. On April 12, the Senate bill was passed 27-4 with nine senators not voting. There are four senators who represent Monmouth County in the state Legislature. Gopal, who is a sponsor of the bill, voted "yes," Republican Sam Thompson voted "yes," Republican Robert Singer voted "yes" and Republican Declan O'Scanlon voted "no." The Assembly bill was introduced on Jan. 29 and referred to the Assembly State and Local Government Committee." (*News Transcript*, 6/5/18)

Gopal's Legislation To Abandon The Freeholder Term Was Passed In 2020. "A bill that would rename the title of county officials in New Jersey from freeholder to commissioner is headed to Gov. Phil Murphy's desk after passing the state Senate on Thursday. After years of debate, the bill, S855, calls for a name change because of the history of the centuries-old term that many consider racist and offensive. It was a term coined when only white, male landowners could be hold public office. The measure was approved with a vote of 31-6 and is backed by Murphy, who announced his support of the bipartisan legislation on July 10 with state Senate President Steve Sweeney and Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin. There's been talk of abolishing the term for years. The latest push comes amid a new civil rights movement to address systemic racism in America, sparked by the police killing of George Floyd, a Black man, in Minnesota and fueled by protests across the country. "This is an outdated name that is rooted in the terminology and practices of bigotry that needs to be eliminated," Sweeney said in a statement. "As we work to bring justice and equality to all Americans we should recognize that symbolism matters and the titles we use for public offices have meaning. We should be diligent in erasing all remnants of oppression." Murphy is expected to sign the bill, which was sponsored by Sweeney and state Sens. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, and Joe Pennachio, R-Morris." Party Bosses

In May 2023, Republicans Criticized Gopal's "Legislation prohibiting county constitutional officers from serving as political party bosses in New Jersey." "Legislation prohibiting county constitutional officers from serving as political party bosses in New Jersey is on its way to the full state Senate. The bill, introduced last week by state Sen. Vin Gopal, D-Monmouth, was approved along party lines in the state Senate Judiciary Committee on Thursday after a half-hour of intense opposition from Republican party leaders in Gopal's home district. The legislation would prevent county clerks, sheriffs and surrogates from serving as chairpersons, co-chairpersons and vice-chairpersons of county committees within political parties. Gopal called the bill "common sense" and a "no-brainer" because of the partisan implications political leadership could have on sensitive topics. "When you enter the judiciary, you have sheriff's officers there. When you handle an election matter, there are sheriff's officers

there. Clerks run the elections and surrogates, who are also affected by this bill, are also quasijudges," Gopal said. "I don't understand how any rational person should think they could be political bosses." But as state Sen. Jon Bramnick pointed out, the roles are already partisan because many constitutional officers in New Jersey are elected and there are already systems in place to ensure that they don't exert undue influence." "In Response To Backlash Over The Bill, Seen By Many As Using The State's Legislature As A Political Payback Machine, Gopal Pulled The Bill." "It was reportedly a coordinated effort between New Jersey Democrat Senator Vin Gopal and Ocean County Chairman George Gilmore to try to unseat a mutual enemy, Monmouth County Sheriff Shawn Golden, Golden, who also serves as the Monmouth County GOP Chairman, is a mutual foe of both Gopal and Gilmore, two unlikely political allies brought together out of political necessity. Gopal's bill sought to disgualify constitutional officers such as sheriffs from becoming political party chairmen. However, the only person the law would have affected would have been Golden, thus dubbing Gopal's legislation as the "Golden Rule". In response to backlash over the bill, seen by many as using the state's legislature as a political payback machine, Gopal pulled the bill. Golden himself testified at the Assembly Judiciary Committee, saying the bill targets him and was a political attack on his freedom of association and freedom of speech. Gilmore and Golden have been feuding since Gilmore's arrest and sentencing on federal charges. Upset that Golden sided with Gilmore's successor, Frank B. Holman, a political feud ensued for the next four years that continues today as Golden's operatives are now operating against Gilmore in Ocean County. The once untouchable chairman, losing the fear and respect he once wielded statewide, is seeing challenges to his own agenda in Ocean County elections each cycle, often by candidates with affiliations with the Monmouth GOP. Gopal and Gilmore are close allies and friends, according to Gopal. Both have been seen meeting with each other and with Governor Phil Murphy in recent months. Gilmore, the Ocean County GOP Chairman, now works for a lobbying firm owned by the brother of the state's most powerful political figure, George Norcross causing many insiders in Ocean County to question Gilmore's loyalty to the Republican party. Gopal said he may reintroduce the bill at some point in the future." (Shore News Network, 5/20/23)
